

VOTERS TO GET IN FINAL WORD

Democratic Majorities are Certain and Two-Thirds Strength Possible

Reed would be hailed as an ominous portent for the G. O. P. Not since the Civil war has Pennsylvania had a democratic senator.

Upton Sinclair, with his socialistic background and his "end poverty" candidacy for the California governorship on the democratic ticket, accounted for the attention focused on the Golden Bear state. Passions aroused by the campaign, dire predictions of what would happen should Sinclair either win or lose, and in the in and out attitude toward him by the national administration and democratic leaders—all this made for such a mix-up that the contest in some sections received more notice even than national aspects.

From dawn in the east until dusk has settled over the Pacific, both the national and local answers are being written in 120,000 polling places.

The house membership is being filled out to 435, two democrats and one republican having been selected in Maine in September along with the reelection of Senator Hale (R). Thirty-four more senators are being chosen now to deal with the mammoth relief, budgetary, social insurance and other problems confronting the session that starts January 3.

Nov. holding only 114 house seats, the republicans have to hold those and pick up 32 more to shut the democrats off from two thirds there. Chairman Fletcher has predicted a gain of 60 to 70 seats, while Farley said there would be no material alteration in their strength of 309 seats. Two thirds is 290.

Senate democratic strength, now 60 seats, would have to be raised to 64 for a two thirds majority. Farley forecast a gain of six at the expense of the opposition.

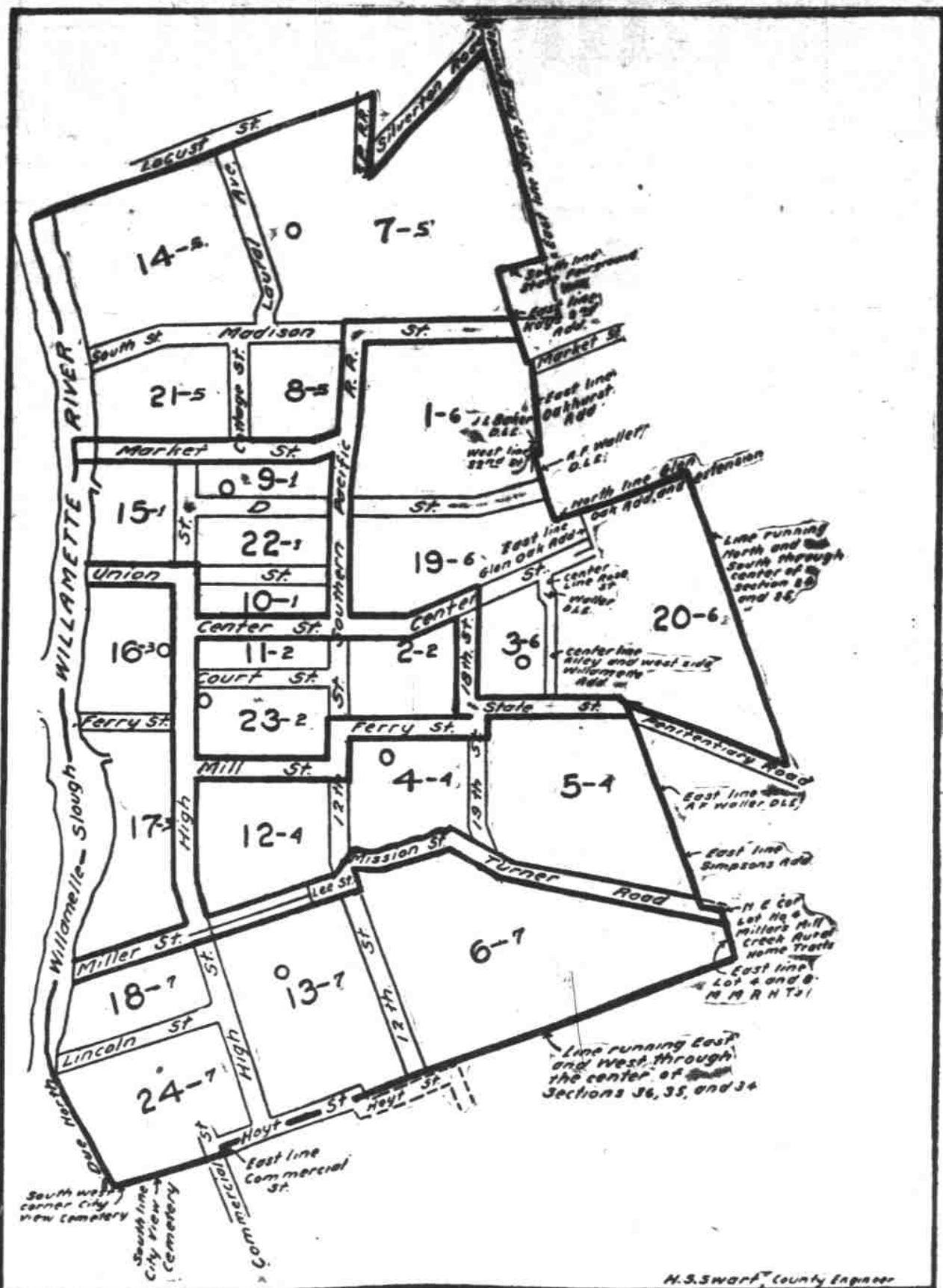

Ranking Aviation Officer Is Killed

GALVESTON, Tex., Nov. 5.—(P)—Lieut. Col. Horace M. Hickam, 49, commanding officer of the third attack group at Fort Crockett, was killed tonight as his 12 attack plane nosed over on making a landing at Fort Crockett airfield.

Colonel Hickam was taken to the United States marine hospital, but was pronounced dead on arrival there. He was ranking officer in the army air corps.

Colonel Hickam, who had been flying locally, was alone when the accident happened. A board of inquiry will determine the reason for the mishap.

A native of Spencer, Ind., Col. Hickam was a graduate of various military institutions, including the war college. He served as commanding officer of the central zone during the operation of the air mail under government service.

Col. Hickam is survived by his widow, a son, John Hickam, student at Harvard university and a daughter, Martha, student at Smith college.

Resume Shipping As Heavy Coast Storm Subsides

ASTORIA, Nov. 5.—(P)—Shipping activity in and out of the Columbia river was resumed today after being halted during a 60-mile-an-hour southwest wind which struck the coast last night.

Monroe, scout executive in this area, who discussed the problem from an angle of the organization, the demands upon the scout officials and the returns to be gained from the work.

Hot Air Measure To Have Hearing

cial success is guaranteed some business regardless of the conditions surrounding those businesses and regardless of how all others are impoverished thereby.

In his final speech on the gubernatorial race, Mahoney, the Klamath Falls mayor, termed former Governor Oswald West the "chief advisor" of General Martin. Mahoney charged West was "on the payroll of both the telephone company and the Morgan Power company."

Mahoney charged "General Martin's interest in Bonneville is a subterfuge" and "is not concerned about fighting for lower light and power rates for the home owners and farmers of Oregon."

He declared that plans "are well under way tonight" whereby Northwestern Electric "and other 'Morgan' companies are seeking to get control of the distribution of Bonneville power."

Mahoney said he mentioned Dunne in his talk because he was asked by some of his supporters if he approved Dunne's stand on Bonneville power.

No confirmation was at hand of rumors that Sam H. Brown, Marion county man defeated for republican gubernatorial nomination in the primaries, had endorsed any candidate. If he had up to Monday night, none of the newspapers had been so notified. He could not be reached at his home by telephone.

FOREST COUNTIES TO GET \$115,431

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 5.—(P)—Forest counties of Oregon and Washington were allotted \$115,431.90 as their share of national forest receipts for 1933. Regional Forester C. J. Buck announced today.

This is a \$30,421.95 increase over the fiscal year of 1932.

Forest counties of the United States receive 25 per cent of the national forest receipts from all forms of use. The plan is, in effect, a transfer of federal funds to the states and counties in lieu of taxes, Buck explained. There are 31 forest counties in Oregon and 25 in Washington.

In addition to the 25 per cent of receipts returned directly to the states and counties, 10 per cent of the receipts are used locally by the forest service for forest road and trail development.

Since the provision was enacted by congress in May, 1908, Oregon counties have received \$2,840,755.66 and Washington counties \$1,844,094, Buck announced.

than 80 per cent of the registered voting list will get to the polls.

The usual last minute optimistic statements came from the headquarters yesterday of the three principal candidates for governor with voters generally discounting these as the propaganda of partisans.

Today a legal holiday in the state, Banks and all official offices will be closed. Business firms, however, will remain open as will schools, election day not being a school holiday in Oregon.

Only registered voters can cast a ballot, the swearing in at the polls practice having been abandoned several years ago in Oregon.

Money for betting was very scarce here yesterday. While some persons talked about placing bets few actual wagers could be discovered. Many persons expressed themselves far too uncertain of election results to know how to bet.

The sheriff's office staff reported late yesterday that election materials were now properly placed with the election boards in each of the 79 precincts in the county.

Courthouse officials said a very heavy rain and a stormy day would hold down the vote materially in this county. They based their judgment on experiences in other years when the weather was bad.
