U. S. Catches Up With Floyd on Isolated Farm Near East Liverpool

came toward the car. Then he started across a pasture.
When he was about 500 feet away, the officers started shooting. First he fell on his face, rolled over on his back, and then on his stomach. He got up on his knees and then fell down again.
"By that time the officers reached him and put handcuffs on him."

Floyd, the slick-haired phantom of the Ozarks, was able to say only a few words before he expired.

"Who in the hell tipped you off?" he demanded as the officers, led by Melvin Purvis, head of the justice department's bureau of investigation in Chicago, approached him.

Purvis immediately questioned Floyd concerning the machine gun massacre of five men at the Kansas City Union station in June, 1933, but, to his dying breath, Floyd refused to admit participation in that crime. "He wouldn't admit it," Purvis said.

Purvis had a few more words with Floyd, which the department of justice agent did not reveal. Then the officers picked up the wounded fugitive and started to carry him to one of the automobiles intending to hurry him to a hospital.

Floyd, however, was dead before they reached the car.

HIGHER BOARD ASKS MILLAGE RESTORED

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 22.—(AP)—The state board of higher education probably will ask restoration of \$500,000 millage funds diverted by the last legislature, it was indicated at the board's meeting here today.

On the motion of B. F. Irvine, the board voted that Presidents C. V. Boyer of the University of Oregon and George W. Peary of Oregon State college, Chancellor Kerr and the director of elementary teacher training prepare a resolution on that matter, to be presented to the next legislature. The resolution, to state the plight of the schools, is to be presented for final action at the board's next meeting here November 12.

Irvine urged that the board "make known the true conditions" to the legislature and demand the return of the \$500,000 which was used to ease the general fund deficit.

Powers of the presidents of the university and state college were clarified and increased with adoption of by-laws revisions pending three months. Irvine, chairman of the board's special committee on rules and by-laws, cast the dissenting ballot.

Douglas Vote Is Against Control

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 22.—(AP)—A 20 to 29 vote against continuance of the corn-hog adjustment program was recorded by Douglas county contract signers at various meetings the past week, County Agent J. Roland Parker announced today.

The vote against the one contract per farm plan, for control of all grain and livestock, was 37 to 19. Of the 96 contract signers in the county, 59 cast ballots on the corn-hog contract plan proposed for next year.

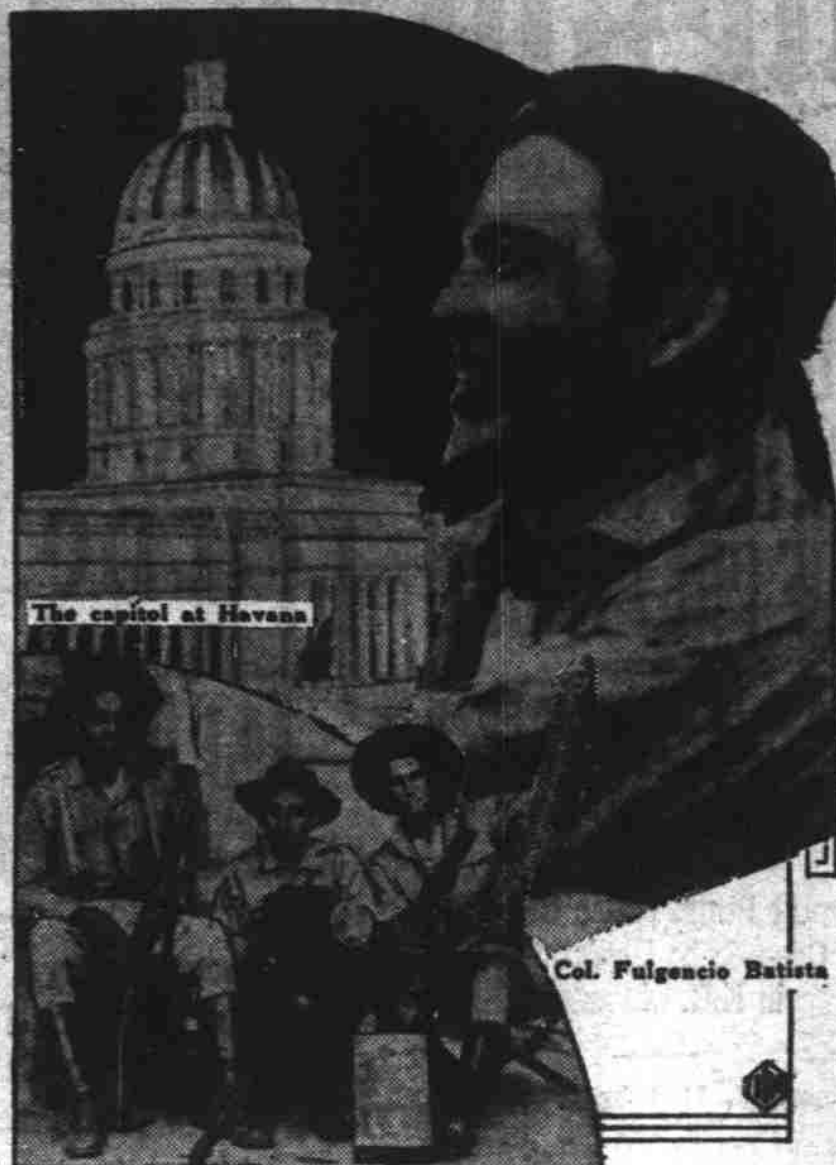

000 in home modernization work contracted during the progress of this campaign. Chairman Sackett reported: "The first effects of this program already have been felt in Salem. According to figures released by E. C. Bushnell, city building inspector, the permits issued during the last two weeks, exceed all two weeks periods for the last five years."

Harry V. Collins, chairman of the finance committee detailed to the dealers, the method by which the committee would raise the necessary funds to carry on the program.

TAX LIMITATION IS P.T.A. MEET TOPIC

John H. Carlin, member of the state tax commission, and A. Warren Jones, deputy county assessor and candidate for city recorder, last night outlined to members of the Leslie Parent-Teacher association the probable effects on state and local revenues should the 20-mill tax limitation initiative measure be approved at the November 6 election.

Neither speaker declared himself as for or opposed to the measure, but both pointed out that it enacted it would require a sharp curtailment in government expenditures or a search for sources of revenue other than real property.

The Salem school district, for instance, would lose approximately \$65,000, or nearly one-fourth of the tax called for in the current budget, Jones pointed out. COAST BANKS PILE UP HUGE RESERVES

90 Millions This Side of Rockies; Prepared for Business Revival

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Pacific coast banks are piling up huge reserves. Not only strengthening their standing far beyond apparent needs, but building up vast resources for adequate financing of any business revival that may come.

The Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco reported today that 32 weekly reporting banks had 161 millions deposited in reserves with the central bank. This figure is around record levels and far above requirements.

An estimate of surplus reserves by H. C. Hendee, editor of the Pacific coast edition of the Wall Street Journal, places the figure for Pacific slope banks at around 90 millions. This, he said, would provide for loans of around 900 millions, should that amount be needed.

The reserve report shows an increase of 18 millions last week in demand deposits of the 32 weekly reporting banks. This gives them a total of 721 millions, which compares with 579 millions a year ago. Including time and federal deposits, the total was 1715 millions, compared with 1492 a year ago.

Loans, however, have not tended to expand in recent weeks, although they are slightly higher than a year ago, and interest charges are a little lower. The total business loans of the reporting banks were 686 millions last Wednesday, which was down one million for the week, but 13 millions up from a year ago.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—(AP)—An increase in deposits in commercial banks of Utah, Idaho, Washington and Oregon of approximately \$83,000,000 from December 30, 1933 to June 30, 1934 was shown today in a report of the Federal Deposit Insurance corporation.

The report was made on statistics obtained from 407 banks, representing approximately 97 percent of the licensed commercial institutions in the four states.

A report on 407 Oregon banks showed present deposits of \$134,373,000, in June, compared to \$147,281 last December.

PRESIDENT FAVORS PRIVATE CHARITIES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt called upon the people of the nation tonight to lighten the load of government expenditures for unemployment relief through the 1934 mobilization for human needs.

In a radio address opening a campaign for private charities, headed by Newton D. Baker, of Ohio, Mr. Roosevelt said the government counted upon a continuation of private contributions to private organizations. He called for a "decentralization of relief."

"I hope that you will well realize," he said, "that it is contrary to a sound policy to transfer more burden to the shoulders of government if it can possibly be avoided and, therefore, that private charity should, as a matter of good citizenship, be maintained at least at current levels."

"The other point I would make is that none of us want to eliminate the personal factor in taking care of human needs. Surely none of you want to centralize the care of relief either in Washington or in your state capital or in your city hall."

Mr. Baker joined in the radio program inaugurating the 1934 private relief campaign.

ADULT EDUCATION WILL ENROLL 500

Classes to Open Wednesday Night; Mass Meeting Well Attended

An enrollment of 500 persons is anticipated at the start of the adult education classes financed under the SERRA and slated to start Wednesday night. T. T. Mackenzie, Salem public school director of vocational education, announced last night following the mass meeting at the high school to determine which courses would be most popular. Last winter and spring approximately 1500 persons attended the classes at one time or another.

Subjects for which a demand was indicated last night are English, general mathematics, public speaking, general science, American government and recovery measures, practical nursing, sewing, landscape gardening and a commercial work.

Registration is being held open until 7 p. m. Wednesday, when instruction will get under way at the high school. Any person 16 years of age or over is eligible to attend without cost any class excepting those in vocational commercial work. In the latter case, registration will be limited to either unemployed adults who have previous employment in this type of work—stenography, typing, bookkeeping—or persons on the relief rolls.

Eight instructors are being provided by the SERRA. Classes will vary from 1 to 2 hours in length. It will be permissible for anyone eligible to enroll for two of the one-hour classes. Class nights will be Monday, Wednesday and either Thursday or Friday.

The present class series will run until a few days before Christmas. It is believed funds will be available to resume instruction after the holidays and continue it until next June.

Answer is Filed By Cleo Prather In Divorce Case

Cleo Prather filed answer and counter suit in circuit court yesterday to the divorce complaint filed against him by his wife Gladys Prather, in which he denied accusations made against him in the original complaint, and further charged that his wife was not a fit custodian for their child Carry, aged four.

He denied charges of drunkenness and non-support made against him by his wife, and in his counter suit charged desertion against her. He stated that she had become infatuated with another man and had no control over her temper. He asked that the complaint against him be dismissed, that he be granted a divorce from his wife, and have control of the child.
