

# Polk County Budget Shows Reduction of \$37,000 for 1935

## BUDGET HEARING SET FOR NOV. 30TH

### Committee Prepares Estimates For Polk County Expenses

DALLAS, Nov. 3.—Members of the Polk county budget committee met at the court house this week and prepared a proposed budget for 1935 which will be submitted to a public hearing to be held here on Friday, November 30. The budget committee was composed of the three members of the county court, Judge G. L. Hawkins, and Commissioners C. C. Gardner and Frank Farmer, and a citizens' committee composed of P. O. Powell, James Imlah, and George Curtis.

The amount to be raised by taxation in 1935 as shown on the proposed budget is over \$97,000.00 less than the 1934 tax levy, with the total amount to be raised by taxation placed at \$295,762.59 as compared with a levy of \$333,116.26 last year. The total estimated expense for 1935 is placed at \$297,480.00, and estimated receipts are listed as \$71,717.50.

As a result, Oregon's enviable Hospital Standards would be reduced to a dangerously low level, thus materially affecting public health.

Furthermore the adoption of the Amendment would rob the State Industrial Accident Commission of its power to properly administer the long efficient and economical Workmen's Compensation Law.

## MATRON PASSES 79TH BIRTHDAY

MONMOUTH, Nov. 3.—Mrs. Rebecca Jane Hampton, a native of Polk county, Missouri, and resident of Monmouth since 1892, celebrated her 79th birthday anniversary at her home this week. Mrs. Hampton, who was Rebecca Chaney, was married in Missouri July 30, 1871, to David M. Hampton, a Civil War veteran. Both parties to the ceremony, also the minister, were mounted on horseback, which she recalls, was a quite common custom in those days.

Her father lost his life in the Civil war, and from the age of 14 she made her home with her grandparents. Her grandmother was an expert spinner and weaver, and not only made the cloth, but cut and tailored men's suits complete for \$1.50 per suit, in the days of depression following the Civil war.

Mr. and Mrs. Hampton came to Oregon in 1875 and settled on a farm in the Eola hills where they lived for 15 years. Their children attended the Popcorn school. Mr. Hampton voted for Eola to be chosen state capital, and Mrs. Hampton says if woman's suffrage had been in existence she would have voted too and perhaps been able to tie the ballot!

Coming to Monmouth the Hamptons engaged in hotel business. They lost practically everything at one time in a fire after their insurance had run out less than 24 hours prior to the conflagration.

Mr. Hampton was active for many years here in republican politics. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1921. Mr. Hampton died in 1927, and Mrs. Hampton continues to make her home in Monmouth.
