BOSTON, Dec. 20.—(P)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Occasional sales were being closed on 64s and finer domestic wool. Fine 64s and finer strictly combed 64s and finer fleeces brought 27-28 cents in the

grass. Territory lines of similar grade bulk average French combed in original bags moved at 67-70 cents a score basis, while lines consisting of short French combed and clothing staple sold at 63-65 cents. Some graded bulk French combed 58s, 60s, 1/2 blood territory wools sold at 63-70 cents a score basis.
