

CAMP CLATSOP TO HAVE BIG PROGRAM

Will Rank With Best U. S. Military Centers in Officer's Report

Camp Clatsop, training grounds for the Oregon national guard, is to become one of the most highly developed military centers in the United States, Major-General White, in command of the guard, announced in his biennial report to the legislature, released Saturday.

Purchase of the site by the state, construction of buildings by the government at a cost of \$200,000, and landscape projects employing 600 men under the FERA were developments of the past biennium.

A tentative allotment of an additional \$120,000 for buildings and landscaping was forecast for 1935. Camp Clatsop was reported an ideal location for the FERA. Another FERA camp has been established at Camp Withycombe 17 miles near Portland. The mobility of the Oregon national guard was materially increased during the past year through the acquisition from the government of a fleet of 72 1 1/2-ton trucks and 16 reconnaissance cars. This equipment, which was furnished without cost to the state, is in line with the general policy for the ultimate motorization of the military forces of the nation. The acquisition of these new trucks swells the total amount of federal property in Oregon to more than \$2,000,000, the report showed.

For the first time in more than three decades, a part of the Oregon national guard was called to active duty in support of the civil authorities.

Further federalization of the national guard was accomplished during the current biennium through amendments to the national defense act, the report continued. Under this law, the national guard becomes a part of the army of the United States and the largest element of the land forces.

During the past biennium approximately \$1,000,000 was received by the Oregon national guard from the federal government.

Federal Savings And Loan Report Shows Dividend

Assets of the Mutual Federal Savings and Loan association of Salem now total \$45,890 according to a report released here yesterday by the directors. The association, in its initial semi-annual report, showed that all shareholders will receive a two per cent dividend for the first half-year period or on a basis of four per cent per annum.

The association now has \$41,915 in mortgage assets and cash on hand of \$3065. A. A. Lee, its secretary, said yesterday. After setting up of necessary reserves and paying running expenses of the office, \$61.41 were left in undivided profits after the costs and the dividend were met.

Work at County Poor Farm Begun With SERA Help

SERA workmen late last week started the project at the county poor farm. They will clear away debris left by the removal of the old barn and silo, a large stack of rusted tin cans and other trash, replace old fences with new and paint the new fences to make the property conform in neat appearance with surrounding farms. Harry Oldenberg, superintendent, is directing the work.

If present plans are worked out, 25 of the 30 acres on the farm in the spring will be turned over to the relief committee for division among relief families as garden tracts.

Slight Gain in Jobs Available Here Reported

A slight improvement came last week in placement operations of the national re-employment agency, 355 North High street, the report of Manager D. D. Dotson showed yesterday. Eighteen men and women secured employment through the agency, a gain of four over the previous week.

Five each of the jobs provided were common labor and farm work, three housework, two woodcutting and one each dairy work, insurance selling and janitorial.

Adult Education Grows in County

Adult education classes are more than twice as numerous as the original quota planned for this county, Mrs. Mary L. Fulkerson, county school superintendent, said yesterday. The increase has been brought about by the interest shown in work offered under SERA in subjects adapted for adult students. Twelve regular classes are being held three times a week in areas outside the principal towns in the county. Subjects most desired by students are English, public speaking, landscape gardening and sewing with several courses in Americanization also offered to help students obtain needed preliminary training for their final naturalization tests.

of estimated receipts over "mandatory" expense in 1935. Addition to this of a carryover unobligated balance of \$1,150,000 piled up at the end of 1934, largely through the use of federal funds for construction in the last four years. Addition of a sum of \$150,000 in repayments from counties of money advanced by the state for work in former years and addition of a sum of \$675,000 to be received from the federal government for like advances. The aggregate of these funds, with \$350,000 of the \$680,000 "mandatory" budget item for 1935, set up for replacement of old bridges and worn-out roads, comes to \$2,335,000, or ample money for 1935 to meet all federal money.

The commission, however, believes its match-money funds will be inadequate in 1936, it sets out in its report to the governor, this sum in 1936 totaling only \$1,660,000.

000 which the commission says will make it possible to match only \$1,335,000 of the \$2,045,000 of federal funds available.

The report shows that in the six-year period, 1931 to 1936, the state highway commission will have received \$11,985,000 from federal funds for highway work, this sum contingent on match money being made available in 1935 and 1936 but excluding the more than \$6,000,000 received by loan and grant for the five bridges on the coast.

The report shows that the commission will receive, in 1935, an aggregate sum of \$19,330,000, \$6,000,000 coming from 1934 and 1935 NRA funds which have been allocated and not spent, from the proceeds of matched federal aid funds in 1935 and from the residue of PWA grants to the Coast highway bridges.

In addition the commission's income will include the following items:
