breadth last summer, when Mussolini intervened in the Austrian uprising. Italy and Austria are sworn friends, and Austria and the Little Entente do not love each other. Hungary and Italy are very friendly and while Austria and Hungary have not been making violent protestations of affection, signs of hostility have been lacking. France (friend of the Little Entente) and Italy (playing the other side) long have had striking differences. One thing is certain—England won't take a hand in another European war unless she is dragged in by the neck.

FORMER LA GRANDE OFFICIAL RELEASED

Mrs. Emma M. Fowler, formerly city treasurer of LaGrande for the last three years and five months a prisoner at the Oregon penitentiary, yesterday received her parole and freedom. She was found guilty of embezzling city funds totaling more than \$100,000. The parole came two months after she had served the minimum sentence of three years and three months which, under her 10-year term, entitled her to consideration for parole. Members of the parole board said she had been a model prisoner.

The parole of Mrs. Fowler was said to have been approved by several prominent residents of Union county. Under the terms of the parole she is not to re-enter Union county. The embezzlement of funds occurred over many years and was not discovered in the annual audits of the city. Bondsman for Mrs. Fowler paid the city the limit of their liability but the shortage was so large a default occurred two years ago in the payment of the city's bond obligations. Bondholders have this week started court action to compel the city to levy a tax sufficient to pay its bonds.

VETERANS IN FAVOR OF BONUS PAYMENT

The sentiment of local veterans of the world war is in favor of immediate payment of the last half of the bonus, a checkup of a score of members of the local legion past, revealed yesterday. More than that, most of the veterans think the next congress will pay the bonus.

The sentiment prevailing is that the veterans are owed the money and that they should be paid since congress is handing out money to any number of persons who have no legal claim against the government. Sentiment is unanimous among veterans that the charge of four per cent interest to them on bonus loans made three years ago is unfair and should be stopped by congressional enactment.

Lunde Files Suit Claiming Default

DALLAS, Dec. 7.—N. A. Lunde filed a complaint here today against R. J. Ferguson, at ux, in which he seeks to recover property that the defendant contracted to buy from him. He alleges that the defendants have violated their contract by neglecting to pay the taxes for six years and by neglecting to keep up the payments on the property. The plaintiff seeks a judgment for \$540 with interest, \$44.65 with interest, and \$75 attorney fees. The plaintiff also asks for a decree that the defendants be required to make good their default within 30 days from the date of the decree or the property will revert back to the plaintiff.

POST BELIEVES HE SET RECORD AGAIN

BARTLESVILLE, Okla., Dec. 7.—(AP)—Wiley Post made his second hop toward the stratosphere in the remodeled monoplane Winnie Mae today and landed with the belief he had set a new altitude record around the 55,000 foot level.

"I went higher than I did last Monday by 4000 to 7000 feet," the globe flier said, after bringing the Winnie Mae to a perfect landing downward with a dead stick.

This would indicate he soared 55,000 to 57,000 feet. Examination of his barographs after Monday's flight indicated he reached some 50,000 feet.

Post landed at Phillips airport at 4:02 p. m. (Central Standard Time) after 2 hours and 26 minutes aloft.

"I'm all right," he remarked. "It wasn't bad."

Childing nerves aides helping to divert him of his cumbersome "stratosphere diving" suit, Post said "you fellows are more nervous than I am," holding out his hands to prove it.

The present altitude record of 47,352 feet is held by Lieut. Renato Donati of Italy.

The barographs will be sent to Washington for calibration, which will require probably two days.

County Attorney to Take Lead In Foreclosures

District attorneys in each county are to take the lead in foreclosing delinquent taxes for 1930 and prior years, J. E. Neet, deputy in the sheriff's office, said here yesterday after his return from a conference in Portland with tax collectors from various parts of the state.

However, county courts must name the official paper in which the foreclosure notices are to be printed and they must provide funds for the foreclosure costs. Thus the county courts can block the foreclosure proceedings if they wish.

Neet said the tax collectors found that many courts were unwilling to proceed with foreclosures at this time and opined that some legislative amendment to the existing foreclosure laws would be needed before the majority of counties in the state would clean up their back rolls.
