It is 3 to 2, but democrats argued the ratio should be identical with the house membership proportion. Administration victory. Seen in Rule Change. Halted as an administration victory, the democrats then voted overwhelmingly to abrogate the so-called gag rule, which had been advocated by the liberals. Under the new rule a majority of the house would have to sign a petition to force a vote on a bill clogged in a committee.

The administration had given orders to the democratic leaders to return to the majority rule of 218 in order to prevent a third of the house membership from forcing votes on legislation it does not approve.

Although Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas submitted his name to the senate democratic conference, giving himself a chance for a vote to change party leadership, he was unanimously re-elected leader.

Vice-president Garner continues as president of that branch. Senator Key Pittman of Nevada was re-nominated. Senator Clegg of Tennessee, Senator Lewis of Illinois was re-named party whip. Senator Black of Alabama was re-elected secretary.

MEANS OF EVADING BONUS ARE SOUGHT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—(AP)—On the eve of the convening of his second "new deal" congress, President Roosevelt today called democratic congressional chieftains to consider his legislative program and a means of circumventing a perennial problem—the soldiers' bonus.

The White House conference will follow by a few hours Mr. Roosevelt's personal delivery of his annual message, outlining legislative principles and policies, to a joint session of the house and senate Friday.

The actual convening of the 74th congress tomorrow will be largely a matter of formalities, but behind the scenes, decisions that will shape the course of the session will be worked out. Not until next week will congress really get down to work.

ADMINISTRATION IN CONFLICT OVER NRA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—(AP)—The coming congressional session over NRA and monopoly was harpended tonight by a conflict of opinion within the administration itself.

An examination of proposals advanced by the federal trade commission disclosed them to be at variance with the ideas of Donald R. Richburg, presidential adviser and long general counsel of the recovery administration.

Congressional critics of NRA whose principal charge has been that the agency promoted monopoly and hampered the small business man, quickly seized upon the FTC recommendations as an additional source of ammunition.

To halt what it termed a "steady trend toward monopoly," the commission asked that its own powers be broadened. Richburg holds that an extension of authority should go to NRA or some body created under it.

Roseburg Girl Believed First Baby for 1935

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Frances Dorline Scoles was nominated tonight as Oregon's "Miss 1935" by Dr. C. B. Wade who believes she probably was the first baby born in Oregon this year.

While bells and whistles still blared greetings to the new year, Frances Dorline filled her tiny lungs with air, coughed and added a tiny shrill voice to this world at 12:05 a. m., when the new year was but five minutes old.

The eight-pound bundle is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Scoles, residents of Glide.

DENY CONSUL EXPELLED

RIGA, Latvia, Jan. 2.—(AP)—A foreign office spokesman tonight denied reports that George Bissenko, Latvian consul-general in Leningrad, was compelled to leave Russia because of alleged implication in the assassination December 1 of Sergei Kiroff, soviet leader.

Third Arbitrator in Truck Dispute to Be Chosen Today

Move to select the third member of the arbitration board, growing out of the truck and dray drivers' strike will not get under way until this morning, James Preble, who will represent the union at the arbitration, said yesterday.

Actual arbitration will begin as soon as the third member is chosen, and how long it will take to make that choice there is no indication. Mike Murphy of Portland is the operators' representative on arbitration. Preble said it was at request of the operators the original plans to select the third member yesterday were held up until today.

NEW TAXES OPPOSED BY MARTIN, RUMOR

PORTLAND, Jan. 2.—(AP)—The Oregonian says Governor-elect Charles H. Martin in his inaugural message to the legislature will recommend that old-age pensions and social insurance be left to the federal government.

The Oregonian said it was learned authoritatively today that Major-General Martin, former democratic congressman, will take the stand that the state should wait to see what action congress takes on these issues.

From a source close to the governor-elect, the Oregonian said, it was learned that among the policies of his administration, some of which will be included in the message, will be:

A declaration against any new taxes.

Opposition to a revival of the sales tax.

Delay in appointments until the legislature adjourns.

A hands-off policy toward employees of boards and commissions.

A stand for law and order.

An appeal for a united development of Oregon.

GUILT ADMITTED BY SCOTT AND FELDMAN

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Two more guilty pleas today brought the government's toll of those involved with the \$200,000 Charles F. Urschel kidnapping to 19, either facing sentence or serving prison terms.

Alvin H. Scott of Medford, Ore., and Edward Feldman, pleaded guilty before Federal Judge Edgar S. Vaughn, saying "We know we are guilty and want to go to jail."

Judge Vaughn delayed sentence pending the trial of Mathers and Asaka, scheduled here Feb. 18.

Feldman's mother pleaded guilty Dec. 18, following the indictment of the five by a federal grand jury.

Scott, Mrs. Feldman and her son were arrested after discovery of ransom money in Scott's possession after he was injured in an automobile accident near Roseburg, Ore.

Roper Commends Officers of Rose

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Personal commendations of Secretary of Commerce Roper have been given Captain J. H. Jensen and first officer E. C. Davis of the lighthouse tender Rose "for the removal of three sick men from the storm swept Tillamook Rock lighthouse, (off the Oregon coast) in a rescue comparable with the most daring which have been performed at sea."

ture, Representative Cooter said he was forwarding a plan to take the cost of the county road system off property.

Two-Point System for Roads Outlined.

"I have outlined a two-point system that has won the almost unanimous approval of legislators I have contacted," he said.

"First: Take over all county roads—I am not partial to a county or state administration. Licenses on more expensive makes of cars probably will be raised, and if the government drops the one-cent gas tax that money should be diverted to county road construction.

"Second: Unemployment relief funds should be more widely used on county roads."

Representative Cooter said he was snowed under with jobseekers but has a "system of distributing the jobs."

Out Fairly, Asserts.

"Each of the three congressional districts will be equally represented and all applicants must be qualified. The chief clerk will be especially important this session because of the large number of new members."

J. K. Weatherford, Albany octogenarian and the last democratic speaker of the house—59 years ago—will attend the opening of the next legislature on invitation from Cooter.

Cooter said he and his entire family would move to Salem within the next few days.

1934 RECORD YEAR FOR WARMTH, AGREE

SEATTLE, Jan. 2.—(AP)—The Seattle weather bureau joined today with those at Tacoma and Portland, and Walla Walla in eastern Washington also chimed in, to affirm that last year was the warmest in recorded weather bureau history.

The city had a mean temperature for the year of 55.2 degrees, as against a former record of 54 degrees in 1926, weatherman Lawrence C. Fisher said.

Tacoma had reported a mean temperature of 54.35 degrees, as against a normal of 50 degrees, while Portland had a record of 57 degrees, which was .2 of a degree higher than the 1926 average.

Walla Walla's record was 57.3 degrees, which was 4.7 degrees above normal.

\$100,000 Worth Of Hay Here is Bought, Relief

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Hay shipments which will total \$300,000 in value are moving from Oregon into the great drought areas of the mid-west.

C. H. Gunn of Lexington, Nebr., acting for the government in negotiating the large purchases, said today that in addition to the \$100,000 worth of hay shipped out of the state last fall, he has purchased an equivalent amount since December 10 in the Willamette valley, and that before the middle of this month another \$100,000 worth will be on the way to Wyoming, Nebraska and the Dakotas.

Heavy Cruisers Sail Today for Test of Gunnery

SAN PEDRO, Cal., Jan. 2.—(AP)—The powerful fighting escorts of the United States fleet, a squadron of heavy cruisers, go to sea tomorrow to make the first 1935 test of gunnery powers.

Under command of Vice-Admiral Harris Laning, veteran strategist, the seven heavy cruisers at a rendezvous some 40 to 50 miles off-shore will engage tomorrow night in night spotting practice.

The heavy cruisers engaging in this first gunnery sortie of the United States fleet this year are the Houston, Chicago, Northampton, Salt Lake City, Chester, Louisville and Portland.

NAZIS, FOES ARE WOUNDED IN SAAR

SAARBRUECKEN, Saar Basin Territory, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Nazis and anti-Nazi bandaged heads after the turbulent opening of the new year.

The League of Nations governing commission, meanwhile, moved to forestall further political strife, warning nazis the order against political demonstrations bans any such rousing welcome as was given the first American Saarlanders arriving to vote in the plebiscite January 13.

In consequence, the next group of 300 arriving from America aboard the steamer Deutschland January 4 will be met at Hamburg by 100 nazis from Saarbruecken. A big reception is planned for them, and they will be taken on a trip through Germany.

Brodie Sells His Newspaper; Plans Joining Ad Firm

OREGON CITY, Ore., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Edward E. Brodie, chief man of the state liquor control commission, today sold the Oregon City Enterprise, daily paper, and announced he would leave January 12 for San Francisco.

He has been elected vice-president of the concern, which has offices in San Francisco, Los Angeles, New York, Washington and Honolulu.

FRENCH, ITALIAN AGREEMENT NEARS

PARIS, Jan. 2.—(AP)—A Franco-Italian understanding to cement the structure of peace in central Europe drew one step closer today with the announcement that Foreign Minister Pierre Laval would leave for Rome tomorrow.

During the four days he plans to stay in Italy Laval is expected to work out with Premier Benito Mussolini details of the rapprochement that was the dream of the late Foreign Minister Louis Barthou.

ROME, Jan. 2.—(AP)—A growing fear of what Adolf Hitler, emboldened by his expected success in the Saar plebiscite, might do in Austria lay behind Pierre Laval's decision to come to Rome at once, informed circles said tonight.

WOUNDED EX-CON IS DEAD AFTER BATTLE

PICHER, Okla., Jan. 3.—(Thursday)—(AP)—Buster Cooper, an ex-convict who was shot and wounded last night in a gun battle with officers near here, died early today. Hospital attendants said he had 20 wounds in his body.

Cooper died at 1:30 a. m. after being unconscious much of the time since the shooting in which one officer was fatally wounded, and two others were shot.

Officers said Cooper made no statement before his death.

Deputy Sheriff Gerald Hodge, 36, of Ottawa county, Oklahoma, died in a hospital here last night. He had been shot below the heart. Constable Pat Bray, Treece, Kan., and Undersheriff William McIntosh, Ottawa county, were wounded but not seriously.

The battle between the officers and four gunmen raged for more than an hour in streets and alleys. Machine guns and tear gas were brought into play.
