ception of firemen and policemen will enjoy a holiday today with their offices closed. The national employment agency and Marion county health department also will observe the holiday.

State Institutions
All Will Celebrate
Special dinners and programs will feature the observance of Thanksgiving at all of Oregon's state institutions.

At the Oregon State hospital 3000 patients and approximately 300 attendants will partake of a chicken dinner at noon. There also will be mashed and sweet potatoes, two vegetables, salads, celery, pickles, bread and butter, several kinds of pies and puddings, coffee, milk and tea. A musical program will be held in the hospital auditorium in the afternoon.

The 865 convicts at the Oregon state penitentiary will sit down to a turkey dinner augmented by all the trimmings. Warden Lewis also has provided a moving picture show to be held during the forenoon. Lewis said that the turkeys required to serve the convicts and guards were raised on the institution property.

Chicken and other meats will be served at the Fairview home, formerly the state home for the feeble minded, where there are 750 charges. An afternoon program also has been arranged at this institution.

Turkey will grace the bill of fare at the state tuberculosis hospital. Other institutions that have arranged special dinners are the Girls' Industrial school, State Blind school, State School for the Deaf, and State Training school for boys.

State officials will scatter for the holiday. Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, will be at his home in Portland. Secretary of State Stedman moved yesterday afternoon to The Dalles to be at his home there for the Thanksgiving time and to see his new granddaughter, born Wednesday morning. Acting-Governor Fred Kiddle will be the only official to stay in the city. Mrs. Kiddle and the senator will not return to eastern Oregon until next week, following the return of Governor Meier.

All state officials will be closed for the entire day.

HAND SHOWS VALUE OF CROSS RUFFING

Only Method Providing Four Tricks When Trumps Well Divided

(Editor's note: An interesting hand played in The Statesman bridge tournament and describing effective use of cross ruffing, is explained below by Mrs. W. H. Quinn, director of the tournament.)

North

Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Newmeyer and Mr. and Mrs. John Farrar were the only couples to bid and make four hearts on the above hand. This hand calls for the cross ruff. The cross ruff consists of refusing to lead trumps so that the trump holding in each hand can be cashed in independently by ruffing first with one hand and then with the other. In this hand South leads the club king, continues with the queen, then the jack, winning all three tricks.

South then shifts to hearts, hoping to prevent the development of ruffing tricks. A low heart is played from dummy, letting this trick come around to East hand, hoping to cover the nine with his ten. Dummy has only three trumps left, so he cannot afford to lead even one round of trumps. All the teams failing to make the four hearts evidently led trumps.

Spade ace is led, followed by another spade which is ruffed in dummy. Diamond ace is returned, followed with a low diamond, which is ruffed in declarer's hand. Next a low spade is led, ruffed in dummy then another diamond ruffed by declarer. You do this once again. At the 13th trick you have left only the ace of hearts which drops the two outstanding trumps.

CODES JUSTIFIED IN HEWITT'S TALK

Frankly stating this nation is abandoning "a whole continent of jurisprudence theories," Roy R. Hewitt, speaking at the Rotary luncheon Wednesday justified the new setups of codes for industry as made necessary under modern conditions. With potential capacity for production vastly increased by automatic machinery, and in agriculture by seed-selection and soil treatment, it is necessary to control industry, since now there is no longer a western frontier to permit expansion from older areas.

Registration, said Hewitt, is better than dictatorship by the individual or the few; and self-regulation by industry permits retention of our concept of government of, by and for the people. Codes permit elimination of unfair business practices, such as false advertising, use of loss leaders to depress prices to producers, race to supply equipment such as bread racks, refrigerators, etc.; too liberal credit and return of merchandise. They are best carried out not by resort to penalty but by education within the industry. They are not to be regarded however as a permanent cure for the evils of industry; but more as an opiate until the patient recovers or succumbs.

President Walter Molloy paid a tribute to Thomas Knight, Rotary member who died Sunday, and the club stood for a brief period in silence out of respect to his memory.
