Molasses Recipes Hold Honored Cookery Place

Baked beans and brown bread are old friends of long standing. Mention of one immediately brings the other to mind. Both call for molasses so either recipe are in demand at the Round Table this week. Good brown bread may be purchased at bakeries now but it is impossible to duplicate the rich flavor of home-baked beans.

Candy, cookies, gingerbread—the topic this week has no limitation just so molasses is used. The deadline is Thursday noon and cash prize-winners will be announced Friday morning. Everyone is invited to contribute to the contest.

The following economical cake may be enhanced by a cream cheese frosting (rather expensive but within reach when the cake is not costly):

Economical Cake
2 squares chocolate
butter size of an egg
1 egg
1 cup flour
1 cup sugar
1 cup sweet milk
1 level teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup chopped nuts or shredded coconut
Melt together over hot water the chocolate and butter. Beat egg and sugar together. Dissolve soda in sweet milk and add alternately with the flour to the sugar and egg mixture. Then add the melted butter and chocolate. Add vanilla and nuts or coconut (may be omitted if desired). Beat thoroughly. Bake in two layers or one loaf. Put in oven at 400 degrees and bake until, when tested with a toothpick, the pick comes out smooth. Ice with your favorite frosting.

1 package Philadelphia cream cheese
3 cups powdered sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Cream cheese and add powdered sugar until of right consistency to spread. Beat until smooth. Add vanilla last.

Spice Cake
1/2 cup butter or shortening
1 cup sugar
2 cups pastry flour
1 level teaspoon Calumet baking powder
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 cups water
yolks of 4 eggs or 2 whole eggs
Cream butter and sugar thoroughly. Add eggs. Sift together three times the flour, baking

powder, spices and salt and add alternately with water. Bake in a loaf pan for 45 minutes in a 350 degree oven.

6 eggs
1 cup sugar
1 cup butter
3 cups flour
1 cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon soda
1 square chocolate
Cream butter until smooth. Add sugar gradually and cream together until smooth. Add well beaten egg yolks then flour alternately with buttermilk in which the soda has been dissolved. Beat well. Add the chocolate and lastly, the well-beaten egg whites.

yolks of 2 eggs
2 cups sugar
1 cup sweet milk
1/2 cup bitter chocolate
Beat yolks and add sugar and milk. Cook 8 minutes and remove from fire. Add melted chocolate and beat until thick. Add 2 teaspoons lemon extract.

2 cups brown sugar
1/2 cup butter
1 egg and 1 yolk
1 cup sour milk
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon allspice
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
2 1/2 cups flour
Add chopped walnuts
Cream butter, add sugar a little at a time. Cream well. Add beaten eggs. Mix soda with sour milk. Sift flour, then measure and sift again with dry ingredients. Add milk and flour alternately. Beat well. Bake in loaf in moderate oven 45 minutes.

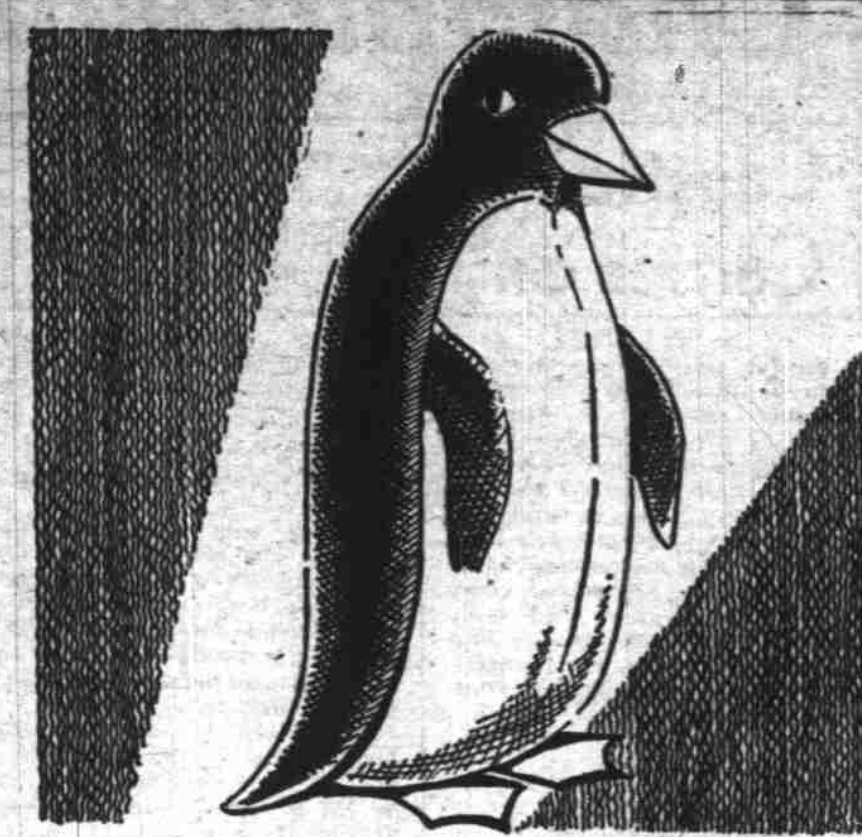
