

AGENT WHO GOT DILLINGER DIES

2 Men Arrested Early Today as Suspects; Chief Aide to Melvin Purvis Dies

trail of Dillinger mobmen, had been with their chief when John Dillinger and his elusive killers battered their bullet-slugged way through a troop of federal agents at the Little Bohemia resort in northern Wisconsin last April 22. Nelson, killed for Bohemia slaying.

At that time Agent W. Carter Baum was slain. The department of justice blamed Nelson as the slayer.

Cowley was taken to a hospital in nearby Elgin, Ill., and surgeons performed an emergency operation in efforts to save the life of the ace agent. But they were doubtful as to his chances.

Another agent, apprised of Holli's death, blurted out in the heat of emotion:

Actual Killer of John Dillinger is Revealed

"Damn them! Holli killed Dillinger and now they got him." Previously it had been assumed that either Purvis or Cowley along with Indiana Purvis fired the shots that killed Dillinger.

Federal authorities believed the woman in the car was wounded. The machine sped away after its farewells of death and evaporated in the darkness as all federal agents in the vicinity, sheriff's deputies, state police and police of the suburbs of Chicago joined in the most intensive manhunt since Dillinger was shot down.

Purvis, who was not present at the battle, said he was certain the automobile contained Nelson and reports made by the agents to Washington headquarters corroborated his assertion.

He hurried to the hospital where Cowley was taken and stood in the operating room as surgeons probed for the bullets that struck Cowley.

In Washington Assistant Attorney General William Stanley revealed that a house about 40 miles from Barrington had been under observation, presumably as a Dillinger hangout, and the agents were on their way there when the battle occurred.

the proposed change will be ready for some time, the superintendent indicated.

Faced with the problem of increasing the efficiency of instruction in certain rooms, the board engaged in considerable discussion regarding the teacher tenure law. Members of the board were unanimous that the law was hampering the education of the children in certain rooms where teachers were admittedly incompetent.

Amendment of the existing tenure law, which applies only to Portland and Salem, was discussed as a legislative proposal the local board might favor but no action was taken. Board members expressed the view that the board should be allowed to dismiss teachers for cause and after due notice, with appeal carried to a court, if necessary.

Superintendent Gaiser said preliminary investigation was under way looking to some uniform plan for teacher retirement pensions. He said an actuary had been asked to study costs for a retirement pension plan for the entire system.

The board approved an outlay for equipment for basketball supplies for boys at Leslie junior high school and authorized a \$20 expenditure for twice-a-week bus transportation for the boys during the next two months who will be allowed to use the Parrish junior high gymnasium. The board granted permission to Dwight Adams, Y.M.C.A. physical director, to let the city "Y" league use the Parrish junior high at stated periods during the basketball season.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 27.-(P)-A bright future for the Pacific northwest was painted today with the federal housing program as background.

Bruce A. Wilson, regional director of the federal housing administration, predicted the Pacific northwest is on the threshold of the most tremendous lumber boom in history, with \$900,000,000 available through the country for lumber the next five years.

At a special meeting of the Multnomah better housing campaign Portland's goal in modernization work under the program was set at \$10,000,000. Housing needs of the city are being mapped under a FERA program.

"Out of the dollar spent for modernization work nine cents will go for food, six cents for clothes, four cents for theatres, a fraction over three cents for redemption of war loans strange as that may seem, and 24 cents for taxes and insurance," Wilson said.

Already \$74 loans for an excess of \$148,000 have been made in Portland, it was reported.

HUSBAND-WIFE DUO STIFF COMPETITOR

Spouse Teams Play Strong Game of Bridge, Found by Mrs. W. H. Quinn

(Editor's Note—Husband and wife teams have offered some of the stiffest competition in the Statesman bridge tournament this fall. Some of the inferences which have led them to make slam bids are described by Mrs. W. H. Quinn, director of the tournament, in the following article.)

Two husband and wife teams bid and made seven clubs in the last Statesman tournament, on board four, Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Bernhard, Mr. and Mrs. Max Gunter. I have always contended that a strong husband and wife partnership is one of the most difficult to play against. Out of the ten teams only two reached a grand slam; six teams reached a small slam; and two played the board at a game contract of five clubs.

Slam Bid Facilitates Slam bidding is one of the most fascinating features of contract. Perhaps it is fascinating because it is dangerous. If we lose, we sacrifice a sure game. There are certain situations which are definitely slam inferences. In fact, any strength showing bid should make you consider the possibilities of a slam. Examples of indirect slam inferences are: Forcing take-outs, three no-trump take-outs, raises to game, and any response to partner's opening two-of-a-suit bid, except two no-trump (bust) response.

The direct or strong slam inferences are: The four-five no-trump slam convention, and free bid or response higher than a game contract (except when made to a part pass); an over-call in the opponent's suit by the side that has opened the bidding. This bid naturally guarantees the control of the first lead of the opponent's suit. All of these bids constitute an invitation to partner to contract for at least a small slam. When your partner invites you to a slam this invitation must not be construed as a forcing bid, and yet you should respond if holding a re-bid value equal to about a plus, or better distribution than you have shown up to this point.

JAMES ERVIN RAY LAST RITES HELD

One of Earliest Settlers at Mill City Succumbs to Brief Attack

MILL CITY, Nov. 25.-(Special)-James Ervin Ray, 84, died at his home in Mill City Saturday following a stroke suffered the previous evening. He did not regain consciousness after the stroke. His son, Joe Ray, 44, had been staying with him and caring for him for several months, and was with him at the time of his death.

Funeral services were held from the Weddle funeral home in Stayton Monday morning with burial in the Fairview cemetery on King's Prairie near Mill City, beside the grave of his wife. The services were under the auspices of the Masonic lodge of Stayton of which Mr. Ray had been a member for 49 years.

James E. Ray was among the oldest settlers of Mill City, coming here in 1855 from a farm near Stayton where he had spent the three previous years. For a time after coming to Mill City he lived on a 160 acre farm on the Marion county side of the river. Later he sold his farm and bought on the Linn county side near the high school. Following the death of his wife in 1916, Mr. Ray moved to a residence property here.

He was born October 3, 1850, in Nancy county, North Carolina. In 1868 he married Margaret Jane Harkey, at Springfield, Missouri. They made their home in the east until 1882 when they came to Oregon.

Surviving are four sons. The sons are W. Ray of Independence, Fred Ray of Nevada, Joe Ray of Alsea and Latt Ray of Silet; two daughters, Mrs. Lizzie Perket of Salem and Mrs. Blanche Baker of Independence; and a stepdaughter, Mrs. Maggie Porter of Lebanon. One son, Zeb J. Ray, who was United States marshal of Nevada, dropped dead of heart trouble on July 2, of this year, and another son, Fleet Ray, is supposed to have died in Alaska some 40 years ago although his death has never been certain.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.-(P)-Thirty-six Martin bombers, the fastest airplanes of their type in the world, have been ordered grounded by the war department for an inspection.

All air corps officers who disclosed this information tonight said the order was issued "not because the planes are not safe but because they are so fast and so large they create some problems we have not considered before."

The 36 grounded planes are now at March Field, near Riverdale, Calif., and after some repairs are completed will be flown to Hamilton Field, near San Francisco.

"hot" dish recipes received last week:

Rice Balls
1 lb. hamburger
3/4 cup rice
1 egg
1 quart tomatoes or juice
2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon hot red pepper
Have tomatoes boiling hot. Mix all the other ingredients into balls about the size of a silver dollar and drop into boiling tomatoes. Cook slowly for an hour or until rice is done.

1 lb. hamburger
1 quart strained tomatoes
2 medium onions
1/4 cup salt
2 teaspoons chili powder
Boil macaroni in boiling water and blanch as usual. Melt fat, add onions cut fine. Add meat and brown. Then add tomatoes, macaroni and salt to taste together with chili powder. Bake in over 2 hours or longer. Serves at least 8. It is even better the second day and is fine for large gatherings.

Pollo En Mole
1 boiled chicken
8 slices stale bread
1 cup chili peppers
1 tablespoon salt
few sesame and anise seeds
1 cup chicken broth
1 onion
1 onion
1 tomato
1 bunch of cloves
Fry bread, chopped onion and garlic in fat until brown. Add well pounded sesame and anise seeds. Roast, peel and remove seeds from peppers. Run peppers through grinder, add to other ingredients and put all in a sauce pan with a peeled tomato. Add salt, cloves and peppers to taste. Add chicken broth and when well blended, add the boiled chicken cut in pieces. Heat and serve.

Mexican Chili
1 1/2 pounds of lean beef
3/4 pounds beef suet
4 large Chile peppers
1 onion
1 pint of strained tomatoes
1 pint red Chile beans
1/2 cup salt
Chop the beef fine and brown in the suet. Cook the beans over night, drain and put in cold water until well done. Add beef to the beans and salt to taste. Add Chile peppers (ground fine). Add onion, cut fine, and tomatoes. Let boil five minutes, and stir it constantly. Let mixture stand for 12 hours, reheat and serve.
