Lengthy Recommendation is Voted by Committee But Vandevort Demurs

adequate supply of well water probably can be secured for the city, the committee points out that nine of the largest wells in use in Salem have produced approximately 3000 gallons per minute, which would be 4,320,000 gallons per day or 1,000,000 gallons more than the daily average consumption of the entire city for 1932.

The report recites that "one prominent well driller offered in writing to guarantee to secure a supply from wells of 10,000,000 gallons a day for a cost equal to 4 per cent interest for three years upon an assumed cost of \$1,500,000 for the Santiam river project," and that "experience well men looking over the ground give quite positive assurance that water can be secured in substantial quantities on land now owned by the city at the airport without in any way interfering with aviation."

Pumping costs with a well system would be far below the annual charges for interest and depreciation on the Little North fork project, the report declares, "thus making the well not only far cheaper in first cost but also cheaper in annual charges."

Striking at the commission of five engineers and water superintendents which Mayor Douglas McKay has been expected to appoint soon, by council order, to study various water supplies available, the report avers that "the proposed committee of engineers would not carry conviction" and would therefore be a useless expense.

One member of this commission, the report states, would be an employee of the Portland municipal water department which has the competition of at least 100 industrial and other wells.

"It seems hardly fair to ask a competitor of wells in Portland to come to Salem and pass an impartial judgment on the relative merits of wells and mountain water," the report asserts, adding that "the mayor's letter to the Portland city council would seem to leave little room for independent judgment." This letter is one Mayor McKay is reported to have addressed to a Portland city commissioner stating that "some interests are trying to force us to dig wells rather than use the Santiam river."

We need Morrow's (Portland water department official) aid.

Alderman Vandevort said he could not support the majority report because the people had voted in favor of mountain water. He advocated a new election now in public favor.

Not given to worry about the breakdown of the nation, Senator McNary still is of the view that capitalism, as it has been known in the past, is really on trial—that it must be modified to meet the problems of new machinery, of unemployment, of the retirement of old workers, if growing discontent in the nation is to be reduced.

Not another word—only smiles—from the senator regarding talk that he might be a candidate for the republican nomination in 1936. There was nothing to indicate, however, that he would deviate from the policy he announced last summer which was that he would not seek the office.

The senator is in better health than he was when he returned from the last session. Days of rest at his quiet home here have helped. Strict following of physicians' orders have had a part. Moreover, the senator has gauged his work to relieve him from long trips about the state, from speeches, and from political conflict. His activities, while in the state have consisted in carrying on a huge correspondence with his constituents and with political leaders in the east. Delegations from all parts of Oregon have frequently had the senator's ear and his counsel.

Impeccably groomed and as cosmopolitan in manner as any member of the upper house, with the prestige of many years in the senate behind him, the senator can be expected to be a potent member of the new senate, where republicans are so few there will be more than enough committee assignments to go round.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Representative Sol Bloom intends to find out just how come speculators are getting \$50 and \$75 for seats at the Army-Navy football game tomorrow.

The New York democrat was made clear through when he announced today that he would demand a congressional investigation of the whole business of distributing tickets, intimating a few generally and a whole might have to answer some questions.

Members of congress receive two free tickets upon which they must pay a tax. In addition, Bloom said they were permitted to apply for a number of others, paying the regular \$10 price.

"I can't even go myself," he complained. "I had to give my tickets away. You don't suppose I could go and then have some constituent point me out and say: 'No, eh? Well, he got there himself all right.'"

amount of funds raised by the county for road purposes and the expenditures of the money. The four raised road element school fund from \$95,000 to \$96,945, this increase being provided by law since the fund is the amount raised by a two-mill tax on all real property in the county. Three hundred dollars was added to the district attorney's budget to provide for real. 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READING COURSES PROVE BENEFICIAL

2700 Prepared, 90 Per Cent Of Those Taking Them Finish, Reported

Literally hundreds of Oregon persons are enriching their lives through the reading courses started by the state library two years ago to give young people a lift over the depression days. To date, 2700 of these reading courses have been prepared for individuals in all parts of the state, and not only young people but whole families are interested. So Miss Harriett Long, state librarian, told members of the Credit association Friday noon.

Less than 10 per cent of the individuals to whom these courses have been sent have stopped before they completed the study, Miss Long said. Courses most frequently asked for are vocational studies, with right now a surprising number of requests for books and outlines on diesel engines.

Different subjects to number 450 have been sought, and range from accounting to aviation or bulb culture; from Elizabethan literature to hair dressing; from metaphysics to plumbing.

Miss Long finds many CCC and transient camp members seeking these reading courses—which incidentally costs not a cent. She related, as one instance of the human interest stories arising from the project, that a transient camp inhabitant, who a few years ago held a high position in a department of a leading Chicago store, had applied for a state library reading course along lines of his chosen profession. That study helped him to get back on his feet and into the world of paid workers again.

A survey made some time ago among 1750 of the students, showed the following educational backgrounds: 39 had not completed their school education to the eighth grade; 180 had only finished the eighth grade; 190 had been in high school; 530 had finished high school; and 112 had studied some at college.

Miss Long, linking her account of some of the state library work to a brief sketch of the first Thanksgiving, declared that the work of the state library is a cause of Thanksgiving in Oregon today. In October, 30,000 books were shipped to the far corners of the state—all a mail order service which entailed expenditure of about \$450 postage on the part of the eager readers.

than in the same period last year and 41 1/2 per cent more than in 1932. The 1931 11-months total was \$220,723.59.

New construction accounted for \$570 of the month's permit values. It included 13 new houses ranging in cost from \$500 to \$3000, two private garages and a shed. The houses are being built for E. A. McElvain at 571 North 24th street, \$3000; W. A. Cladek at 1740 North 18th, \$2250, and A. F. Glenn at 2060 Turner road, \$600.

Business concerns secured eight building permits for work to cost \$954. These included alterations by the Salem Iron Works, Hog Brothers and six small jobs.

The housing committee's own permit, for renovating the old house on the courthouse lawn at cost of \$2949, was the largest among those for repairs, alterations and re-roofing. There were 13 other such permits for \$100 or more.
