

Budget Adopted by Gervais Shows Increase of \$1000

CUTS MADE FOR SCHOOLS

Adkisson is Candidate for Town Treasurer at Polls Tuesday

GERVAIS, Oct. 31.—The budget for 1935 for the city of Gervais was adopted at a meeting held at the city hall Monday night. The budget this year calls for \$4244 as against \$3887 last year.

Officers to be elected next Tuesday were nominated. G. J. Molson, present incumbent, was nominated for mayor; A. DeJardin and C. W. Cutsforth at present members of the council are candidates for re-election with F. H. Cannard to replace C. A. Sawyer, A. B. Minaker, present city recorder, was placed in nomination for that office and A. B. Adkisson is the candidate for treasurer to replace G. T. Wadsworth.

The council now has men at work on the first SERRA projects it has undertaken. Many of the sidewalks are being repaired and new crossings laid.

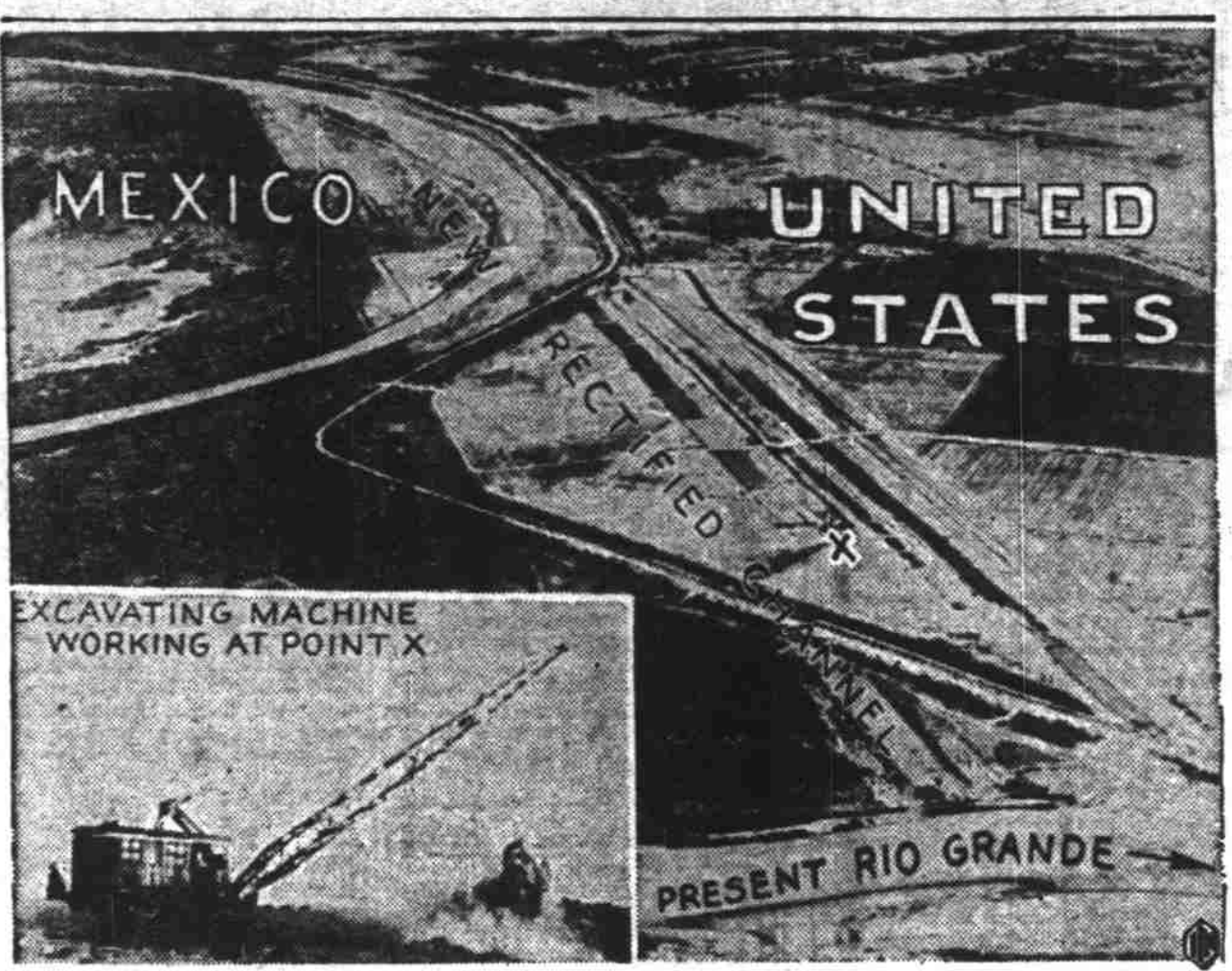
Senior Class Will Present Comedy at Amity Auditorium
