Dallas School Teams Win Half of County's Titles During 1934 Competition

DALLAS, Dec. 31.—The year 1934 proved to be a successful one for athletes at Dallas high school with the school teams winning three of the six county titles.

The basketball team for the 1933-34 school year won 24 out of 31 games, and scored 874 points in their opponents' 638. The team was coached by Oramel Shreeve and won the county basketball title in the annual tournament without a defeat. In the district tournament at Corvallis, the Orange and black team won four out of five games to take the district title. They defeated Corvallis high, winner in two previous tournaments, in an extra game to settle the championship.

Dallas entered the annual state tournament and ran into the strong Astoria squad, which won the state title, in her first game and was promptly eliminated from the championship race. The locals came back to win over Jefferson high of Portland and eliminate that team from the consolation rounds, only to be eliminated by Columbia Prep in the next game. The orange and black's official standing in the state meet was a tie for ninth place.

Suffer Track Setback
Track did not prove to be quite as big an event as the basketball season although the orangemen had a fairly good season. They swamped Amity high in a dual meet and scored 12 points in the district meet at Corvallis but lost the county title to Monmouth by a score of 51 to 45. This was the first time the locals had lost the annual track meet since 1920 when they were coached by Dave Wright broke a seven year winning streak by Independence. Dallas had a poor year in baseball, winning only two out of five games in the county league. The locals placed third in the league

Less of School Fund Loaned to County Farmers

Loans to farmers in Marion county from funds of the irrevocable school fund, totalled \$168,587 at the beginning of December, according to figures released yesterday by the state land board. The total showed a considerable decline from a year ago, due primarily to the refunding of farmers' debts with federal government agencies.

Total mortgage loans on real estate in the common school fund amounted this month to \$4,321,974 compared to \$4,838,928 one year. Investment on bonds had increased a corresponding amount. Union county with loans of \$220,000, exceeded every other county in the state. Benton with total loans of \$15,269 had the smallest total of loans of any county in Oregon.

northwest," Benton wrote. The letter from the AAA official was in answer to protests made by Steiwer that importation of foreign grains for livestock feed in the drought area was causing lowered prices in the Pacific northwest and permitting the surplus there to remain untouched.

Answering Steiwer's protests Benton said exclusion of foreign products from the United States "would have little, if any, effect on the prices of feeds in the drought area."

"The probable effect would be a further reduction in numbers of livestock and thus additional hardships would fall on farmers in the area affected by the drought," Benton wrote.

Forms Going Out For Special Tax

The work of sending out between 90,000 and 100,000 forms, on which to file returns for intangibles, personal income and corporate excise taxes, will begin this week under the direction of the state tax commission. DIPLOMAT FEARED FOUL PLAY VICTIM

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—(AP)—Police and his nation's financial counselor today disapproved on the circumstances surrounding the death of Ernesto Chagon Q., Ecuadorian diplomat, whose body was found in the doorway of a Manhattan building.

Dr. Don Eduardo Salazar, the counselor to the Ecuadorian legation at Washington, an intimate friend of Chagon, said he believed the diplomat was the victim of foul play. He said Chagon had \$250 in his pockets.

Acting Lieutenant of Detectives Thomas Mullarney declared there was nothing in the case indicating foul play. He said police had found only \$1 in Chagon's pockets.

Chagon, newly appointed minister to Germany, arrived here from Ecuador last Tuesday, accompanied by his wife and infant daughter.

There was only a slight abrasion above the left eye and no other marks indicating violence, police said. An ambulance surgeon who pronounced him dead said that apparently death was from natural causes.

NO TROUBLE SIGNS IN SAAR VICINITY

SAARBRUECKEN, Saar Basin Territory, Jan. 1.—(AP)—Heavy police patrols throughout the territory at 2 a. m. today reported everything "exceptionally quiet" in spite of anticipated New Year's eve rioting.

A minor disturbance in front of one of Saarbruecken's leading hotels brought the vigilant police flying squadron, which found merely a group of merry-makers. Restaurant and hotel proprietors said a "Feiertagsnacht" was celebrated much less pompously than is customary.

The police were prepared to quell any such incidents as yesterday's outburst of sunplay.
