WINTER RANGES IN OREGON HELD FAIR

Winter ranges and pastures in western states are, generally in very poor condition, though these conditions are varied and the past month has brought some improvement, according to the range and livestock report for December 1 issued by the federal department of agriculture.

In Oregon, Washington and California, there is ample feed to carry livestock through the winter and present conditions promise a surplus of hay unless unusual adverse weather occurs shortly. Range and feed conditions have made a slight improvement in eastern Texas, Utah, Nevada, central Kansas, central Oklahoma, parts of Montana, and western Wyoming, but range and feed conditions are still far below normal in these areas, the report says.

The specific comment for Oregon says: Ranges are now generally in a very good condition, having made a remarkable improvement during the rains and favorable weather during November. Livestock have gained rapidly and are now generally in a normal condition. A good winter supply of hay and feed is generally on hand except in the central, south, and eastern areas, where poor feed has resulted in a material reduction in livestock numbers.

Jones Will Discuss Planned Economy At School Tonight

An address on "Planned Economy," to which the public is invited, will be delivered to the SERA adult class in government and economics by Professor W. C. Jones of Willamette university at Salem high school at 7 o'clock tonight, it was announced yesterday by T. T. Mackenzie, Salem public school vocational director. Mackenzie said the class would move to the auditorium if the crowd warranted it.

The present term for the adult classes will close December 20. Present indications are that a new term will open on or near January 7 with possibly some variation in courses offered.

BONUS COMMISSION COLLECTIONS GAIN

Collections by the state veterans' commission are 22 percent ahead of 1933 for the last four months and 16 percent ahead for the period of the year to date over last year, the full field force of the commission was told here yesterday at its annual meeting. Rental income from property owned by the commission has gone up from \$5500 a month to \$11,000.

Operations of the commission in handling its loans and properties were thoroughly canvassed at the meeting, presided over by Jerrold Owen, secretary of the bonus commission. Other speakers included Don Young, counsel for the commission; Onas Olson, chief clerk; A. J. Olson, in charge of property management; E. B. Hamilton, in charge of SERA work on commission property of group of whistling numbers.

A harmonica band from the 5-A and sixth grades will play and a quartet made up of sixth grade girls will sing. Pupils of the sixth grade will present a health playlet.

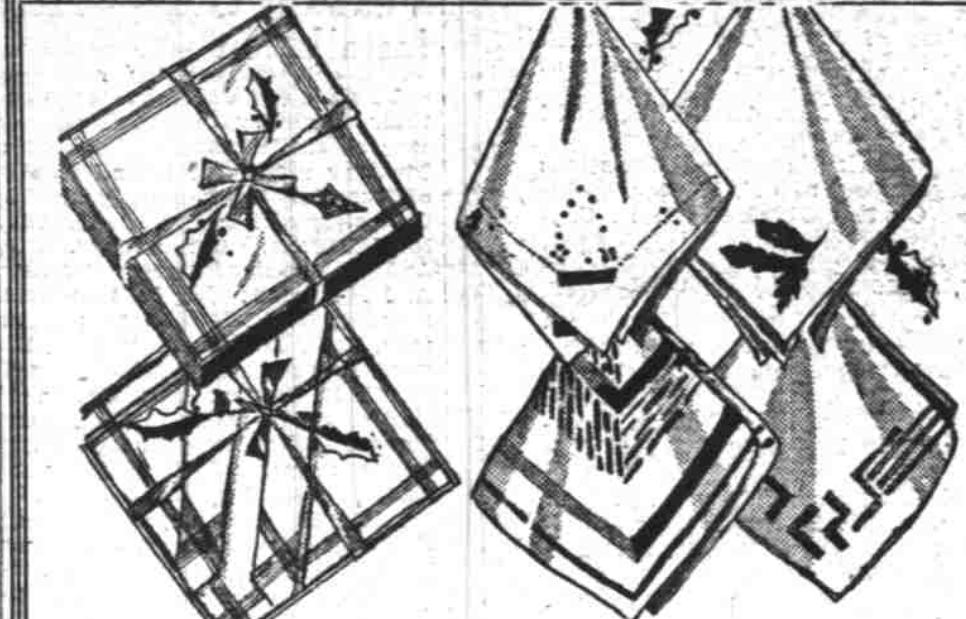

Harry Riches, county agent, directed the meeting and Roger Morse, dairy specialist from the state college and Dr. W. H. Lytle were among the speakers. Others were present from Portland.

Some of the dairymen signified their willingness to voluntarily have their cattle tested for the disease. It was explained that the first test would be given free and that some reimbursement for the cattle, should they have the disease, would be made.

Speakers stressed the importance of stamping out the disease. Committees were appointed to hold meetings in the various rural communities.
