Old Records Show Debate Flourished Early at Scio

SCIO, Dec. 28.—Eighty years ago a community debating society functioned in the Forks of the Santiam—three years before Oregon became a state and several years before the town of Scio was officially known.

These facts were made known when Mrs. John Young of near Crabtree discovered among her old papers and keepsakes, the record of the "Beaver Debating Club," established in 1856. The old record was on display in Riley Shelton's office in Scio for a short time following its resurrection from the files of the old Young farm. Many of the old-timers in Scio and vicinity remembered some of the men who formed the literary club four score years ago.

Twenty-three men of the section between Crabtree and Providence were members of the organization, which, according to

the meager record found, functioned only about two months. Following were among the officers and members:

James M. Elliott, president; A. B. Griggs, vice-president; E. E. McIninch, secretary-treasurer; Alex Sumpter, T. T. Thomas, George Crabtree, D. F. Crabtree, C. G. Curl, James Crabtree, William Crabtree, James T. Crabtree, Hiram Crabtree, D. H. Crabtree, Robert Constable, Job Crabtree, Terry Thomas, B. W. Hamilton, J. E. Tabor, Jasper Thomas, as Thomas, Thomas W. London, Abraham Zell, John Zell, Isaac Crabtree.

Crabtree families furnished approximately one-third of the members. This is easy for pioneer Scioans to understand, as the original Crabtree families were the first to settle in the Scio region in the spring of 1846.

Attorney General David T. Wilentz, chief of the prosecution staff; Prosecutor Anthony M. Hauck, Jr., of Hunterdon county; Assistant Attorney General Robert Peacock, and Former Judge George K. Large, a special assistant, were in the party that met the famous thief for a first-hand inspection of the crime scene.

The nursery in which Betty Gow placed the infant in his crib and the window through which the abductor entered received special scrutiny, as did the spot where the kidnap note was left.

Mrs. Lindbergh's prospective appearance on the witness stand was disclosed earlier in the day. She will "testify willingly," an authoritative source stated.

From Norfolk, Va., also came word that John Hughes Curtis, convicted heaver in the kidnap investigation, has notified New Jersey authorities of his willingness to testify for the state.

Attorney General Wilentz at Trenton said later he had received word of this offer a month ago. He indicated the offer would be rejected.

PERSON ON RELIEF ASKS BEER PERMIT

Persons who have sufficient funds to operate a beer establishment should not be on the state or county relief rolls.

This was announced by liquor commission officials Friday after they had received an S.E.R.A. check for \$12 from a Gervais woman who operates a cafe near that place. This check, which was accompanied by \$3 in currency, was sent to the commission to purchase a 1935 retail beer license.

Liquor officials said they thought anyone selling beer should be able to earn enough money to buy a license without

depending on relief. The name of the woman was withheld from publication but will be sent to relief headquarters.

JEFFERSON BANK'S LIQUIDATION ENDED

Completion of the liquidation of the Oregon State bank, which went into the hands of a receiver at Jefferson in November 18, 1927, was formally announced yesterday when a circuit court order was issued releasing the bondsmen of A. A. Schramm, state banking superintendent, who handled the liquidation.

The final report showed that savings account depositors received their \$39,751 in accounts in full while commercial depositors were paid 83 cents on the dollar or a total of \$65,991.

The expenses of the liquidation were placed at \$7632 while income to the bank from interest and other collections, apart from principal, amounted to \$10,284 showing that the liquidation was more than self-financing.

The report showed that recovery from stock assessments was \$150. Eight hundred and seventy dollars in depositors' claims were never called for.

Cruelty Charge In Divorce Suit

Claiming her husband on one occasion struck her severely with his fists and that at another time he pushed her out of their car and made her walk miles through the dead of night to get friends to take her home, Mrs. Emily M. Johnson yesterday filed suit for divorce here from William T. Johnson. The two were married in October, 1929, in Vancouver, Wash. She says Johnson acted as he did when under the influence of liquor. She also asserts that he called her vile names. She asks for the costs of the action and such other relief as the court sees fit to grant. She says Johnson makes \$8 a day as a hook setter when working in the woods.

COLUMBIA VALLEY AUTHORITY TALKED

orderly development of power, irrigation, flood and erosion control in the Columbia basin.

Pointing out that at present two major dams—Bonnevile on the Columbia between Oregon and Washington, and the Grand Coulee in north central Washington—are under construction, Hill said the authority would take over regulation of power rates at the two plants as well as plan development of other power and irrigation units on the Columbia, Snake and Willamette rivers in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

"If we can get congressional approval for a Columbia valley authority, it will revolutionize the entire Pacific Northwest," Pierce said. "The streams which would come under the authority's jurisdiction have potentially millions of horsepower of electrical energy. With cheap power from these rivers, the Pacific Northwest will develop into one of the major industrial centers of the United States."
