Murder Suspect Placed in Jail Ten Miles From Scene of Crime

baby. The alien carpenter lost his appeal—his attorney said it was his last—in the courts tonight. Attorney General David T. Wilets moved to take him at once from the Essex county jail to Flemington, N. J.

His head down, Hauptmann was led from the front door of the jail as a crowd of about 300 curious attempted to press forward.

Five justices of the appellate division of the supreme court upheld Justice Ernest E. L. Hammer of the Bronx in refusing to grant a writ of habeas corpus for Hauptmann after extradition papers had been signed.

Of a last minute plea by Hauptmann's counsel that he had new evidence to show the prisoner was in New York the day of the kidnapping. The justices said:

"This contention is in direct conflict with documentary evidence already in the record."
The justices handed down their opinion an hour after they had listened, in a crowded courtroom to the pleadings of Defense Attorney James M. Fawcett.

"This evidence I am offering is very important," said Fawcett, seeking to introduce an affidavit of Joseph M. Furch that Hauptmann was working for him on March 1, 1932, up to a few hours before the abduction.
Assistant District Attorney Sol Boneparth, opposing the hearing of further evidence, said a man named Cassens, who had been working for Furch on the Majestic Hotel apartment building, made an affidavit that Hauptmann told him:

"I can't get a job here because only one man is to be hired."

STRIKE VIOLENCE PENALTIES GIVEN

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 19.—(P)—Municipal Judge Donald E. Long today sentenced Robert Silger, 22, textile worker, and Homer Brewster, 39, barber, to jail for 60 days each on conviction of throwing rocks at windows of non-striking textile workers' homes.
The judge branded such rock throwing as "vicious and cowardly."

He also gave like sentences to Ray Good, 21, and Eddi Spina, 19, convicted of assault and battery. Myrtle W. Baker, 30, was sentenced to 30 days in jail for an alleged attack on a woman textile worker, and Dorothy Peters, 23, Milwaukee, who said she only was trying to stop the fight, was fined \$10.

Several others were fined or imprisoned for conviction of labor disturbances.

The disturbances were in connection with the strike at the Oregon worsted mills. Union textile workers still are on strike, declaring the mill refuses to reinstate them without discrimination for their activities during the national textile strike.

Wheat Ranchers Oppose Boost in Freight Charges

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 19.—(P)—Protest against the proposed increase of railroad freight rates on wheat was made by Umatilla county wheat ranchers at a mass gathering here tonight.

They pledged themselves to subscribe 50 cents a thousand bushels for a campaign fund to fight upward revision of the rates.

An increase of three cents a bushel on the rate to Portland would cost the growers of the county \$121,000 annually. The meeting was sponsored by the Eastern Oregon Wheat League and supported by county granges.

Washington and Tillamook Vary On Hog Control

HILLSBORO, Ore., Oct. 19.—(P)—With only about 30 per cent of the contract signers voting, corn and hog producers in Washington county voted 58 to 28 against renewing their contracts next year, and 72 to 14 against a single AAA contract for 1935.

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Oct. 19.—(P)—Continuance of the corn-hog contracts was approved 41 to 39 by Tillamook county farmers, County Agent C. H. Bergstrom announced today.

NON-HIGH DISTRICT BUDGET IS ADOPTED

A public hearing on the proposed budget will be heard at the courthouse November 15 at 2 p.m. Total expenditures outlined by the committee for the period from June, 1934, until June, 1935, the period the budget covers, were listed at \$118,305.15, of which one of the largest items was tuition costs of \$58,000. Of the debt service the principal on warrants totaled \$51,309.78 and interest on the same, \$1,800. Since June however, all outstanding warrants due have been paid, Mrs. Fulkerson stated.

Receipts were totaled by the committee at \$52,305.15, leaving the amount to be raised by taxation of \$66,000.

Other expenditures included: Postage and stationery, \$10; printing, \$50; election expenses, \$10; traveling expenses of board members, \$250, \$50 less than last year, and the emergency fund of \$7400.37.

The budget committee was composed of five persons, one each brought by the five members of the district board. The board held its regular meeting after which the committee members were officially chosen and went to work. Committee members were P. W. Owre, zone 1; F. T. Bowman, zone 2, secretary; Mrs. C. W. Stacey, zone 3; E. G. Wiesner, zone 4; and Marian Looney, zone 5, chairman.

The five regular members of the county non-high school district board are Ernest Werner, chairman, C. A. Ratcliff, Eugene Finlay, Frank Hynes and M. Weinacht.

Extend Time For Crop Loans Due To Late Season

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 19.—(P)—Extension of one month in closing time for federal seed loans has been granted Oregon growers in 17 counties where the late, dry fall has delayed seeding. Oregon State college extension officials were notified today.

The extension from the previously set date of October 15 was asked by officials here and they also requested that oats be added to the list of crops on which seed loans may be made. That concession also was made, according to word from George S. Glen, head of the regional seed loan office in Salt Lake City.

The counties sharing the extension are: Multnomah, Clatsop, Wasco, Marion, Linn, Lane, Benton, Polk, Yamhill, Washington, Columbia, Wasco, Sherman, Jefferson, Gilliam, Morrow, Umatilla and Wheeler.

College Student May Be Deported

PORTLAND, Oct. 19.—(P)—Under arrest on a deportation charge, Bernard Stein, 24, a junior at Oregon State college, was brought here today by federal immigration officers.

The government alleged Stein is a Canadian and in this country illegally, having entered at Blaine, Wash., in 1925.

ROOSEVELT GIVES VETS SCANT HOPE

ROANOKE, Va., Oct. 19.—(P)—Dedicating near here the first veterans' hospital to be built in his administration, President Roosevelt late today reminded those who served in the world war that thousands of "under-privileged" persons were worse off than themselves and strongly implied the payment of the bonus must await the recovery of this group.

There was no mention of the word "bonus" in the address, but the forty-odd thousands who stood in the natural amphitheater before him heard the president make what was generally regarded as his clearest pronouncement on the issue, even though it was by inference, since he took office a year and a half ago.

He made it clear that disabled and sick veterans would be accorded the "best treatment which medical and surgical science can supply."

But he added there were hundreds of thousands of "largely forgotten" persons in the urban slums and "back eddies remote from the active stream of life" who required government aid. The elimination of this "definite drag against the return of prosperity" should be, he said, the first aim of veterans and the nation as a whole.

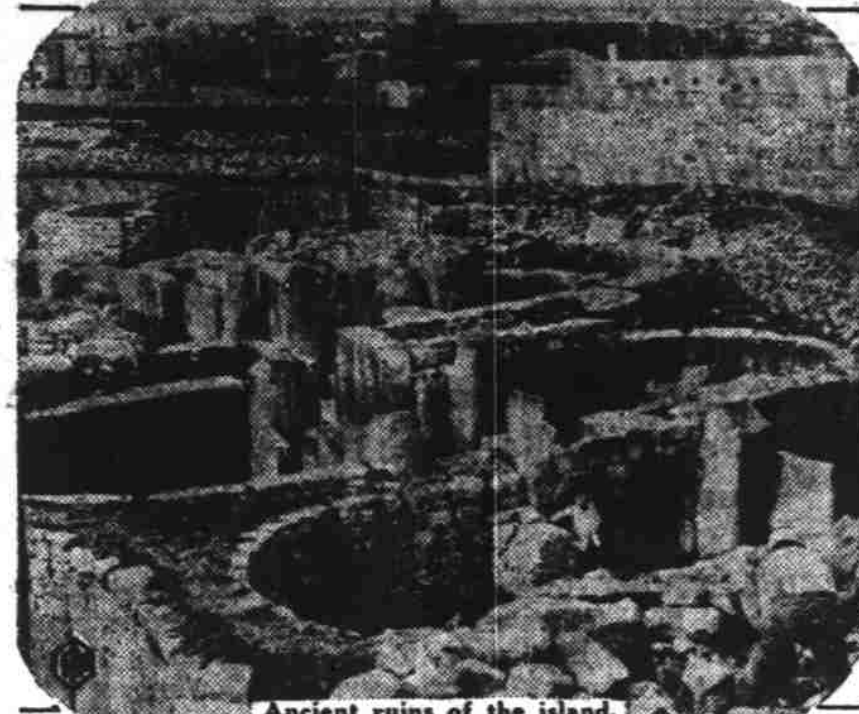

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Malta Seeks Independence

Tiny Malta, British Mediterranean outpost, which has a history tracing back to ancient times, is making the front pages again, this time in a great stride toward peace. The island's 220,000 inhabitants have been informed that Maltese again will be the official language of the island, replacing Italian and English in all the schools and law courts. Climaxing controversies between the British island officials and the strongly entrenched church with its Italian-favoring Nationalists, the constitution has been suspended three times since 1930. England is said to be seeking to win the native Maltese from a pro-Italian point of view by making Maltese the official language.

RIFLES LOOK LIKE HORNS; MAN SLAIN

BAKER, Ore., Oct. 19.—(P)—Russell Fleetwood, about 32, of Unity, was fatally wounded yesterday when his rifle and that of Wilson Whitely were mistaken for deer horns by a third hunting companion, "Mike" Palmer of Unity.

While Fleetwood and Whitely rested, Palmer continued scouting for deer and when some 300 yards from his companions was attracted by clothing of the men, he said. Then a rifle barrel was moved and mistaking it for a deer horn, he fired.

The bullet flew wild and his companions turned to look in the direction of the sound. Their guns looked like a pair of horns, Palmer said, and he fired the second bullet which struck Fleetwood in the groin after passing through his watch.

He died atop a horse making a five-mile trip to a road.
