knew Dr. Condon. It was definitely Lindbergh's day in court. His direct examination was finished in a minute or two under the first hour, and Wilentz turned him over at once to Reilly.

For two and a half hours the cross-examination proceeded. Reilly dug into the testimony from a dozen different angles, he resurrected the case of John Hughes Curtis, Norfolk, Va., ship-builder, convicted of obstructing justice in the kidnapping investigation; he asked the filer if he had believed the "Purple Gang" of Detroit responsible for the kidnapping.

Lindbergh replied in the negative. Once or twice there were questions to which Wilentz objected, but Lindbergh himself never showed a reluctance to answer.

Williamson, on the other hand, police force, was called to the stand to give his account of the scene and activities at the Lindberghs' home when he and Chief Harry Wolfe arrived there in response to the telephone call made after the kidnapping was discovered. He told of footprints outside the house and of imprints of a ladder under the nursery windows.

Mrs. Whately followed him on the stand and described the happenings in the house on the day and night of the kidnapping. She spent the hour preceding the discovery of the kidnapping in the company of Betty Gow, and gave a graphic picture of how the distraught nurse burst into the kitchen with the cry:

Mrs. Whately told also of Mrs. Lindbergh's words when she learned that Charles Augustus, Jr., was missing. They were: "Oh, God!"

Mrs. Lindbergh, a witness yesterday, was not in court today. At the conclusion of Mrs. Whately's testimony the trial was adjourned until 10 a. m., Monday.

LAVAL, MUSSOLINI MEET FOR PARLEY

ROME, Jan. 4.—A cordial kiss on both cheeks was Benito Mussolini's greeting to Pierre Laval tonight as the French statesman arrived to start conversations expected to end old Franco-Italian animosities.

Thousands massed about the railroad station cheered as Il Duce gave Laval the fascist salute, clasped his hand strongly and kissed his cheeks.

The warmth of the welcome to the first French foreign minister to visit Rome since the World war argued well, observers believe, for the negotiations intended to settle Franco-Italian differences over their colonial possessions in Africa, guarantee Austria's independence and bulwark the peace of central Europe.

to our misfortune, over public affairs as well. Stating that the past year showed "more gains than losses," Mr. Roosevelt concluded his 4,000 word message, saying:

"It is not empty optimism that moves me to a strong hope in the coming year. . . Beyond the material recovery, I sense a spiritual recovery as well."

Returning to the White House, Mr. Roosevelt prepared at once for a conference tonight with democratic congressional leaders, designed among other things to seek ways of heading off the bonus, if possible.

In his message he made no mention of this, but laid down as legislative aims "the consolidation of federal regulatory administration over all forms of transportation, renewal and clarification of the general purposes of the national industrial recovery act, strengthening of our facilities for the prevention, detection and treatment of crime and criminals, restoration of sound conditions in the public utilities field through abolition of the evil features of holding companies, gradual tapering off of the emergency credit activities of government, and improvement in our taxation forms and methods."

SEVEN FISHERMEN DROWN, COLLISION

HAVANA, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Seven fishermen died in the shark-infested waters of the Gulf of Mexico off Havana tonight when the S. S. Seatrain Havana rammed and sank their frail fishing smack, the Julian Benzoehes.

Five of the crew of 12 were dragged from the water 45 minutes after the collision, almost exhausted.

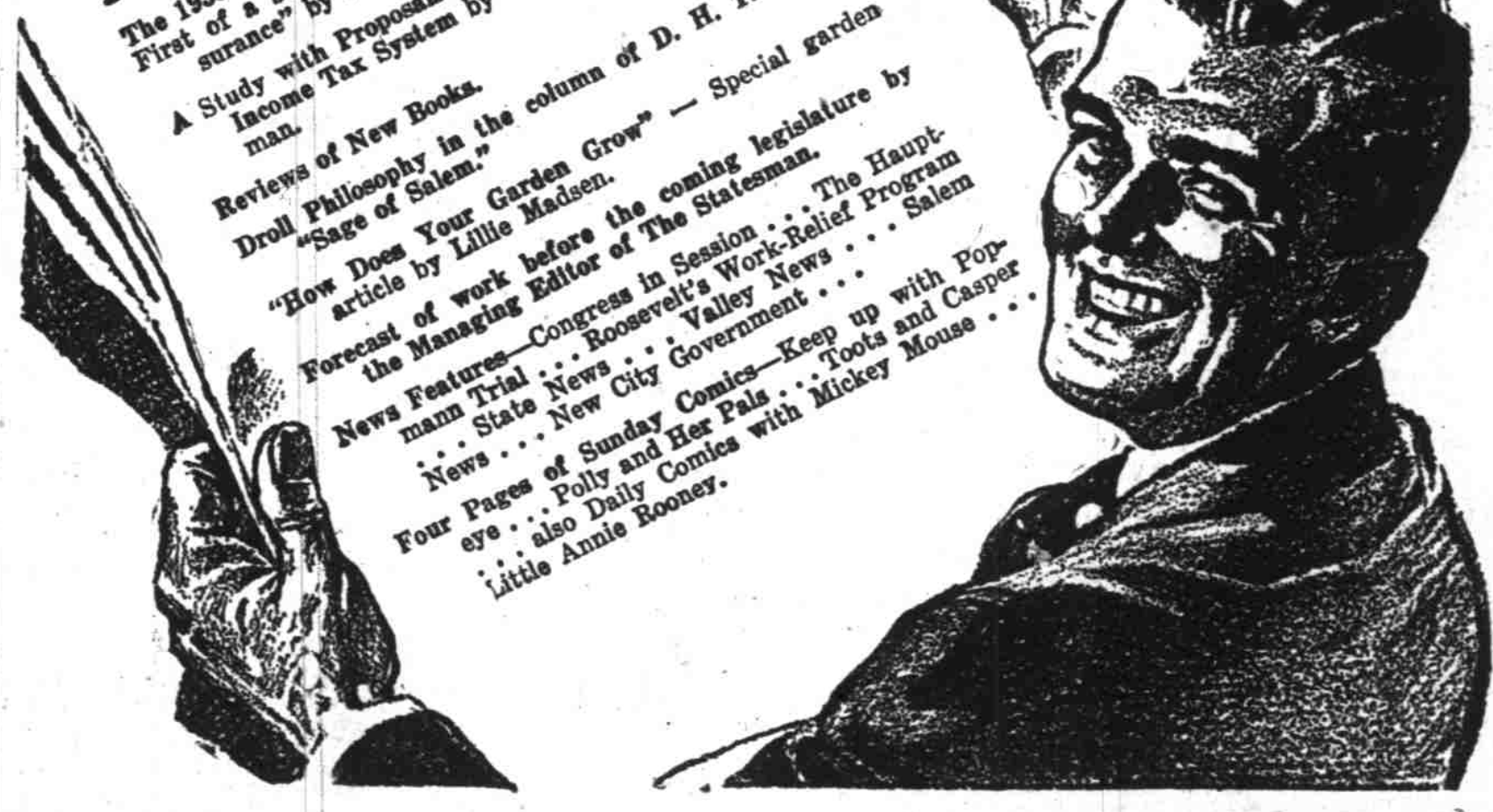
