

Politics Warm Up in Polk County as Deadline Nears

MOTT-TURNER RACE HOTTEST

Contest Between Spaulding and Cook Looks to Be Closest

Polk county is apparently not as interested in the coming general election as it has been in previous elections, although there is considerable interest in the races for several state and county offices. Both parties are holding their usual rallies, and candidates are speaking at various club and farm organization meetings but the fall campaign has been rather quiet and without the usual fireworks that accompany a political campaign.

The contest here for governor will undoubtedly be a three-cornered race between Joe Dunn, General Martin and Peter Zimmerman, with the other three candidates, Correll, Silverman, and Wirth, taking the back seat. All three of the principal candidates are strong in this county and the result appears to be about a toss-up. Backers of this trio each claim that their man will carry the county easily but the general outlook is for a hot race with Martin and Zimmerman probably fighting it out for the lead but with Dunn trailing close.

Give Turner Edge
Chief interest in the election seems to be centered on the race for congressional representation from the first district and particularly on the race between R. R. Turner, democratic candidate, and James A. Mott, republican nominee and incumbent. Guiley and Richards will probably gather in a few votes but the contest will undoubtedly be between Turner and Mott. It is believed there that Turner will take a big lead in Dallas and vicinity, and that he will probably take a slight edge over his opponent in the county.

There has been little interest shown in the races for secretary of state, superintendent of public instruction, and commissioner of the bureau of labor. Indications are that the contests for these offices will be between the candidates of the two main parties with Snell, Howard and Gram probably taking the honors in the county.

Hogg Gains Seen
R. W. Hogg, democratic candidate, seems to be gaining a little ground on Dean Walker, republican, in the race for state senator from the ninth district. Polk and Benton counties. Walker is expected to carry Benton county easily but a much closer race is expected in Polk county.

Lyle D. Thomas, republican, seems to be favored for state representative from the 10th district. Polk county, although the democratic candidate, Taylor A. Dunn, will undoubtedly draw a large number of votes and may make it a close race.

Probably the closest race for any county office will be the contest between Bruce Spaulding, Dallas attorney, democratic, and Elmer D. Cook of West Salem, republican, for office of district attorney. Cook won the nomination in the primary election by a small margin over Elmer Barnhart, while Spaulding was unopposed. Both candidates have been campaigning hard and their backers are claiming victory for their candidate. All predictions for the election indicate that the race will be as close as the republican primary for the same office with the winner undecided until the last precinct is heard from.

Anybody's Battle Yet

Only one other county office is up for any contest with Frank Farmer, republican and incumbent, vying with Fred Gibson, democrat, for the county commissionership. Farmer was favored early during the campaign due to his record in office but Gibson appears to be gaining strength and it may be anybody's battle.

Polk county will name a county surveyor at the election next

month but there is no contest. Edward J. Himes, of Dallas, was nominated by both parties at the primaries.

Residents of Polk, Lincoln and Tillamook counties residing within the boundaries of the Salmon River-Grand Ronde highway improvement district will name seven trustees for this district at the election next month. Eight names are on the ballot, seven of the candidates being named by both parties at the primaries. Those nominated for the offices of trustees for the district, seven to be elected, are: J. B. Barry, republican-democrat, Polk county; John W. Boyer, republican-democrat, Tillamook county; George A. Cushman, republican-democrat, Lincoln county; C. H. Porter, republican, Lincoln county; T. J. Werth, republican-democrat, Polk county; Ira L. Withrow, republican-democrat, Polk county; L. Wolfe, republican-democrat, Lincoln county, and H. Rexroad, republican-democrat, Lincoln county.

Harris Seeks Post
Two justices of the peace will also be named in Polk county but only one office is being contested. Henry Butler is unopposed for the office in district No. 1, and R. A. Harris, democrat, and W. B. Phillips, republican, will vie for the position in district No. 2.

Seven constables are to be named although there are only four candidates listed on the ballot, the other three districts not nominating a candidate. There is no opposition in any of the districts unless names are written in on the ballot. Those running for the office of constable are: District No. 1, Dave W. Faine; No. 2, no candidate; No. 3, Ed Campbell; No. 4, William W. Dawson; No. 5, Verd Schrank; No. 6 and 7, no candidates.

Dallas will elect a mayor, auditor and police judge, councilman at large, and four councilmen with no contest for any of the offices. All city candidates are running on an independent ticket and only one new name will be on the ballot, with Earle Richardson running for the office of councilman from Ward No. 4 in place of R. Y. Morrison, incumbent. Candidates for city offices are: Mayor, Leif S. Finseth, incumbent; councilman-at-large, C. B. Sundberg, incumbent; city auditor and police judge, J. R. Craven, incumbent; councilman, ward No. 1, J. J. Wick, incumbent; ward No. 2, J. R. Allgood, incumbent; ward No. 3, A. B. Starbuck, incumbent; ward No. 4, Earle Richardson.

Although there have been several public hearings held in the county there is little indication how the vote on the three constitutional amendments and measures will go. It is expected that the vote on the measures will probably be close.
