SALEM HUNTERS SHOOT FOUR ELK

Returning last week from the heart of the big game territory of eastern Oregon, a quartet of local hunters, including D. H. Mosher, "Bill" Gardner, Joe Painter and Kien Wain, are exhibiting four fine bull elk trophies. Equipped with cardinal red hats, high powered rifles, plenty of ammunition and good luck, the men left Salem Sunday morning, and by late Saturday night had made camp about twenty-five miles from Ukiah.

Monday, the opening day of the season, the Salem hunters were the first to be rewarded with lucky shots. Shortly after leaving camp, Mosher bagged an animal weighing 600 pounds. The antlers had a spread of 43 inches and a height of 54 inches, with six uniform points on each side. While the other animals brought down were not as large as Mosher's they were beautiful specimens.

A discussion on admission requirements occupied the morning meeting. Speakers were H. M. Showman of University of California at Los Angeles; Charles T. Fitts, Pomona college; C. Zander Leshner, University of Arizona; James T. Hamilton of Reed college; and Dr. Merton E. Hill of University of California. The question of managing student help under the federal emergency relief administration program was taken up in the afternoon in a discussion led by J. B. Speer of University of Montana. Ella L. Olesen of University of Idaho led a symposium on scholarship and probation.

The conference will end tomorrow. Charles E. Corbin of College of Pacific at Stockton is president of the association.

PLAY HERE LAUDED BY SRA DIRECTOR

To the real lover of the drama, it makes no difference whether the play is presented in Fourteenth street in New York city or whether in a tiny little theatre like Nelson auditorium in the far west. That, practically, was the sentiment expressed Saturday night at the presentation of "The Importance of Being Earnest" by D. H. Fullerton, SRA instructor from Falls City, who came over from the Polk county town to see how Chemeketa Players, Inc., work.

Fullerton, in making himself known, spoke of wonderful "first nights" at the Fourteenth street theatre when Le Gallienne was making stage history with her Civic Repertory company. For him the glory of the speaking stage has not departed.

From Fourteenth street Fullerton is carrying the torch of drama into the SRA camps of Oregon. He was looking for playbooks for his classes. He had previously visited both city and state libraries for possible copies and was sent to the only group in Salem that represents the legitimate drama, Chemeketa Players, Inc. Every effort to assist him was promised by members of the Salem player group.

Fullerton was well-pleased with the production of "The Importance of Being Earnest," and he plans to bring over a group from his city to see a future play. He is particularly interested in a "family" ticket, and although he is not competing in the Toronto, Canada, "Blessed Event Marathon" for \$500,000, he has a numerous family and could almost give a line party.

ASK OPINION ON CIRCUIT JUDGE PAY

Secretary of State Stadelman, at the request of the Oregon circuit judges, has appealed to Attorney General Van Winkle for an opinion as to whether it would be legal to issue certificates of indebtedness in the amount of approximately \$30,000 to cover the salaries and expenses of these officials during the period October 1 to December 31 of this year. An opinion would be completed early this week.

The 1933 legislative appropriation covering the salaries and expenses of circuit judges was exhausted late in September with the result that these officials have received no salaries or expense money for the month of October. The state emergency board previously was requested to grant a deficiency appropriation to take care of the circuit judges' salaries up to December 31, but this was refused.

In event Attorney General Van Winkle holds that the certificates of indebtedness may be issued, they would be sold in the open market subject to redemption when the 1935 legislature meets here on January 14. Officials estimated that the certificates would draw interest at a rate not in excess of three per cent. Depletion of the circuit judges' fund was due primarily to the refusal of a number of these officials to accept salary reductions in line with the recommendation of the last legislature.

The fund for payment of the salaries of the supreme court justices will be exhausted early in December.

ANNAPOLIS PLACE OPEN, SAYS MOTT

January 5, 1935, a civil service examination will be held to determine eligible applicants for appointment to the U. S. Naval academy at Annapolis, Maryland.

The first congressional district of Oregon will have one vacancy at that academy in 1935. The successful candidate will enter the academy next June. Congressman James W. Mott is anxious that all ambitious young men in the first district, which he represents, have an opportunity to try for this coveted appointment.

Any young unmarried man not less than 16 years of age nor more than 20 years of age on April 1st, may compete.

In order to make the required arrangements it is necessary that the applicant notify Congressman James W. Mott, Washington, D. C., not later than December 5 of his desire to participate in the examination.

RELIEF LOAD GAIN WORRIES OFFICIALS

If the number of persons requiring assistance from the state emergency relief administration in Marion county continues to increase at the rate of the last two weeks, where can the funds be secured to care for all of them? This question is perplexing the relief officials and committeemen here as it is noted that the expenditure for SRA wages last week of \$5754.12 was approximately \$1150 higher than the week previous and the number of men and women employed on SRA projects, 600 in all, was about 200 more than two weeks ago.

While the situation is not exactly alarming, it is causing considerable worry, Glenn C. Niles, county relief administrator, admitted yesterday. He attributed the increase in demand for relief in part to the dwindling of summer occupation savings. Niles plans to go to Portland Tuesday to see what arrangements may be made with the state relief administration to assist this county in carrying its load.

Parent-Teachers Hold Joint Meet With Civic Group

MOLALLA, Nov. 12.—A joint meeting with the Parent-Teachers' association for the purpose of hearing a talk on narcotics was planned Thursday afternoon at the monthly meeting of the Civic club at the Frank Pickett home. Mrs. Kate Adams assisted Mrs. Dicken as hostess. The club also voted \$15 for the purchasing of new books for the library.

Committees for the chrysanthemum show November 22 and 23 were appointed. It was voted to recommend to the city council that effective signs be put up on the streets near the schools to warn motorists to be careful.

Collegians Bust Up Special Train

A number of windows in a special train pulled north through Salem this week were broken by enthusiastic rooters and at least one train door was broken down. It was reported yesterday at the Southern Pacific station. In addition to the students en route to Portland three car seats about the train and tossed a number of seats out of the train. Conductors reported some difficulty in keeping students within bounds. Girls joined with men students in the disturbances.

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RECRUIT WORKERS FOR HOUSING SURVEY

The Better Housing program of Marion county is attracting not only national attention in the general plans for the campaign as outlined by Sheldon F. Sackett, general chairman, but the plan for city housing survey will be used to a large extent in the work to be done in Oregon cities.

Plans for the Better Housing survey, as prepared by C. E. Wilson, manager of the chamber of commerce, are attracting the attention of the state housing committee and Jameson Parker, executive secretary of the Oregon Housing committee, has written for 50 copies of the forms to be used. These will be sent to cities in Oregon putting on the housing survey.

When the 36 workers meet Tuesday at the chamber of commerce for final instructions, each will be given an exact territory on which to make calls to leave housing plans literature and gather information.

The first work of these representatives will begin Wednesday morning, November 14. The Better Housing committee of Salem is asking the utmost courtesy for these representatives, as they will be asked to get a report from every house in the territory assigned, even if the occupant may not be interested in securing a loan for home improvement.

HOME COMING THIS WEEK AT COLLEGE

Almost as large a visitation of Oregon State mothers and dads as of alumni are expected for the annual OSC homecoming celebration Saturday, November 17. The first time special preparation is being made for the entertainment of hundreds of parents at the same time the old grads are back. The Oregon State Dads' club will hold its annual meeting Saturday forenoon. While the mothers will not hold any business meeting, members of the Corvallis chapter are making special arrangements to entertain the many women visitors expected.

Chief sport attraction is the Montana-Oregon State game, but many other events are scheduled including the annual banquet Saturday night which this year is to be in charge of the Dads' club, with Douglas McKay, senator elect from Marion county, and former president of the student body here, as toastmaster.

Kiddle Governor While Meier Out Of State, Plans

Governor and Mrs. Julius L. Meier will leave Portland tomorrow night for San Francisco, visiting in that city until after Thanksgiving at the homes of their two daughters, it was announced yesterday at the state house.

Acting as governor until Meier returns will be Senator Fred E. Kiddle, president of the 1933 Oregon senate who obtains the position by virtue of his office. Senator Kiddle announced yesterday that he would reach Salem on Thursday and assume his duties. Twice during the term of Governor Meier, Senator Kiddle has acted as governor.

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Discuss Project Of Court House Remodel Plan

Some discussion is going the rounds on the courthouse as winter comes on the relief work is needed concerning the complete remodeling project which was drafted by a group of architects last winter. The hasty ending of CWA made completion of the project impossible then. Members of the county court said this week that they had been approached to ascertain their attitude in reviving the project, with part of the funds put up by Marion county and a part raised by the federal government.

As the courthouse remodeling program was outlined by the architects, an expenditure of \$150,000 in labor and materials would have been needed. This sum would provide for extending the recesses in the north and south walls of the present building so at least 25 per cent more floor space would be provided in the building. The interior of the building would be completely rearranged, the jail placed on the present fourth floor, the courtrooms made larger and modern and the entrance to the structure remodeled.

Mill City Hunter Shoots Big Elk

GATES, Nov. 12.—Of great interest to the school children and the group of women present at the school house on Thursday afternoon was the antlered head and hide of a large Elk displayed by Mrs. Engle Johnson of Mill City and shot by her husband last Tuesday near the Idaho line in eastern Oregon. The animal weighed 800 pounds and had a horn spread of 45 inches, with six large points on each antler. The hunting party which went from Mill City on the eastern Oregon trip was composed of Engle Johnson and E. V. Collins, both former residents of Gates and Floyd Crenshaw, Wilbur Chestnut, and Ben Cagle of Mill City. Crenshaw and Cagle both got elk not so large as the one shot by Johnson.

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
