

BLOODSHED OCCURS OVER NEGRO VOTES

One White Man Killed, Two Wounded; Slaying Few Days Ago Is Cause

HOLLAND, Mo., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Gunmen seeking to prevent negroes voting in today's election terrorized this southeast Missouri town today, killed one white man, wounded two others, beat several negroes and disappeared before state highway troopers arrived.

Almost before the firing had ceased, Grover W. Dalton, chairman of the state republican committee, issued a statement calling the disorders "an outrage and disgrace to the entire state" but "no more than should be expected from the Pendergast-dominated, state democratic machine."

Today's shootings climaxed a series of anti-negro demonstrations which have occurred elsewhere in southeast Missouri in recent weeks, prompted by the slaying of Dave Martin, shell-shocked Sikeston world war veteran, whose body was found in a field. Three negroes, now held in jail at Poplar Bluff for safekeeping, allegedly confessed to the slaying.

Horace Farrow, 36, was shot to death and his father, John E. Farrow, 65 was wounded in an attack occurring in front of Holland consolidated school about 8:30 a.m.

An hour later, Clarence Posey, identified as a well-to-do farmer, was shot but not dangerously wounded as he was driving into town with several negroes to vote. Posey is said to be a republican.

The slaying of Horace Farrow and the wounding of his father, authorities said, was case of "mistaken identity." The Farrow's, officers said, had hired Sampson Brown, a negro, to drive them to Alamo, Tenn., on a business trip, and Edmond Drobie, negro school teacher, was making the trip with them.

As the car containing the Farrow's and the two negroes pulled away a machine containing three men drove up and one or more of the men started firing. The gunmen apparently under the impression the Farrow's had brought the negroes into town to vote.

An hour later, the three men waylaid Posey south of town and started firing. He suffered a scalp wound.

Another report that two negroes had been shot to death near the Arkansas line, investigators said, apparently was untrue.

Fear of Death Makes Child Abductors Work Alone



Digging into musty archives for records of past kidnappings brought to mind by the abduction and slaying of Baby Charles A. Lindbergh, criminologists have been struck by the fact that three of the greatest "snatchings" of the past have been committed by men who worked alone and without accomplices. This, criminologists assert, may be due to the fact that accomplices who might have no objections to participating in the kidnapping of an adult at the same time may decline to take part in abducting a child because its less rigorous health

torists' and pedestrians' safety, and less to overtime parking, or apprehension of minor criminals. It was announced this week.

Pointing out that Oregon is experiencing no crime wave of any magnitude to necessitate a concentrated drive against criminals, and that the state does have an emergency existing in the alarming increase in auto accidents, deaths and injuries, sponsors of the safety campaign are urging the heads of police units to delegate more men to safety work.

One of the state's accident increase, they believe, is that penalties for violation of traffic laws have in general been made heavier, with no corresponding increase in the certainty of punishment.

Delegation of more officers to enforcement of traffic rules affecting safety, such as speeding, school zones, through streets, turns from wrong lanes or without signaling, and other safe-driving requisites, would result in a greater certainty of arrest for violators, and a corresponding decrease in lawbreaking, it was asserted.

Turning right or left from wrong traffic lanes is the specific violation scheduled for attention during the ensuing two-week period of the safety drive. Records show an astonishing number of accidents resulting from this cause, although they generally are less serious than accidents caused by other violations where speed of cars involved may be greater.

FARLEY-SINCLAIR MYSTERY CLEARED

Form Letter System Cause Of Leak Which Caused Embarrassment

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The key to the mystery of Chairman James A. Farley's suddenly withdrawn endorsement of Upton Sinclair came to light today in the shape of a form letter drawn up by the democratic national committee.

This key-letter, sprinkled with blank spaces into which could be dropped names and words to fit all situations, was to have gone to every precinct committeeman in 46 states. Only Maine and Louisiana at first were excepted. Then, suddenly, Farley withdrew his endorsement of Sinclair as democratic candidate for governor of California. Thousands of letters in which his name had been filled in had been prepared. They were left piled on a table in New York democratic headquarters.

One letter, however, had escaped. It came to light in California, signed copies of which finally were sent to 135,000 precinct committeemen in 45 states, bore across its top, just below the masthead of the democratic national committee, the terse instruction:

"Letters to go to all precinct committeemen over the signature of Chairman Farley."
With the exception of Wisconsin, in which reference was not made to the democratic senatorial candidate who is opposing Senator LaFollette, the progressive led-in letters were sent to all the states on the list. Maine was omitted because it had voted; Louisiana because the committee is not on letter writing terms with Senator Huey Long.

In mapping the plans, no exception was made for California. Numerous reasons have been advanced in Washington for Farley's decision not to send the letter. Some said Hiram Johnson was responsible. Others that the White House stepped in.

Still others blamed it on a "dumb stenographer."

DEFENDANTS CLAIM INSULL WAS GUIDE

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Two of the 16 main fraud trial codefendants of Samuel Insull took the witness stand today and asserted that throughout their connection with the Corporation Securities company of Chicago they had been guided by an unwavering faith in the business ability and integrity of Insull.

One, Clarence W. Sills, testified that such was his confidence that he sold his best municipal bonds and invested \$205,000 of his own money in Corporation Securities allotment certificates.

The other, Clarence T. MacNellie, declared that under the same circumstances he would reenact his part in the procedure.

MacNellie and Sills, both of whom were officers in Corporation Securities and in the brokerage firm of Halsey Stuart, were the second and third defendants to take the stand in their own defense.

Alleged "Hiking Bandit" Held By Portland Police

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Herbert B. Bushnell, alleged "hiking bandit," was arrested today and charged with assault and robbery with a dangerous weapon. He was charged with a series of service station holdups in which he forced the operators to walk several blocks from the station in each instance. Police records showed Bushnell had served in both the Oregon and Washington penitentiaries.

CLAIM HAUPTMANN GIVEN 3RD DEGREE

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Bruno Richard Hauptmann's New Jersey defense attorney, Lloyd Fisher, today charged the state with subjecting the Lindbergh kidnapping suspect to "an insidious third degree to harass him and break down his mentality."

A grim, silent guard of state troopers and deputy sheriffs, never fewer than five, stands outside Hauptmann's cell night and day, Fisher declared, never speaking to the prisoner or to each other. When the prisoner asks for something, the attorney said, it is handed to him without a word. When the guard is changed there are at least ten men outside Hauptmann's cell at one time.

Hauptmann ought not to be subjected to any indignity not imposed on other prisoners held under the same charge," Fisher said, indicating he would ask Attorney General David T. Wilents to remove the troopers as guards. Fisher declared the state troopers were part of the prosecution force and should not be allowed continual access to the prisoner lest they question him improperly. "I will consider Mr. Fisher's request for a reduction of Hauptmann's guard when he writes me setting forth specifically the defense's complaint," Wilents said.

Postal Receipts Increase Heavy For Past Month

Receipts for the month of October as announced by Postmaster H. R. Crawford was \$2,504.04 in comparison to October 1933 which was \$16,177.26. Receipts for September 1934 was \$17,146.88.
