FREEZING WEATHER STRIKES, FLORIDA

New deaths and further damage were reported Wednesday as winter cracked down on the eastern half of the nation.

As fires and accidents claimed additional victims in the north, unofficial surveys indicated virtual destruction of all tender truck crops and extensive damage to citrus had resulted from the icy weather which swept semi-tropical Florida. In many sections of the state, thermometers ducked to all-time December lows and freezing weather was slated to return to some districts overnight. A plea for governmental assistance to growers was dispatched from some children in the Miami area were given a holiday from unheated schools. St. Petersburg, Tampa and Jacksonville had experienced the unusual sight of snow flurries.

ALL BOSTON SHOW HOUSES GUARDED

BOSTON, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Police stood guard over every Boston theatre tonight and many others throughout New England while every energy was being directed toward apprehension of terrorists who early in the day exploded bombs in four motion picture places.

No one was injured in the explosions, which occurred in two Boston theatres, a Lynn theatre and a theatre in Pawtucket, R. I., causing thousands of dollars damage.

Police were satisfied a carefully laid plot was behind the bombings, but they could find no connection between the bombings and a fire in a Somerville theatre. They attributed the fire to faulty wiring.

Labor Relations Board Goes Over Richberg's Head

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Over the protest of Donald Richberg, the labor relations board today reaffirmed its decision that it could take original jurisdiction in newspaper labor disputes.

The board again ordered the San Francisco Call-Bulletin, a William Randolph Hearst interest, to reemploy Dean S. Jennings, a rewrite man, who claimed he was forced to resign because of his activity in the American Newspaper Guild.

Steamship on Fire Off Florida Coast

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 12.—(AP)—A fire in her hold, the steamship Panatlantic made for port here tonight after requesting the coast guard to stand by for emergency service if needed.

Coast guard headquarters here said cutters from here and the Fort Lauderdale base were ready to give any assistance needed but that so far the Panatlantic had not called for help.

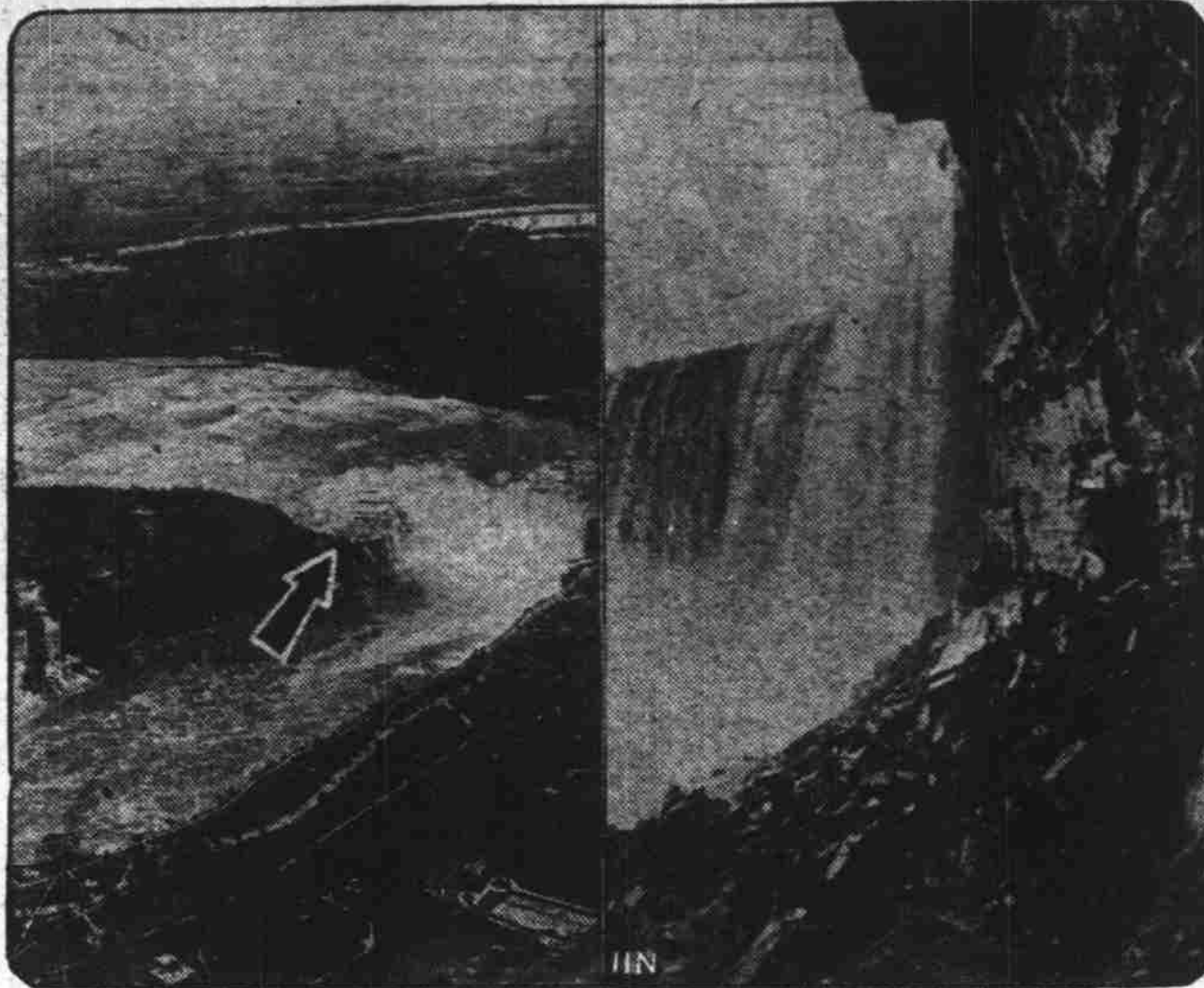

SCORPION DEVOURS WIDOW SPIDER, SAY

Lusk, Wyo., has developed a challenger to the black widow spider in the person of a northern scorpion recently sent to C. L. Corkins, state entomologist at Cody, Wyo., for identification.

The scorpion vanquished the widow in 10 minutes, Corkins reported in a news story which reached Mrs. Earl Grim of Turner and which was forwarded by her to this paper.

Corkins reported that the scorpion readily put away two black widow spiders in succession, stinging them so severely death resulted shortly. He turned cannibal after killing the second one and proceeded to eat it.

Corkins described the scorpion as about the same size as a black widow spider, with a long, narrow abdomen at the tip of which is a stinger. The scorpion was reported to be slow in movement.

According to Mrs. Grim's information, citizens of Lusk and of Cody, Wyoming, are ready to enter the scorpion in a match with the much-publicized black widow spider of Butte, Mont., which vanquished a tarantula in mortal combat.

Corkins further reported that the black widow spider is a native of Wyoming and has always been present there. He said weather conditions during the year have increased the number of the spiders while newspaper publicity has sent hundreds of people looking for them.

END OF NAVAL TALK NEARING, FORESEEN

LONDON, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Great Britain today decided it was no use to continue further tri-power naval talks going on here for months. The United States agreed. Adjournment before Saturday was expected.

Thereby the big question as to whether there shall be any limits set on navies in the future—and the bigger question of the peace of the Pacific—were put squarely up to Japan.

Unless Tokyo surrenders her demand for full naval parity, instead of the short end of the 5-5-3 ratio assigned her under the 1922 Washington treaty, American quarters consider it highly doubtful that the conversations can be fruitfully renewed.

S. T. White Urged, Gehlhar Successor

Solon T. White, county agent in Yamhill county with headquarters in McMinnville, is being urged as a candidate to succeed Max Gehlhar as director of the state agricultural department. It was learned here yesterday.

White is an Oregon State college graduate and for seven years has been active in farm work in Yamhill county.

19 DRINKERS HELD, PORTLAND CHECKUP

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12.—(AP)—The district attorney today ordered 19 alleged denatured alcohol drinkers held as material witnesses in connection with last weekend's poisoned alcohol tragedy, which claimed 22 lives.

Most of the victims recovering from the lethal drink, while others are known users of the so-called "dehorn" police stated.

Those who do not post the \$1,000 bail set for each will be paid \$150 a day witness fee, it was revealed.

No new deaths have occurred the past two days, but six still are under hospital care.

Solomon Miller and Irving Schwartz, druggists, have been charged with involuntary manslaughter for allegedly selling to some of the victims the denatured alcohol which investigators said was more virulent than the formula which "dehorn" addicts regularly drink.

70 Per Cent of Seed Loans are Repaid, Report

Collections are coming in fairly well on 1933 seed loans made by the government, Ira Hyde, in charge of the work, reported yesterday. Hyde said that 70 per cent of the seed loans made in 13 counties in western Oregon had already been collected with the bulk of the remainder secured by mortgages on crops yet unmarketed.

He said the emergency seed loans of 1933 totaled \$250,000. Loans this year were cut \$40,000. About 100 loans have been made this fall, Hyde reported.

ABORTION CONTROL PROGRAM SOUGHT

Government Urging Dairy-
men to Sign up for Herd
Inspection Plan

A thorough-going inspection of dairy herds in this county with the view of eliminating contagious abortion is being sought by the federal government. Inspection is not compulsory but is desired. Dairy men seeking to have their herds inspected must sign an agreement and stay by it.

"Most dairy men are anxious to have their herds free of this disease and the only way it can be combatted is to have the animals showing reactions to the tests, slaughtered," explains County Agent Harry Riches. "It is a splendid time for a concerted effort on the part of all dairy men since they will get the amount received from slaughter and a maximum of \$20 on grade cows from the government. Where the cows show a reaction they must be slaughtered within 30 days following tests."

Local interest has been heavy with crowds turning out at the meetings at which the program was explained. While no accurate check has been made on those who have already signed the agreement, it is expected that a very large percentage will join up.

Meetings in Marion county have been attended by Dr. Sam Foster of Portland, who is in charge of the program; Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian; Roger Morse, dairy specialist with the state extension service, and Mr. Riches. Morse explained the disease and conditions under which it thrived and how it might be combatted. Foster explained the agreement and how those taking advantage of federal aid must sign, and Dr. Lytle discussed accreditation for requirements of an accredited herd.

Committees were appointed at each of the meetings. Woodburn, Silverton, Mt. Angel and Jefferson so that those interested might get applications.

LAUGHLIN PROPOSES END, BOYS' SCHOOL

Putting juvenile cases under circuit judges and having an adequate probation staff would permit the closing of the boys' training school, was the opinion expressed by Sam Laughlin, superintendent of the state school near Woodburn, in a talk at Rotary club yesterday. The plant could be used as a detention home while cases were being examined and disposed of. That his parole system was proving successful was proven, he said, by the fact that there were only 12 violations the past year, out of several hundred on parole. The population of the school now is 80 boys.

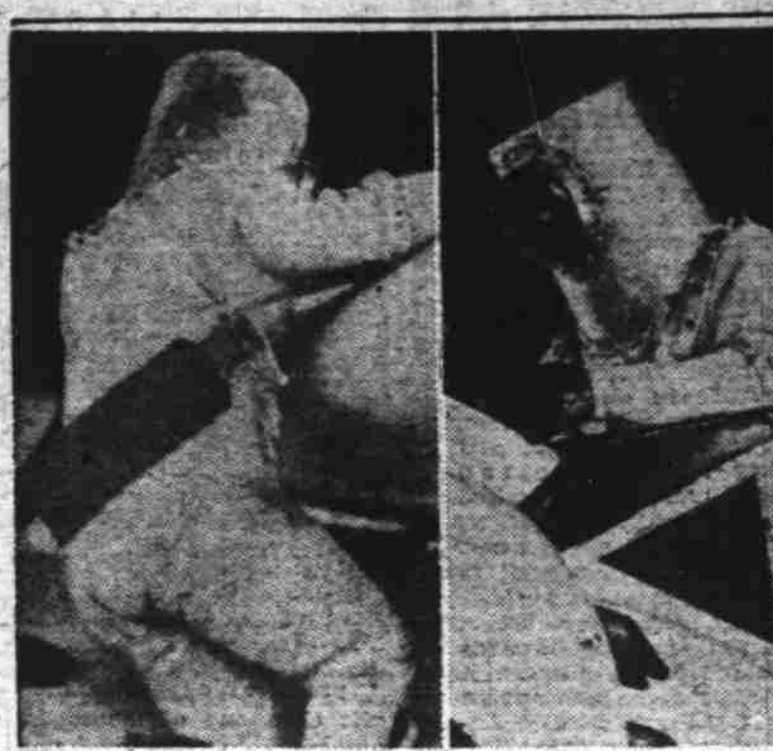
Under present conditions mechanically-minded boys do not have the chance to get jobs as formerly, so the school is training boys more in agriculture with the idea of making them able to support themselves on farms. Idleness is the great cause for delinquency, stated Laughlin. Now there are boys who leave homes in order that their share of food may be enjoyed by others in the family and they may not be a burden on the father.

With Laughlin were several boys, all of them from homes where parents were employed on relief jobs. They were bright lads who were given a greeting by Rotarians.
