TEST OF GOVERNOR SALARY IS STARTED

Jory Named as Plaintiff in Suit for Which Alden Has Raised Fund

As predicted last weekend in The Statesman, suit was filed in circuit court here yesterday to restrain Governor Meier from receiving more than \$1500 a year as salary. Edward A. Jory of this city was named as plaintiff in the suit while Rodney Alden, editor of The Woodburn Independent, is to serve as counsel for Jory.

The secretary of state and the state treasurer are named as defendants. The complaint sets out that the present schedule of pay for the governor is unconstitutional.

The only statement set out in the complaint was that Governor Meier had received \$24,722.91 as salary during his term of office while the constitution provides that he shall receive only \$1500 a year. Alden said he had received voluntary donations of approximately \$100 to defray the costs of the litigation.

"This may prove nothing more than a gesture on our part," a statement released by Alden read. "We are not asking for any temporary restraining order as this would require the filing of a bond and, if the restraining order eventually was dissolved, would result in heavy expense to us."

"After that our best bet would be to wait until the new governor receives as much as \$1500 in 1935 and then sue to prevent his receiving any more that year."

"This would give us time to prepare the case and to raise money. If our state officials want to cooperate with us in getting this question settled before the legislature adjourns, we can probably get it done. If not, we will have to wait."

"We assume, however, that our state officials are even more interested than we are in getting the matter threshed out in time to let the legislature know where it stands so it may, if necessary, submit a constitutional amendment to the voters."
