SECRECY SHROUDS TRIO
NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—(P)—The S. H. de France sped toward the United States tonight with three mysterious witnesses, their identity closely guarded, to testify in the murder trial of Bruno Hauptmann.

Amid elaborate precautions to insure secrecy the three witnesses accompanied by Detective Arthur Johnson, who has been investigating German angles of the Hauptmann case, boarded the ship a few minutes before she sailed this morning.

ADVISES PLACING CHICK ORDER SOON

MONMOUTH, Jan. 9.—Mrs. Sylvia Robison, successful chick hatchery operator of Monmouth, is warning chick buyers to place orders for chicks this season at least three weeks ahead of the time they want to obtain the chicks, because the 1935 code makes it practically impossible for hatcheries to produce a large number of chicks to have on hand whenever buyers choose to come for them. Mrs. Robison says:
"The code benefits chick buyers since it requires hatchery operators to observe stringent requirements. Every egg set must weigh at the rate of 23½ ounces per dozen, which insures larger chicks, and will tend to increase the size of eggs produced by the resulting pullets. Every hatcheryman is required to be absolutely truthful in statements about his products."
"In the past years chick buyers have been accustomed to approach a hatchery and buy chicks just when the urge struck them. Hence it has been common, in the past, for hatchery operators to produce many more chicks than they had orders for on the strength of a hope that enough chick buyers would arrive to take care of the surplus. Many times buyers did not appear, so the chicks had to be sold at distress prices, causing severe losses to the hatcheryman, and losses also to the buyers, because the held over chicks often suffered from being held without the proper facilities for their care."

Bailey Silent on Judgeship Rumors
Joe E. Bailey, justice of the state supreme court, yesterday refused to comment on reports that he was being considered by President Roosevelt as a compromise appointment for the office of judge of the federal court of appeals at San Francisco. Other names mentioned in connection with the appointment were Bert Haney of Portland and Clarence Reames of Medford. Both Reames and Haney are prominent attorneys.

STATE DROPS CASE AGAINST KIRSCH

Case of the State vs. Kirsch, a drunken driving charge appealed to circuit court from justice court went off the docket yesterday on motion of District Attorney Trindle. He accompanied his motion with a letter from John Carson, former district attorney, who said he thought the state had insufficient evidence to prosecute the charge. Carson said no physician had examined Kirsch for the state when he was allegedly intoxicated. Carson indicated prosecution was not worth the cost. The case has been held up since 1932.
Trial of State vs. Rasmussen, another drunken driving suit, is set for trial in circuit court Friday.
Judge L. H. McMahan yesterday sentenced William Eastman of Woodburn, a man 62 years old, to serve three years in the state penitentiary. He pleaded guilty to an attack on two small girls.

Mrs. Sackett on Education Board

Beatrice Walton Sackett yesterday was appointed by Governor Meier a member of the state board of higher education to succeed George B. McLeod, who resigned. She has served as private secretary to three governors, including Governor Meier. Her term as a member of the state board of higher education will expire March 2, 1942.

REGISTRATION NEAR CLOSE, SERA SCHOOL

Opportunity to register in the free SERA adult education classes for the term which opened at Salem high school Monday night is nearing a close. It was announced last night by T. T. Mackenzie, vocational education director here. Tonight probably will be the last chance for enrollment in some of the classes.

Only one more student can be admitted to the public speaking class, he said. Among classes still open to new entrants are those in current economics, trends of American government, general science, mathematics and indoor recreation for women. All classes meet each Monday, Wednesday and Thursday night. Registration should be made at these classes.

Mackenzie reported that the total enrollment in all classes to date amounted to 279 persons, or more than signed up during the whole of the fall term. The mid-winter term now in progress will end March 22 and probably be followed by one more term for the present school year.

County Solons to Talk School Laws With Tax League

The Marion county house and senate delegation is to meet here Friday at 2 p. m. at the Salem chamber of commerce rooms to discuss proposed school legislation with members of the Marion County Taxpayers' league. The league is definitely opposed to school legislation which will provide either for the county unit or for a further equalization of school costs. The gathering will be the first one in which all the Marion county delegation has participated.

School Boundary Change is Denied

The county boundary board has denied the petition that it transfer 200 acres of land in the Liberty school district to the Rosedale district. The board indicated it thought the reasons against the transfer outweighed the arguments of the proponents of the change. Property with an assessed valuation of \$13,000 was involved.

FOG HALTS TRAFFIC IN EASTERN STATES

From Newfoundland down to Hatteras, for the third day, a thick and paralyzing fog smothered the north Atlantic seaboard Wednesday.
Along the seaboard there was rain.
To the west, the fog held on.

but with lesser density.
In New York city, a short lived break in the thick mist cleared up the traffic in the harbor a bit. A dozen liners either sailed beatfully or proceeded from quarantine in the lower bay to their piers. Some were as much as 24 hours late.
The largest of the ocean liners, the Majestic of the White Star-Cunard line, was still at anchor close by Ambrose lightship. The Majestic was due to sail again for Europe Wednesday midnight, but its departure was indefinitely postponed.
