

CLASS STUDIES NEAR SHAKE-UP

Kirkwood Holds School Aim
Should Be Practical;
May Drop Latin

MOLALLA, Jan. 10. — Traditional high school subjects, such as Latin, algebra and geometry, will have to justify themselves in the light of cold reason to stay on the Molalla union high school curriculum next year, if the recommendations made Monday night to the school board by Glenn Kirkwood, principal, are adopted. A general shaking-up and revision of the curriculum was advised.

Kirkwood's plans for making the high school of more practical value to the community include the following steps:

First, a survey of the vocational desires of eighth and ninth grade students in the 16 high school districts.

Second, a complete revamping of the present curriculum to meet the needs as shown in the survey of the greater number of students in this community. Courses that would be found to have practical value for only a few students would be dropped and replaced by others of wider interest, including the vocational needs of students who must become self-supporting and the academic needs of students planning to go to college.

Would Omit Latin
Some of the general recommendations made by Kirkwood were the discontinuance of Latin as a subject of value to too few students; the continuance of algebra and geometry for only those students planning to go on to college; the placing of emphasis on social science studies, with a requirement of four years of social sciences; the continuance of the present four-year English course to three years with a year of oral English added; an integrated four-year commercial course with related subjects definitely mapped out; the calling in of specialists in the Smith-Hughes department.

Latin, Kirkwood says, is not necessary to an understanding of English if English is properly taught. Each high school should plan its courses to be of value to the students in its community rather than to follow traditional patterns, he believes.

Kirkwood says he intends to fight for the adoption of his ideas here.
