

## CHESS STAR WINS 18 BUT LOSES ONE

Arthur Duke Plans 20 Men  
in Exhibition Match;  
Clubmen Look On

Playing 20 at one time, youthful Arthur Duke of Portland, professional chess wizard who represents the United States in international competition and who has played all over the world, in his game with the Salem chess club at the Saint Paul Episcopal church last night, defeated 18, tied one, and lost to one local man.

He not only played the entire group at once but played two of them with his back to the board and had a monitor call the plays to him; he lost to Cecil Edwards and won from Kenneth Dalton. This is Edwards' second win over the chess pro for last year he was one of the four who defeated the wizard out of the 22 he played. Last year Edwards, LeRoy Ledgerwood, Rev. H. M. Gross and E. E. Amsden won.

Playing to a crowd of about 75 chess enthusiasts and others, he put on an exhibition of great chess ability and showed marvelous powers of memory.

George Swift, Alfred Laue, LeRoy Ledgerwood drew, Cecil Edwards won one blindfold match while Kenneth Dalton was defeated in the other.

Duke played six of the tuberculosis hospital chess club yesterday afternoon in a friendly game and won all six. About 50 witnessed this match.

## PINE TREE SOURCE OF SYNTHETIC SILK

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—(P)—Synthetic silken yarn from southern pine trees—the first ever made—was shown here tonight with announcement of the discovery of a process through which the pine forests of the south can be made to clothe the world.

The making of artificial yarns from southern pines has been a goal of chemists and a commercial dream for years. The supply in southern forests is inexhaustible, and literally large enough to meet all the needs of the human race for clothing.

Eager efforts were made to tap this cellulose source because it was expected to be more economical, and tonight's announcement quotes basic material cost prices half of those of current markets.

The yarn, a shining white skein, was exhibited at a dinner at the chemists club here in honor of Dr. Charles H. Herly, of Savannah, Ga., discoverer of the process; Francis P. Garvan, president of the chemical foundation which has been backing the research; and Morris Poucher, a famous chemist.

The silken white stuff was made from Georgia slash pine and Georgia loblolly. The trees were converted at Savannah into a bleached sulphite wood pulp.

## WATERFRONT FIRE DAMAGE IS HEAVY

PORTLAND, Maine, Dec. 6.—(P)—Fires swept a 300-yard stretch of the waterfront today, destroying two wharves, and damaging several small vessels, entailing a total loss estimated by officials at \$200,000.

A woman and four men on board the schooner yacht Coronet owned by the Holy Ghost and U. S. society, a religious sect, leaped into the harbor when flames broke out on a wharf to which the craft was moored. They were rescued by four men on a rowboat.

The mast and the port side of the Coronet were scorched by the heat and its lifeboat was burned.

Three of the rescuers suffered injuries.

## WISH PLAYS LARGE ROLE SAYS HEWITT

That wishes are probably the greatest force in shaping the lives of men and women was one of many interesting statements made Thursday night at the session of the social psychology section of the Salem Arts league by R. E. Hewitt, psychology lecturer, held in the auditorium of the Salem public library.

He declared that wishes determine attitudes of mind and that these attitudes in turn develop into habits. By discovering what a man's wishes are, he avers, the key to his character is revealed. Also, by knowing what things prevent the satisfaction of his wishes, one can predict how the person will react.

Active wishes develop tension while wish satisfaction results in relaxation, he explained, and these were active factors in the life goals toward which men worked. A few of the strong wishes explained were that for security, for adventure, recognition, and love. These were shown to have deep significance in every day lives of men and women, and was especially interesting for persons interested in personal development.

On the third Thursday in December, Mr. Hewitt will discuss: "Wish Frustration and Personality Development."

Real property taxpayers in Salem will have to pungle up a few more dollars in 1935 than they did this year, a compilation of the various budgets which affect city taxpayers reveals.

The aggregate of city, school district No. 24 and county budgets is \$1,255,597 for next year compared to \$1,246,182 for the current year.

## RAILROADS TO HAVE SAY, DIFFERENTIAL

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—(P)—George J. Hall, interstate commerce commission examiner, today interpreted the commission's grain rate ruling affecting the Columbia basin, as meaning the railroads would be permitted to choose whether to maintain the differential previously prescribed for Portland under Seattle.

In tables accompanying the report, the commission set the rates for points south of the Snake river on a differential basis making rates two cents a hundred pounds higher to Seattle than to Portland.

Under Hall's interpretation, the carriers will not be forced to use the differential but may equalize the rates to the two ports. Regardless of whether the carriers use the differential or equalize rates to the two cities, Hall said, they must apply the rate used to points on the Northern Pacific Camas Prairie railroad from Pasco, Wash., to Stitts, Grangeville and Headlin, in Idaho, inclusive.

In the table accompanying the report, the commission listed rates from 27 points south of the Snake river to Portland and Seattle. In each case, the prescribed rate of the commission, which under Hall's interpretation, will not be binding on the carriers, was 3 cents a hundred pounds cheaper to Portland than to Seattle.

## BLACKIE THOMPSON SLAIN BY OFFICERS

AMARILLO, Tex., Dec. 6.—(P)—Irvin "Blackie" Thompson, notorious bank robber and killer and escape from the death house in the Texas penitentiary, was shot to death in a gun fight with Amarillo officers about 12 miles east of Amarillo tonight.

Three carloads of officers engaged Thompson in a fight after having chased him out of the city and punctured a tire on his car with a chance shot, forcing him to stop.

Thompson's body was riddled with machine gun, rifle and pistol slugs. His right leg was broken and his left arm was nearly shot off at the wrist. One bullet entered his forehead just over the left eye.

## Stokowski Quits As Baton Wayer, Noted Orchestra

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 6.—(P)—Leopold Stokowski resigned tonight as music director of the Philadelphia orchestra.

Effective December 26, the Polish maestro will leave after 22 years the orchestra he built into

one of the foremost musical institutions in the world.

In an open letter to the board of directors, Stokowski outlined two major reasons for refusing the new contract offered him:

1. Inability of the board of directors to select in time to allow for preparing the coming season's plans a successor to Arthur Johnson as executive director.

2. "Deep-lying differences" with the board.
