Plan Hay Quarantine—Enactment of a quarantine law under which officials may prevent the shipment of hay from any Oregon county into another state, probably will be sought at the 1935 legislative session, Max Gehlhar, state director of agriculture, announced Saturday. Gehlhar said that Oregon hay, with the exception of that produced in four counties, may be shipped to any state in the union. Reports received by Gehlhar indicated that virtually every state in the union, with the exception of Oregon, now has hay quarantine laws.

Tax Blanks Ready—The work of sending out between 90,000 and 100,000 blanks, upon which to file returns for personal income, intangibles and corporate excise taxes for 1935, will get under way early this week, members of the state tax commission declared Saturday. These returns will be based on incomes for 1934. Officials estimated that these three taxes would return to the state approximately \$1,900,000 as against \$1,800,000 in 1934.

Hospital Cost Down—The per capital cost of operating the Oregon state hospital here, decreased from \$19.52 during the 1927-28 biennium to \$13.31 during the past two years, according to the biennial report completed Saturday. Officials said this showing was remarkable when the increasing costs of commodities were taken into consideration. A somewhat similar showing also was made by the eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton.

City Sues—Suit to foreclose on delinquent street liens in the sum of \$194 to which interest is to be

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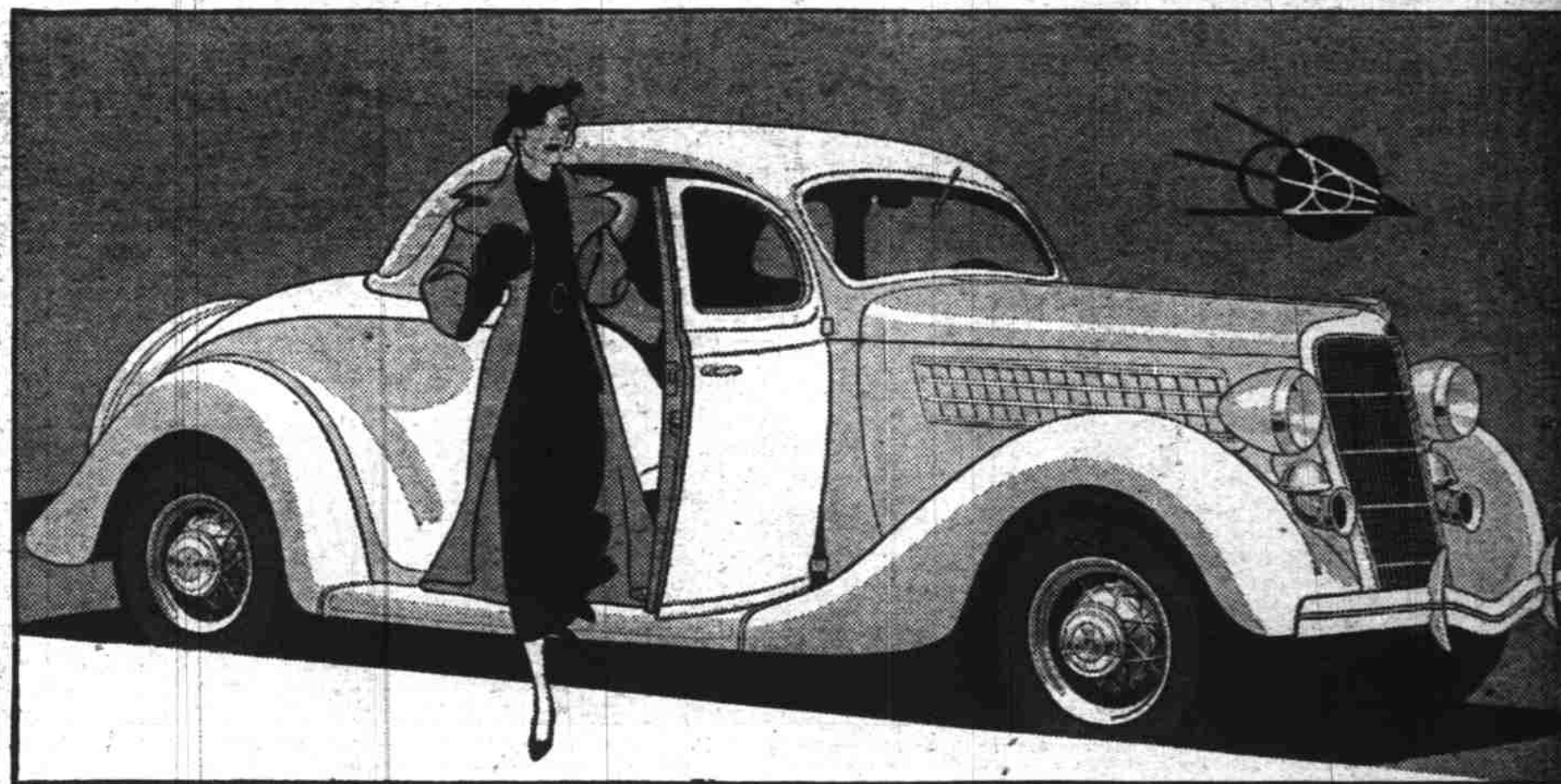
