

THREE WIKINGS ON STAR TEAM

Nicholson, Coons, Drager to Start for Oregon; Washington Huge

PORTLAND, Dec. 31.—(AP)—High school football for 1934 in both Oregon and Washington will be brought to an end on Multnomah stadium field here tomorrow when all-star players from various high schools in both states meet at noon in a charity clash.

The teams wound up their training schedules with light signal drills this afternoon, and then retired to their respective quarters to await the coming of New Year's day and the final contest.

Coaches Eric Waldorf, who will direct the Oregon group, and Porter Lahnart of the Washington team both announced tonight that their respective charges were in first class shape and "ready to go." The game will be played under the sponsorship of the Salvation Army.

Outweighed by a Washington high forward wall that will average approximately 194 pounds, the Oregon players are expected to rely on speed and a deceptive aerial attack in their search for victory.

Coach Lahnart's attack probably will be led by Joe Gosparovich, 214-pound fullback from Aberdeen high, who will be flanked in the backfield by Tom Blackman of Walla Walla, quarterback, and Halfbacks Bob Fletcher of Kelso and Joe Enzler of Woodland.

The Oregon backfield will consist of Ben Ell, Portland, as fullback, Jimmy Nicholson of Salem as quarterback, and Halfbacks Gammon and Ferrance of Portland.

Five Portland and two Salem high school players will comprise the Oregon starting line. The Salem players are Coons, end, and Drager, guard.

The game will start at noon in order that fans can attend and yet have sufficient time to return home to listen to radio accounts of the Rose Bowl and East-West encounters.

TOOTER STRIKE IS SETTLED IN NORTH

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 31.—(AP)—The northern division Pacific Coast conference basketball officials' "strike" was settled here today as far as Seattle and Spokane are concerned.

Carl Lodel of Oregon State college, president of the Northern Division Graduate Managers' association, announced here, following a meeting with Seattle arbitrators, that a compromise had been reached in regard to fee for conference games.

The graduate managers had offered \$15 per game and \$5 a day living expenses. The officials had demanded \$25 and \$5, and also \$7 a day for lost time. The compromise will give the whistle tooters \$20, \$5 and \$7.

Five of Golden Bears Injured; Outlook Gloomy

HONOLULU, Dec. 31.—(AP)—University of California football men today faced the prospect of a New Year's day game with the University of Hawaii minus the services of five injured members of the squad.

Coach Leonard "Stub" Allison didn't see much chance to erase the memory of the 26 to 13 defeat his team took Christmas day from the Honolulu team.

Christie and Boone, linemen, were injured when the squad arrived from California. Mosler, Thorell and Jack have been hurt since arriving. He may be able to play tomorrow, but Mosler is using crutches as the result of an injury sustained in the Christmas game, and the other injured players also seem definitely out of it.

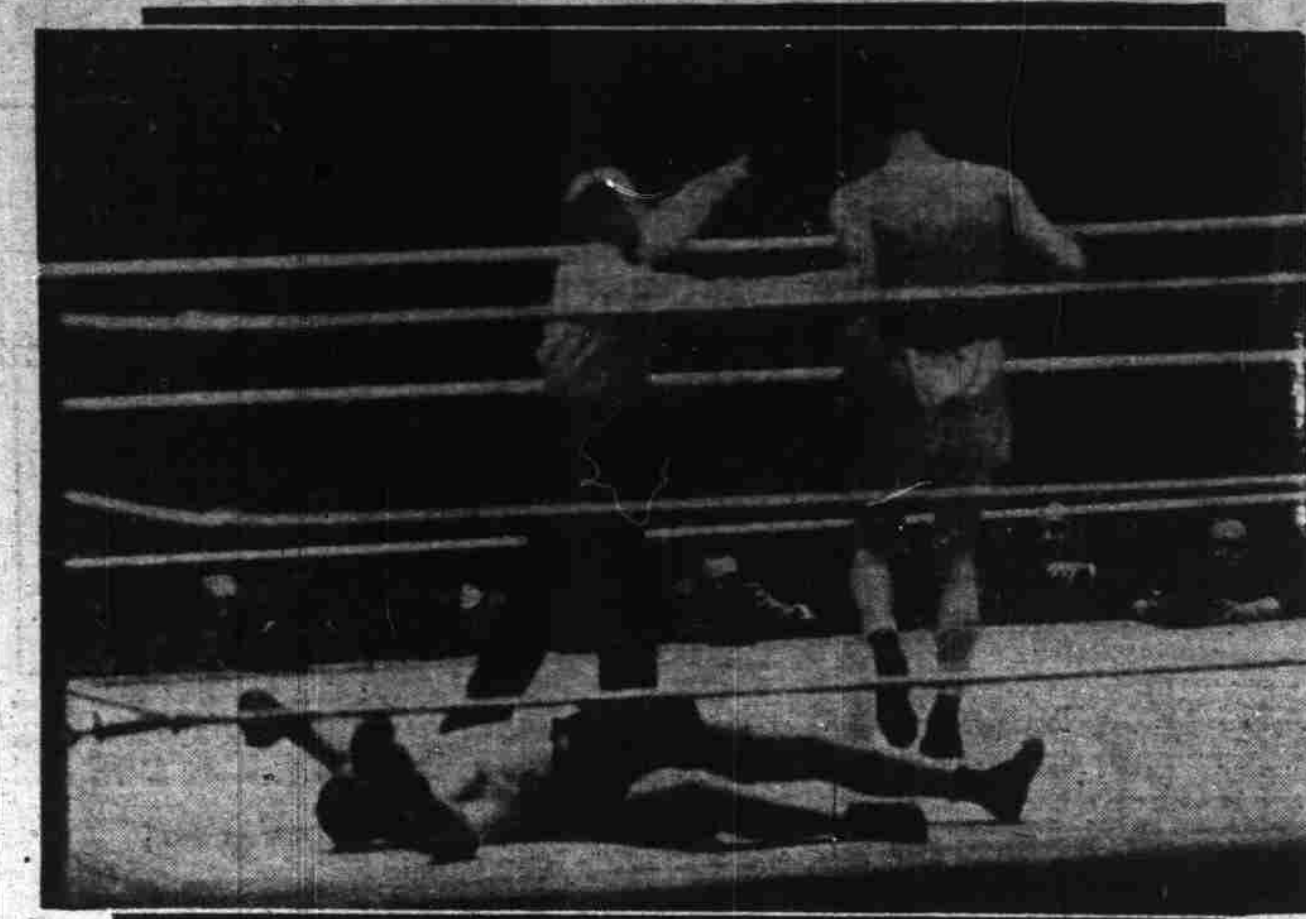
Rivulet Becomes Young River With Roar For Blocks

Record Star Gathering in Shrine Game

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 31.—(AP)—All-Americans and the near-giants of 1934 football, picked from the nation's gridirons, will ride the touchdown trail tomorrow in the dazzling pigskin pageant annually played here for charity—the East-West game.

The 10th East-West classic brings together more star performers than have ever before been assembled here. They great undefeated Minnesota team of 1934 has contributed some of its mightiest warriors, Halfback Pug Lund and End Wolf Larson, notably, to the eastern cause. Pittsburgh's powerful squad will be represented by such graduating luminaries as Quarterback Miller Munjas, Fullback Izzy Weinstein and Charles Hartwig, stellar guard. Bill Shepherd, halfback from Western Maryland who led the country's scorers, will run for the East.

The West, with fewer all-Americans to call upon, will present a huge line, averaging 296 pounds to the man at times, behind which will scout the always threatening mile of the gridiron, by Warburton of Southern California. Big Al Nichelini, 290-pound sprinter, will crack the line from the fullback position although he specialized at right half for St. Mary's.

Favored by strong odds 10 days ago, the East will line up as no better than an even money proposition, due to injuries of some stars and illness of others.
