Webteet Wade to 13-6 Victory Over Idaho; Like "Unusual" Weather

CARDINALS AND BEARS PREVAIL

Moscrip Boots One to Beat Dons, Arleigh Williams Hero for California

KEARNEY STADIUM, San Francisco, Calif., Oct. 20.—(AP)—Its power halted for three quarters by a fighting University of San Francisco football team, Stanford grabbed a 9-0 victory out of the fray today by a blockkick in the game's closing minutes.

Monk Moscrip, Stanford's placekicking end, lofted the ball between the standards from the eight yard line after a mighty Stanford drive had advanced the ball from the Indians' 20 yard line.

It was the second consecutive time Stanford beat the Dons in the closing minutes of the game, last year's 20-13 victory having been won by a touchdown just before the final gun.

With less than 10 minutes of play remaining, Stanford's drives began to work as the Indians took the ball on their own 20 yard line after a San Francisco punt had rolled over the goal line.

With Fobby Grayson and Bones Hamilton doing the work, the ball was advanced to near midfield where Frank Alustiza, Stanford's ace punter, broke away around left end and dashed to the Dons' 15 yard line.

Hamilton plunged through to the Dons' eight yard line and with one down left Moscrip dropped back to score a perfect field goal. His previous try from the 35 yard line in the second quarter fell short.

MEMORIAL STADIUM, Berkeley, Calif., Oct. 20.—(AP)—In the final period of a fiercely fought football battle at this huge bowl has rocked to in many a season, versatile Arleigh Williams, California left halfback, place-kicked an 18 yard field goal today to bring the Bears a 3 to 0 victory over their scholastic brothers from the south, the California Bruins of Los Angeles.

It was a thrilling climax to a hand to hand struggle the like of which has not been witnessed here this year, and as the leather sailed through the uprights from a difficult angle, hopes of Bear supporters for a successful conference season were revived.

The Berkeley Bears opening game conference triumph took place before 30,000 shouting fans.

For three periods they locked gridiron grips on even terms. Boxing gloves would have been appropriate in the first quarter when the officials separated rival players many times. Last year's initial meeting between the eleven of the two state universities ended in a scoreless tie.

The 1934 struggle, except for the deciding placekick, was equally close. For the first half, the visiting Bruins had an offensive edge with the ball mainly in Bear territory.

MICHIGAN DEFEATS GEORGIA TECH MEN

MICHIGAN STADIUM, Ann Arbor, Mich., Oct. 20.—(AP)—The comeback hopes of Georgia Tech and University of Michigan collided on a slippery gridiron here this afternoon and a 48-yard touchdown dash by little Ferris Jennings gave the Wolverines the victory, 9 to 2.

It was Michigan's first triumph of the season and the third consecutive defeat for the one-armed Golden Tornado from the south, which blew itself out in a flurry of futile passes after the Wolverines had piled up a 9-to-0 lead in the third period.

Jennings took a punt on his 24-yard line, eluded three desperate Tech would-be tacklers as he skirted the left end of the southland defense, then sprinted down the sideline screened by the best interference his team has ever produced this year. Willard Hillbrand place-kicked the extra point.

That was early in the third period. Before the quarter had ended, McKay, substituting for Captain Jack Phillips at fullback for the Yellow Jackets, tumbled a pass from center while trying to punt from behind his goal line, and two more points were scored for Michigan.

Hardly had the fourth period opened when Thompson, sub for "Kitty" Katz, Tech left end, blocked one of Jennings' punts on Michigan's 20-yard strip. The ball rebounded into the end zone for the safety that saved the Yellow Jackets from a shutout.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 20.—(AP)—With both teams playing wide open, sparkling football despite a sloshy field, Columbia and Pacific tied 13 to 13 in a non-conference football game here today.

Pacific's remarkable aerial attack offset the strong Columbia running attack, and each team shared about equally in the breaks.

Pacific was helpless on offense the first period and its defense finally withered as Columbia marched 50 yards for a touchdown. On a 26-yard dash from a reverse, Harmon paved the way for Philip's eight yard reverse around the other end for the score.

Corrigan whipped a 20-yard pass to Main and the next play shot an aerial Bruce which netted 30 yards and placed the ball on the Columbia three-yard line. Corrigan drove two yards and then Killis cracked through for a touchdown.

A Pacific player who was thinking, but not soon enough, virtually handed Columbia its second touchdown.

On the fourth down Columbia passed from the Pacific 25 and the ball was batted into the air and then caught by a Pacific man. Realizing his mistake in not grounding the pass, the Pacific gag let go the ball and it was ruled a fumble. Columbia recovered on the five-yard line and Roth finally drove over for a touchdown.

Frantically attempting to stop the Pacific aerial attack, a Columbia man interfered with a pass receiver. Columbia was penalized, the ball being placed on its one-yard line where Corrigan drove over for a touchdown and then a kicked goal.

VAN VLIET AND MICHEK STARS

Eighty-Yard March Yields One Score, Pass Other; Vandals Get Break

MACLEAN FIELD, Moscow, Idaho, Oct. 20.—(AP)—The University of Oregon Webteet found a rain-soaked, lake-dotted field to their liking here today and defeated the Vandals by a pack of Idaho Vandals, 13 to 6, in a Coast conference football game.

Despite the mud and muck and the water-soaked ball, both teams frequently opened up with wild passing sorties, and one of Oregon's two touchdowns, coming in the last two minutes of the first half, started in the air.

A homesoming crowd of some 7000 persons saw Oregon pool-pooch the Vandal cry "Ead Oregon's Trail."

It was right after Oregon's Michek and Van Vliet, aided by a hard-hitting line, had marched 80 yards for a touchdown that Idaho's only score came. Idaho kicked off after the touchdown, and Van Vliet returned to his own 32-yard line. Oregon lost four yards on the first play, and on the next Van Vliet dropped back to punt. Russ Honsowetz, tackle, and Barney Anderson, sub end, broke through to block the punt. The ball rolled to the 26-yard line, and Anderson scooped it up. He dashed, untouched, to the goal line.

Oregon's field-long drive in the third period was beautiful. Supported by a hard driving line, Van Vliet and Michek tore time after time through the bewildered Idaho forwards for long gains. Only one pass was attempted, and it was smeared by Russ Honsowetz, Idaho halfback. Van Vliet took the ball on the two-yard line and slanted off right guard to score.

Oregon's most successful passing barrage ended in a touchdown with only 30 seconds of the first half left to play. Much of the quarter had seen aimless bucking and putting when Van Vliet took to the air. Parke snagged his fourth consecutive pass on the one-yard line and stepped over the goal for a touchdown. Vincent Walker, guard, place-kicked the conversion.

The first score came on a pass, Petersen to Justice, after Gonzaga had marched to C. P. S.'s two-yard line. The same combination produced the second touchdown, Petersen's toss going 15 yards to Justice on the goal line. Buchanan kicked the extra point after touchdown.

Puget Sound threatened only once, marching and passing its way to Gonzaga's 20-yard line at the start of the fourth frame. The Bulldog, however, halted the Logger drive and took the ball on downs.

Five More Proud Elevens Fall Off Unbeaten List; Others Just Squeeze in

Pitt's Panthers, annual contenders for the national championship, fell before the power of Minnesota's Gophers. The Gophers came from behind to grind out two fourth-period touchdowns.

Win, 13-7. Colgate and Fordham likewise were overmatched in intersectional duels, the red raiders from Hamilton, N. Y., going down before Ohio State, 10 to 7, while Fordham bowed to St. Mary's rugged Gaels from California, 14 to 9. More than 150,000 spectators saw these three games alone.

GAELS HUMBLE FORDHAM RAM

Win 14 to 9, Showing More Superiority Than Score Would Indicate

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—(AP)—The bells of St. Mary's pealed joyously today as the brawny Gaels from California trounced Fordham, 14 to 9, and scored another victory in their football feud with the New Yorkers.

A capacity crowd of nearly 60,000 jammed into the Polo Grounds for the third renewal of what has come to be one of the most colorful of intersectional gridiron rivalries.

Entitled to a standstill in the early stages of a furious, savage battle, the Californians first drew up on even terms with Fordham, then uncovered a vicious drive in the last two hours to take the lead and hold it.

The Gaels out-rushed Fordham, 406 yards to 144. They gained 110 yards in the air to Fordham's 87 and completed five out of 18 aerials against three out of sixteen for the Rams.

Fordham gave the big crowd a thrill midway in the opening quarter.

Joe Mahiaci, Ram back, leaped high into the air, intercepted one of Schreiber's darts and pranced 90 yards for the score. Saraudsky added the point.

The visitors drew up on even terms with the Rams in the second. Mattos, a sub back, shot several 40 and 50 yard passes, but shifted his tactics when his heaves either were blocked or incomplete. There will also be a well-balanced card of the best local talent available, Matchmaker Harry Finks announced last night.

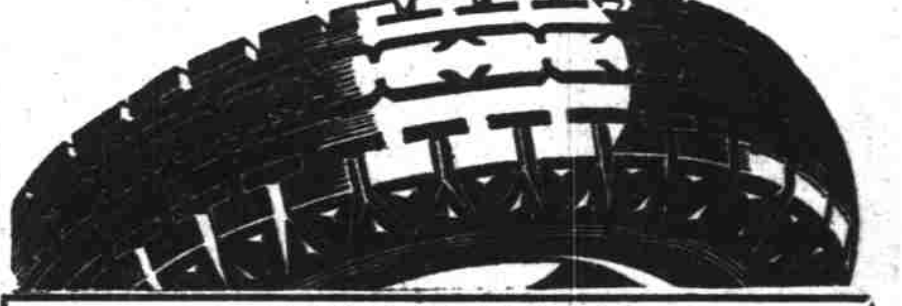
