Two of Largest Projects in \$800,000 List are in Polk, Announced

Bids for the construction of roads and bridges aggregating a cost of more than \$300,000 will be opened by the state highway commission in Portland next Thursday R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced yesterday. Virtually all of the projects will be paid for out of federal funds,

Two of the largest projects are in Polk county. One of these will require 2.12 miles of grading and three miles of oil mat surface treatment on the McNary-Oak Point section of the Independence secondary highway. The other project involves 3.9 miles of grading and surfacing and 7.8 miles of mat surface treatment on the Yamhill river-Salt creek section of the Dallas-Coast secondary highway.

Absentee voting is larger this year than at any recent voting period, County Clerk Boyer announced yesterday. A great many Marion county voters have al-ready cast their ballots; many more will do likewise before the final day for such voting, October 31, comes.

Voters who will be out of the county November 6 and are now duly registered may vote as well as persons whose health will not permit them to come to the polls, The latter must have an affidavit that they are not sufficiently strong to vote, Boyer said, before

When an absentee voter has cast his ballot, it is sealed and then delivered by the sheriff to the counting board which does not open the seal until the regular ballot counting starts.
