Unusers Warned—Persons or corporations operating under the small loan act who, by subterfuge or otherwise, charge borrowers more than three per cent per month for loans ranging from \$30 to \$300, are subject to prosecution, Attorney General Van Winkle held in an opinion handed down Monday. The opinion was sought by A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks, under whose jurisdiction the small loans act is administered.

FRANK KELLER IS GRANTED PARDON

A conditional pardon was granted here yesterday by Governor Julius L. Meier to Frank Keller, Jr., who was in the state penitentiary on a five-year term for devising a scheme to defraud in connection with the now-defunct Empire Holding corporation.

Keller was sentenced to the state prison July 7, 1933, by Judge Arlie G. Walker at Dallas after other officials of the company were acquitted or when charges against them had been dismissed. Among the officials presented was Oliver P. Conover, president, and a one-time member of the state supreme court.

In making the pardon, Governor Meier pointed out that Keller's minimum sentence would expire March 7 of this year. His wife is seriously ill with pneumonia.

The case against Keller and his associates attracted wide attention due to the prominence of the officials and the heavy losses suffered by shareholders.

Governor Meier also issued a pardon to L. D. Smith who has been serving a ten-year sentence from Klamath Falls on a statutory charge. He was received at the state penitentiary December 14, 1932. Smith agreed to go to Idaho to make his home with relatives.

Upon recommendation of the Multnomah county district attorney, a 20-year sentence imposed on Earl Max Young for forging a bank check was commuted to five years.

EGLENTINE GEER TO BE HONORED TODAY

Last rites will be said here at 10 a. m. today for Mrs. Egline DeHaft Geer, 82, a pioneer of the Waldo Hills district and widow of L. B. Geer, who died Sunday at her residence in Goodnoe Hills, Wash.

The services will be held at the W. T. Rigdon chapel with Rev. H. C. Stover officiating. Interment will be in the Mt. Hope (Warren) cemetery.

Mrs. Geer was born in Illinois in 1852. She came to Oregon in 1859 living for several years in Silverton and teaching school near there. She located at Goodnoe Hills following the death of her husband in 1909. She there acted as postmistress and subsequently was employed by the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railroad.

Survivors include five children, Mrs. Carrie Crouter, Union, Ore.; Musa Geer, Goodnoe Hills, Bert Geer, Maryhill, Wash.; Chet and Arch A. Geer, both of Salem. She was an aunt of Homer Davenport, cartoonist.

JOB RELIEF ISSUE TOPIC AT MEETING

Vote on Various Schemes is Delayed But Group is Agreed on Policy

Brief discussion of various plans of unemployment legislation soon to come before the national congress and many state legislatures was heard Monday noon at a conference called here by Ralph Cooley, who was recently named by Aaron Frank of Portland as local head of a forum to consider various unemployment plans. Frank is serving as northwest chairman for an organization started by the Retail Merchants' committee of New York, Samuel W. Reyburn, chairman.

Men at the gathering held at The Spa uniformly expressed their view that the entire subject was so broad in its aspects a fair ballot yesterday noon of merchants was impossible to obtain.

The group did adopt a motion stating that it was the sentiment of the group that any satisfactory unemployment insurance plan must be first, national in scope; second, met by a uniform basis of contribution from all phases of industry and business; three, administered as a relief measure not as one of "insurance," and four, that any such plan must be preceded by a period of study in which a federal commission should hold meetings throughout the nation to conduct public hearings on ways and means most satisfactory for an unemployment relief system.

On motion of William P. Ellis, the group also voted to send ballots of the four present proposed plans of unemployment legislation to 150 merchants in the city, obtaining from them the ideas on which system would be most satisfactory.

The chairman was instructed to advise Frank of the deliberations of the Salem meeting yesterday which was one of a number of similar gatherings held throughout the northwest.

The four plans discussed at yesterday's meeting were:

1. A plan whereby employers would contribute two per cent of their payroll, employees one per cent and the state as great a sum as that contributed by the employers, the funds being administered by a state commission. Unemployment benefits would be paid at the rate of 50 per cent of the normal wage received by the unemployed man up to \$20 a week and for not more than 26 weeks of any one year, payments being restricted to men out of work through no cause of their own.

2. A plan whereby employers would contribute two per cent of their payroll and employees one per cent, benefits being administered by a state commission, from which unemployed men could not receive more than \$15 a week and then for not more than 16 weeks of any one year.

3. A plan whereby employers would contribute two per cent of their payrolls to a state unemployment insurance fund, benefits being paid for not more than 10 weeks of any one year and then at a rate not to exceed \$10 a week to any unemployed person.

4. A plan wherein the federal government, the employer and the employee would join, the government would contribute two per cent of their payroll and employees one per cent, benefits being administered by a state commission, from which unemployed men could not receive more than \$15 a week and then for not more than 16 weeks of any one year.

ment being paid one and one-half per cent of every employers' payroll, an additional one-half per cent being paid the state and one per cent of the employee's payroll going to the state. All the benefits would be administered by the state, the federal government subsidizing the state's contributions in an amount equal to the total sum contributed by the tax on employers and employees' taxes paid the state unemployment commission.

Sorrell Held On Battery Charge

Melvin Sorrell, Salem youth, was arrested here yesterday morning on an assault and battery charge preferred by Dorothy Douglas. Sorrell pleaded not guilty and will have a trial in justice court Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. He is in jail in lieu of \$100 bail. The incident resulting in the arrest occurred just a month ago today.

Gift Taxes to Be Paid Early

Returns and payments involving gift taxes for the calendar year must be made to the state treasury department on or before February 1, 1935, Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, announced Monday.

Returns are required from any donor making a gift during the calendar year, to any one person, exceeding \$1,000 in value. Recipients of gifts exceeding \$1000 in value also are required to file returns.
