

BEARCATS PLAY GILL'S QUINTET

Wild Shooting and Passing Worries Keene; Likely Starters Listed

With "Spec" Keene worrying hard over the seeming inability of his basketball squad to score baskets and refrain from throwing the ball out of bounds, the Bearcats will enter their first collegiate tilt of the year tonight when they play the Oregon State Beavers on the Corvallis floor at 7:30 o'clock.

Although considerable improvement has been noted in the Bearcat hoopers since Pade's trimmed them 37 to 24 Monday night, Keene has not yet been satisfied by the work of any of the numerous combinations he has tried.

Against the Orangemen Jim Burdett and Bill Lemmon, both senior lettermen, will probably take the forward berths. Lemmon is one of the fastest men on the squad and the best scorer, but has been doing a lot of bad passing. Burdett, a whiz on shots under the basket when he is "hot," is a steady player.

Don Brandon, sophomore, will probably start at center. Brandon has developed into a good pivot man and is also a good shot.

Kenneth Manning and George Erickson will probably see the starting action in the guard positions. Manning, a letterman, has been improving rapidly lately and will probably see a good deal of play this year.

Chiff Folen will probably get the jumping post on the Beaver lineup. Injuries to Earl Conking and Wilbur Kidder will make Coach "Slats" Gill rather short on centers.

George Hibbard, two-year veteran, is expected to hold down one of the Orange forward posts with Morie Taylor, also a letterman, taking the other offensive position. Mose Lyman and Fred Hill, both lettermen, will handle the starting guard assignments.

The Bearcats will play the University of Oregon team here Saturday night.
