Applications for the position of policeman were referred to the police committee. City Attorney Elmer D. Cook swore in newly elected councilmen, Ted Burns and Roy Stevens. Officers sworn in at this time included Mrs. J. I. Miller, reelected city recorder; mayor, Guy C. Newgent; Lynn L. Sloper, treasurer; Elmer D. Cook was reappointed city attorney and L. Large Amount in Loans Reported
Agencies of the 12th district farm credit administration made loans totaling slightly more than \$134,000,000 to farmers of the Pacific northwest during 1935, according to information received this week by E. K. Plasecki, secretary-treasurer of one of the units involved, the Dallas Farm Loan association.

Plasecki says the report shows the Federal Land bank's volume set a new all-time record, closing 21,398 loans during the year for a total of \$55,852,520 to farmers in the four northwest states. This was four times the 1933 volume, and over five times the number of loans made in 1932. Besides the Federal Land bank at Spokane, through which Plasecki's association handles its loans, the farm credit loans include those of the production credit corporation, the federal intermediate credit bank and the Spokane bank of cooperatives and money advanced by the regional agricultural credit corporation.

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FISCH WRITER OF NOTES, ASSERTION

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 11.—(AP)—Edward J. Fisch, chief of counsel for Bruno Richard Hauptmann, on trial for kidnap-murder of the Lindbergh baby, charged tonight that Isador Fisch, dear friend of the accused carpenter, wrote the ransom notes and collected the \$50,000 ransom.

"We will prove that Fisch not only collected the ransom but also wrote the ransom notes," said Fisch.

Hauptmann has contended ever since his arrest that he got the ransom money with which he was caught from Fisch, who died of tuberculosis in Germany.

Reilly, referring to today's handwritten testimony at the celebrated trial, also asserted: "The state today produced evidence of extortion against Hauptmann, but so far there is no evidence of murder."

He added, however, that the defense expects "to prove Hauptmann innocent of extortion as well as murder."

SURVEY OF WATER PROGRAM PLANNED

A composite picture of the status and past actions of the city of Salem in connection with negotiations and plans to secure a municipal water system will be submitted to the city council in the near future by the utilities committee which with Mayor V. E. Kuhn and City Attorney Chris J. Kowitz is compiling the necessary data. The report will list all existing contracts and agreements, all special employees such as legal counsel and engineers, and the cost of all water proceedings to date.

The committee expects to outline a plan of action for the next two years. Its membership consists of Aldermen Walter Fehrer, who is chairman, Merrill D. Ohling and David O'Hara. O'Hara is the only holdover committee member.

SILVERTON, Jan. 10.—An unusually interesting program is being planned for Wednesday night for the January meeting of the Silverton chamber of commerce. Three speakers have been secured, each to give a brief address. Ralph Thom and Fred Greenwood, both assistant managers of the Bank of California in Portland, will speak on the Frazier Lempke bill and on the Federal deposit insurance. T. Cramer, Jr., secretary of the bankers association, who has just returned from Washington, D. C., will speak on his trip and on financial conditions in general. PROGRAM OUTLINED BY FARMERS UNION

The union wishes the state power act strengthened. Old-age insurance and pensions on a "reasonable" basis were favored by the Farmers Union provided that the burden did not fall upon the farm or home.

The legislature will be asked by the organization to enact more stringent regulations for the control of liquor sales, with local option extended to precincts and with more severe laws provided to curb drunken driving.

The union's stand on transportation is embodied in a program which calls for amending truck laws to protect small owners, opposition to higher freight rates and opposition to placing motor and water transportation nationally under the interstate commerce commission.

According to Mr. McBee the Farmers Union stands for the enactment of laws which will make liability insurance compulsory for all auto drivers.

Another plank in the group's program is a provision that the legislature shall provide for no expenditures which place a tax burden on local governmental units without permitting those several units to vote on the tax themselves.

Men Constructing Community Hall at Lyons Near Church

LYONS, Jan. 11.—Several men of the M. E. church worked Wednesday repairing the roof of the church building and community hall adjoining the church.

BE GENERAL, FEAR

Unless present living methods are changed to correct misuse of the eye, 50 per cent of the students coming out of high schools in another 10 years' time will have materially impaired vision, W. E. Potter of the General Electric company better vision institute told members of the Salem Credit association yesterday noon. He based this assertion on studies conducted over a period of years.

He deplored the lack of proper illumination in homes and business houses, declaring that in most instances the eye needs at least 20 times as much light as is used. Sometimes the lighting is sufficient but not properly distributed, he indicated. More light will not only aid the vision but will eliminate much sickness due to fatigue and mental strain, he said.

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RELIEF FAMILIES NEED MORE WOOD

From 1500 to 2500 more cords of wood are needed to keep Marion county people who are on relief warm this winter. With this situation evident, the county relief committee has named a committee within itself to devise means to get more wood cut, and cut soon.

One proposal is to let men needing wood pile a cord for the relief wood pile for every cord he himself gets. Another is to put a crew of men to a woodlot with the wood to be used only for county or aged cases, and not for general relief.

Already 2500 cords of county wood furnished with cooperation of the government, and another 200 cords purchased, have been used for relief cases.

Needy Families Will Get Quilts Sewn by SERA

Quilts for needy families in Marion county will be sewn by women on a new SERA project which will get under way early next week according to County Administrator Glenn C. Niles.

Five frames for quilt-making already have been set up at the rear of the SERA offices 377 North High street but a supply of cotton b-tins has not yet arrived.

This project will give employment to approximately 40 women who work 20 to a shift. Placement Officer D. G. Metcalf reports that block of 20 women will work one shift weekly.

Eastmans to Install Equipment for Hunts

SILVERTON, Jan. 11.—Eastman brothers, local manufacturers, have been awarded a contract to install equipment in the Fuyallup, Wash., branch cannery of Hunt Brothers, and to build 22 of their special fans for an English-owned hop firm at Independence. Ludwig Meyer resumed his work with Eastmans Thursday after a couple of months' lay-off.
