TRANSIENTS TO GET HOSPITAL SERVICES

Physical Examination Will Be Compulsory Reports Supervisor Here

Promising the transient men opportunity to regain lost health or to retain that which he has managed to cling to in his wandering life, the federal transient relief service plans before December to set up a physical examination and hospitalization program at its stations in Oregon. Supervisor R. R. "Bob" Boardman of Hotel de Minto, the local station, reported yesterday. Dr. O. Richard Hess, Portland, state medical adviser for the transient service, is expected next week to set up the health program at this station.

The physical examinations will be compulsory on all men applying for assistance. The Marion county health department will cooperate by administering smallpox vaccinations and taking throat cultures.

Men suffering from maladies requiring emergency treatment will be placed in local hospitals. Those needed extended care during convalescence will be sent to the 100-bed transients' hospital established in Portland.

All transient men and boys who can pass the rigid health examinations and so desire will be sent to the transient relief camps. The young ones will go to the Clackamas river camp where they will undergo schooling until they can be sent back to their homes or to other permanent locations. The older men will be taken to the Santiam camp above Mehama. The latter camp, having a capacity of 230 men, now has 125 working there.

Malnutrition is the most serious ailment with which the transient men and boys are afflicted, according to Boardman. Then there are a host of common minor ailments and the ever present danger of pneumonia.

A full time male nurse already has been employed to supervise the hospital room at Hotel de Minto in line with the new program. The health set up here was authorized recently by Clarence W. Reynolds, state director of transient relief.

POLK COUNTY LEVY UNDER 1934 FIGURE

Committee Agrees Upon Tax \$67,985 Less Than That For Current Year

DALLAS, Nov. 30. — Polk county's tax levy for 1935 will be \$67,985.96 less than the levy for 1934 according to the budget for next year as agreed upon at the public hearing here this morning. The levy for 1935 will be \$265,336.40, which is \$30,432.19 less than the proposed budget published several weeks ago.

Actual figures on the state tax and elementary school fund were considerably lower than the estimated figures shown in the tentative budget and accounted for a reduction of over \$10,000. The reduction on the state tax was \$30,053.39, and the elementary school fund was lowered \$1026.80.

The other outstanding cut in the budget was in the item for indebtedness in the general fund, which was cut from \$40,000.00 to \$20,000.00. Other cuts in the budget were: engineer's office, \$100; indigent soldiers, \$300.00.

Items covering the motor vehicle fund were changed to conform with the actual figures but these did not change the levy, as they were shown both in the budget and in the receipts for the coming year. The amount set for the motor vehicle fund was \$24,908 in place of the original \$20,000 which was shown in the tentative budget.

There was considerable discussion regarding the salaries of the sheriff's deputies but this resulted in the items remaining as they were. A motion was adopted to require the county school superintendent to publish a statement of the receipts and disbursements of his office in the county newspapers.
