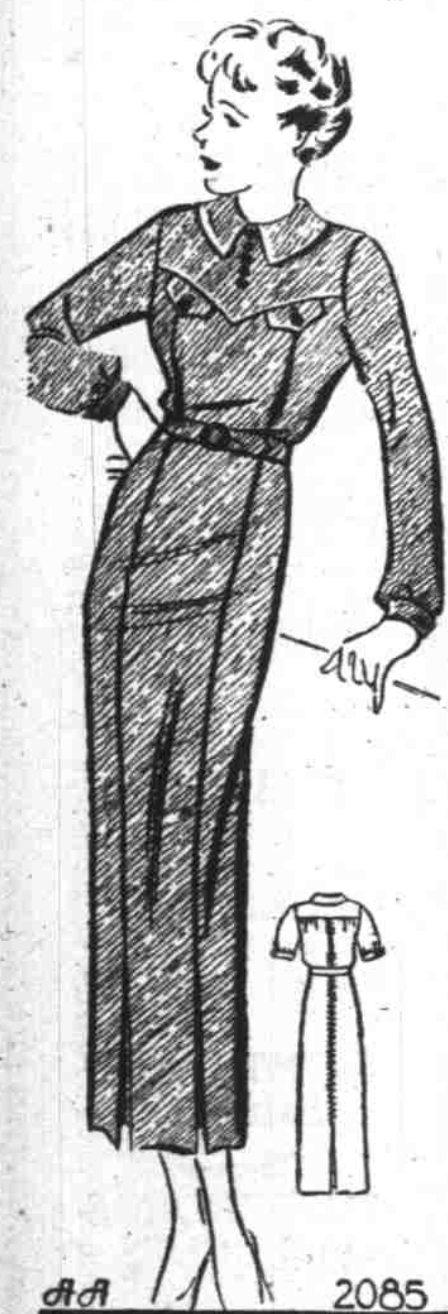

Contest Closes Today at 12 for Dressing Ideas

Today at 12 o'clock the contest for dressing recipes closes and judging will take place this afternoon. Winners of the three cash prizes will be announced Friday morning together with a new topic for next week.

Any kind of meat that is prepared with dressing is also included in the topic. If the dressing is for fowl, roasting directions need not be included but if for cut meat, please describe the entire process.

Concluding the pie series are the following:

A Man's Pie

1 unshaped pie shell
1 can pineapple (broken slices)
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup pineapple cornstarch
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup syrup
Drain syrup from a large can of pineapple, adding water if not sufficient to make one cup. Mix with sugar and cornstarch and cook for 5 minutes or until mixture is clear. Add pineapple sliced in small cubes and mixed with the eggs well beaten and the butter. Turn into crust and bake. When crust is done cover with meringue made of whites of three eggs and three tablespoons of powdered sugar. Brown lightly in oven and cool in warm room to avoid the meringue "beading." This makes a large pie serving six or seven people.

Dried Prune Pie

1/4 cups crushed prunes (cook thoroughly before crushing)
1/4 cups sugar
1/4 cup melted butter
2 egg yolks
Pinch of salt and sprinkle of mixed spices
Bake with one crust of any good pastry.
For meringue beat egg whites stiff and dry. Add 2 tablespoons of sugar of each egg white gradually, beating constantly. Finally 1/4 teaspoon of vanilla. Pile high on top of baked pie and brown in a slow oven for about 15 minutes.

Orange Crust Cream Pie

Crust:
1 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup cold water
1/2 cup cold milk
1/2 cup cold cream
Mix flour and salt. Cut in shortening, mixing with a knife and slowly add the orange juice until a stiff dough forms. The exact amount of liquid required varies. Add rind. Roll out dough and fit into pie pan. Prick well on sides and bottom. Bake 15 minutes in moderate oven. Add filling.

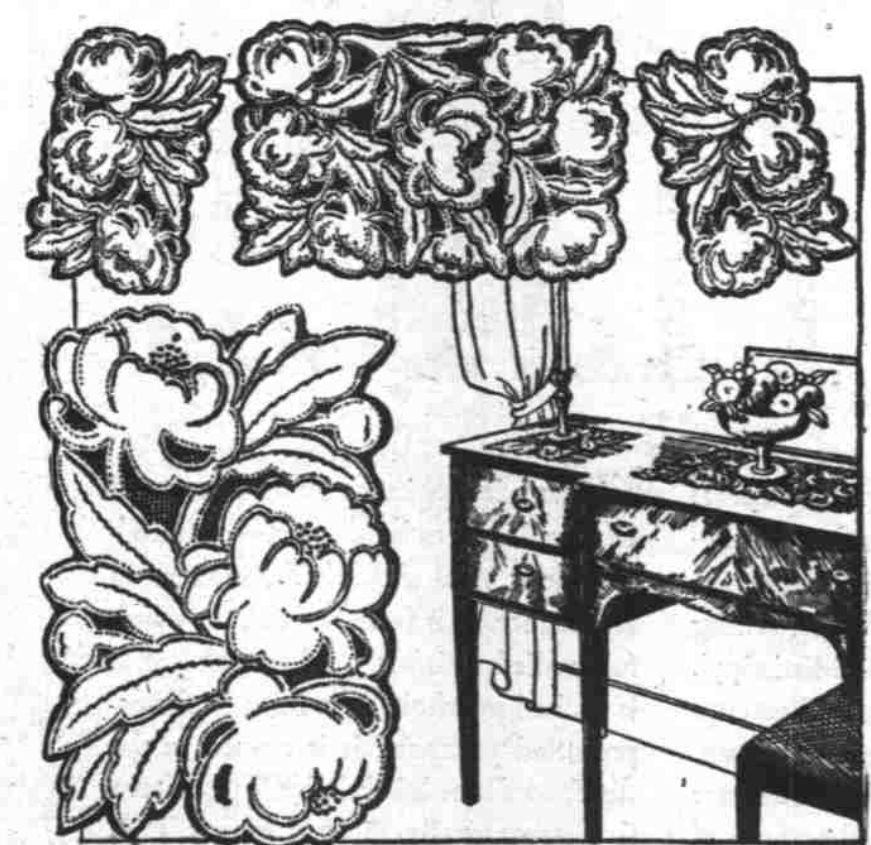
Filling

1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 egg yolk
1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind
1/2 cup cold water
1/2 cup cold cream
Beat egg yolks. Mix sugar and flour. Blend all ingredients except marshmallows. Cook until thickened. Fold in marshmallows cut in small pieces. Cool. Place in baked pie shell.
