THREE OF NOTABLE STARS AT ELSINORE

"Forsaking All Others" Has Gable, Montgomery and Crawford in Cast

Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's much talked-about filmation of the Tallulah Bankhead stage hit, "Forsaking All Others," with the breath-taking combination of Joan Crawford, Clark Gable and Robert Montgomery in one picture, is the special film attraction for this week at the Elsinore theatre.

From all reports there is a surprise in store for the thousands who enlist themselves as ardent Joan Crawford fans.

Cast as a young Parkavenette who leads the procession in a mad whirl of gay living Miss Crawford has been finally given the chance to do the real comedy characterization for which her legion of admirers have long waited.

With a star in each corner of the romantic triangle, the plot is based largely on situations arising from the competitive tactics of the two men who are trying to win the love of the same girl.

A brilliant cast was garnered to support the stellar trio. Billie Burke plays a flibberty-fibberty society matron, Charles Butterworth is seen as Gable's right hand man who always says the wrong thing at the right time. Frances Drake, the former London night club star, plays the part of a woman who tries to break up the Crawford-Montgomery romance.

SYLVIA SIDNEY IS STARRED, CAPITOL

A unique story, cleverly turned, excellently acted, beautifully staged—that is "Behold My Wife," Sylvia Sidney's new starring picture, which opens today at the Capitol theatre.

Miss Sidney, who has played a variety of nationalities in her career on the screen, is in this time cast as an Indian maiden. Gene Raymond is cast as a wealthy son of wealthy parents, madly in love with a girl from what his family regards as a "lower social stratum." Their efforts to break up the affair drive the girl to suicide, and Raymond, broken-hearted but infuriated, slams out of his home vowing vengeance.

An idea strikes him—what better way to revenge himself on his family than to marry her—to bring this "savage" back to their exclusive salon as his wife.

This he does—and what follows is a sometimes grim, sometimes amusing, sometimes tragic, but always dramatic denouement.

"PECK'S BAD BOY" IS AT HOLLYWOOD

They nearly succeed.

One carload of hay went to western Nebraska and all the rest to the drought-stricken area of western North Dakota, to various points along the Great Northern and Milwaukee railroads. Other shipments are being made.
