

CALL DISSOLUTION BALLOT AT SCHOOL

Vote Sailed for Plainview; Holub Reports Hay Prices Fair

SCIO, Dec. 6.—The Plainview union high school district, composed of three districts south of Scio, is to vote on dissolution December 20. F. A. Gallegly, high school principal here, taught his first term in Linn county there.

Degree work was conferred upon three candidates at the K. P. hall Tuesday night, following which refreshments and a social hour were enjoyed. District Deputy William Russell of Lebanon officiated in the capacity of his station in the order. Several other Lebanon members were in attendance.

Anton Holub, who was in from Ione, this week on business, stated that conditions in his section of the state were encouraging, in that fair prices are being realized for hay and grain and stockmen have ample feed for the winter for livestock. Mr. Holub irrigates one of his farms in Morrow county and harvests three crops of alfalfa from the land. Best baled alfalfa sells at \$10 to \$12 per ton. Buyers from the Salem region and elsewhere in the Willamette valley have been purchasing hay in that part of the state. Joe Holec has leased the Anton Holub 13-acre tract near the J. F. Wesely home south of Scio and will occupy same as soon as convenient.

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MOTHER EMMA'S CALUMET HARVEST CAKE

(3 egg yolks)

2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour	1/4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
2 teaspoons Calumet Baking Powder	2 egg yolks, unbeaten
1/2 teaspoon salt	1/4 cup milk
1/4 cup butter or other shortening	1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg yolks, beat well. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla. Bake in greased pan, 8x8x2 inches, in moderate oven (350° F.) 45 minutes or until done. Spread boiled frosting made with brown sugar on top and sides of cake.
