

CONVICT FOUR'S LEADER IS DEAD

Warden Holohan, 64, Beaten Mercilessly by Quartet Which Flees in Car

ed the weapons were smuggled into the crowded prison by Clyde Stevens, who is wanted for robbing a San Francisco bank last Friday and making a getaway despite a police trap having been set.

All four convicts were taken to the prison hospital upon being returned from the scene of their desperate last stand at Valley Ford, 54 miles north of the prison. Three of them were released and questioned after being treated for superficial injuries. The fourth died.

Convicts Storm Warden's Home

Suddenly appearing and waving their pistols, the convicts stormed the home of Warden Holohan while members of the board were having luncheon.

Holohan, backed into an adjoining room was set upon and flayed with the pistols. The felons forced the board members to exchange their civilian clothes for prison uniforms.

The whole party then marched out to where an official automobile was standing.

Out the rear gate of the prison the escape car sped, with the hostages at pistol point to give orders to the guards to clear the way.

The heavily loaded car headed for the Redwood highway and thence north, the only landward avenue of escape from San Quentin, most populous penitentiary in the United States.

State and city police and even two fighting planes from Hamilton field, the army's newest bombing base nearby, joined in the pursuit.

Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh's born son, buried in a brick-lined vault in a cemetery, wrote 14 lying letters and snatched the \$50,000 ransom in a Bronx cemetery.

Only a little of the tedious handwriting testimony remained at the trial's adjournment today after four more experts had called Bruno the author of all 14 notes.

Positive in their identification, defense attorneys said that Hauptmann's handwriting was used as a disguise for somebody else.

Defense Relies On Fish Alibi

The defense has made it plain that it expects to name leader "Fisch," Hauptmann's dead alibi man, as that somebody else.

Out of court, the defense claimed today to have a witness "tucked away" who will testify that Fisch and two other men, in New York, tried to sell him the ransom bills—\$50,000 in "good hot money" for 75 cents on the dollar.

The witness, said the defense, is Gustav Lukatis, of New York, who declared the offer was made in April or May of 1932, not long after Dr. John F. "Jafie" Condon paid the \$50,000 ransom to a man he has identified as Hauptmann.

However, the state has brought three relatives and the nurse of Fisch from Germany to explode the "Fisch myth."

The four were taken secretly to a Trenton hotel today after one of them, Fincus Fisch, was quoted in New York as saying he will testify "only that my dead brother is not guilty."

or a total of \$251,955.88, and half of this sum in turn, went for county roads, bridges and ferries. The latter item totaled \$120,283.31.

Two Elections Cost \$10,149

The two elections held during 1934 cost the taxpayers \$10,149.27. In the year, \$904.30 was paid for additional volumes for the county law library, which sum was paid out of fees collected for that purpose.

Warrants charged to the district attorney's office, not including salary, were \$33,921.17. Operation of the justice court, including salaries, was \$325.03 in Salem, and the justice courts outside of Salem cost the county \$608.35. Juvenile court expenses reached \$1511.44, including salary.

The highest sum in several years, \$59.75, was paid for scalp bonnets.

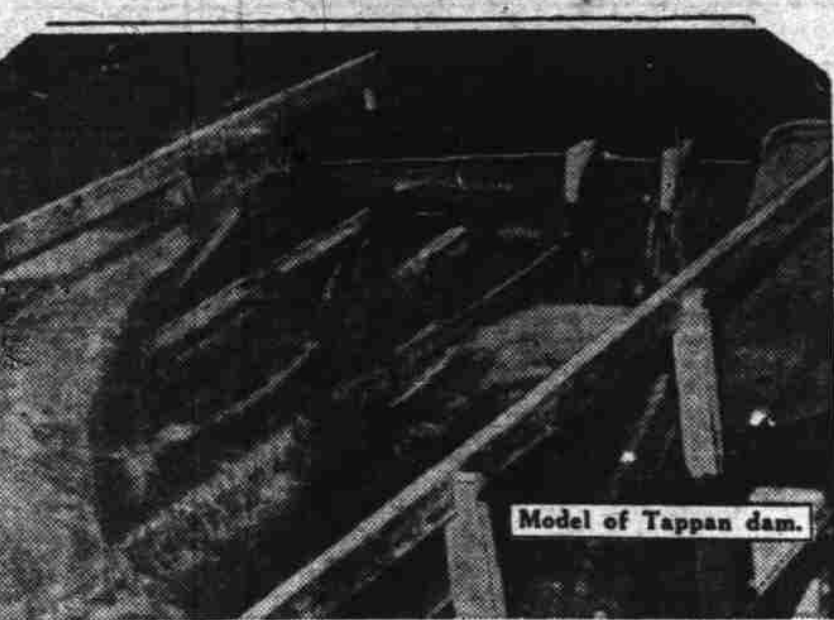

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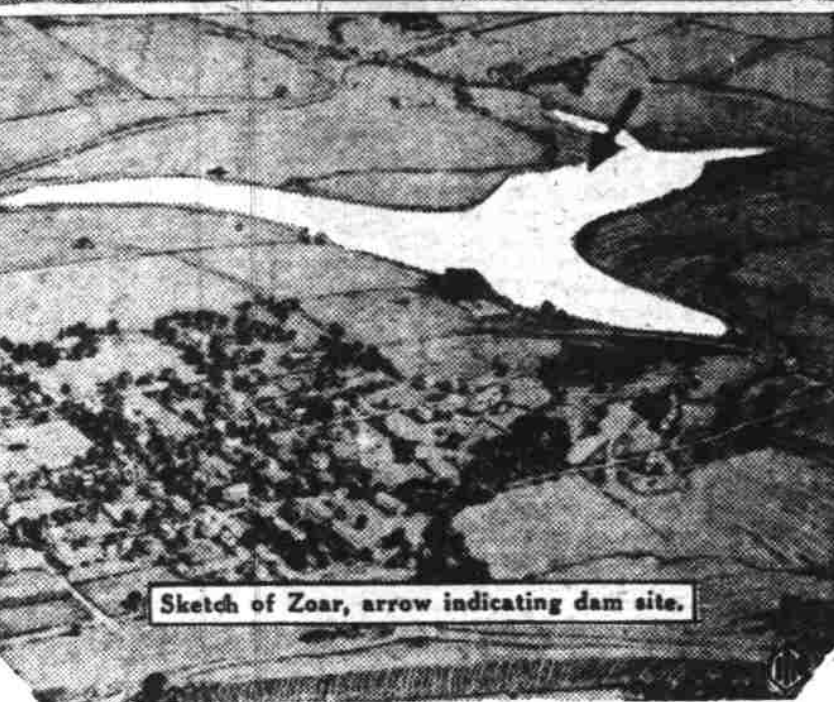

Ohio has launched the construction of Tappan dam, part of the Muskingum valley flood control program, and the second major protective project in the Buckeye state. The Muskingum project, started 15 years after the completion of the dams in the Miami valley district, will cost more than \$30,000,000, the federal government subscribing to \$22,500,000 of the principal sum.

SEWING ROOM IS BUSY

75 Women Employed on SERA Project Here MACHINES ARE NEEDED

Comfortably situated in their new headquarters on North High street, 75 women employed by the SERA sewing project work in two shifts a week, with six eight-hour days of work. The upstairs room is large and light and accommodates 35 sewing machines loaned by townspeople, as well as large cutting tables.

Mrs. Crissa Lama, superintendent of the project, stated yesterday that more machines are needed. The relief office will call for and bring back the machines if they are loaned. One or two week periods of use will be appreciated as well as longer loans.

Old clothing that may be remodeled is always welcome, Mrs. Lama stated, as her workers cut down and mend all sorts of apparel.

meet again this morning and Estes Snedcor, legal advisor to Governor Martin, will appear before it, seeking to expedite the bill's passage by explaining clearly what it calls for.

Critics of the Martin planning board said yesterday that they thought the power entrusted to the board was excessive. They pointed out that the board was granted authority to "review and correlate the policies and plans of state departments" and to insist that these plans be followed, unless deviations were filed by the state departments affected and unless these deviations were allowed to stand by direction of the chief executive officer.

While the planning commission bill is being considered by the legislature, the unofficial "brain trust" will work on projects to be followed in Oregon's cooperative program with the federal work relief program, Governor Martin said.

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ENGLEWOOD CHURCH TO DEDICATE SOON

Services for New Auditorium Start Sunday, Continue Throughout Week

The Englewood United Brethren church will dedicate its new auditorium Sunday, with a full day of services, during which Bishop I. D. Warner, Portland, of the Pacific area of the United Brethren church, will be the main speaker at 10:45 o'clock in the morning and 2:30 and 7:30 p.m., announces Rev. R. C. Mann, pastor.

Greetings from the Salem ministerial association will be extended by the president, Rev. Guy L. Drill of the First Christian church, during the afternoon service. Special musical features will include selections by the church choir at the morning and afternoon sessions. In the evening, the Salem Song Men, directed by C. B. Glover, L.M.C.M., will furnish special music, and Mr. Glover will sing a solo.

Basket Dinner Planned

A basket dinner will be served in the basement of the church at noon, and the actual dedicatory ceremonies will take place at the close of the evening service.

The church building was started in 1931, but due to economic conditions the congregation was forced to discontinue building operations after the Sunday school unit was enclosed. Last spring plans were made to renew the building operations, but a gain in they were delayed through the untimely death of the pastor, Rev. R. V. Wilson, who was drowned in the Pacific ocean on Memorial day. Rev. Mann was then selected as pastor and arrived on the field in the middle of September, and operations were resumed at once.

Cost is \$25,000

The building will cost a little above \$25,000 and is so arranged that it has a beautiful auditorium 38 by 53 feet with art glass windows in the center of the building. The educational unit has departmental assembly rooms and class rooms on three floors. The children's division is yet to be finished, although most of this is being used at the present time.

Special services will continue through the week with services each evening at 7:30 o'clock. The following ministers will be speakers: Monday, Rev. F. G. Roscoe of Portland, superintendent of the Oregon Conference of the United Brethren church; Tuesday, Rev. R. M. Hilton, pastor of the Wallingford United Brethren church of Seattle; Wednesday, Rev. E. M. Petticoat, D.D., pastor of the First Evangelical church, Salem; Thursday, Rev. Marvin Jobe, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene, Salem; Friday, Rev. J. H. Wortman, pastor of the Hazel Green United Brethren church.

New tables will be installed in the near future and new chairs have already been added since the project moved at the first of the year from Ferry street. All the employees are Salem women.

A new project is just being organized with Mrs. Lama as superintendent. This will employ 27 women who will make comforters for relief families. It is expected to turn out 60 quilts a day.

4000 Sheets Made

A new storeroom is being built to house materials and finished projects before the latter are distributed to the relief office and state institutions. Recently completed articles include 4000 sheets for needy families, lengthening 75 woolen blankets, and 650 new shirts for relief families. Overalls are now being made.

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In the Chaco, the league's Chaco advisory committee will be to reinforce the arms embargo against Paraguay and lift the embargo against Bolivia which has accepted the plan.

Bolivia henceforth will be free to buy, and nations adhering to the league's embargo will be free to sell, armaments and munitions.

MAYER WILL PLEAD INSANITY, STATED

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Jan. 16.—(AP)—A plea of insanity will be presented by the defense council of Hugo Mayer, hermit of the cragges, being tried on charges of first degree murder.

Mayer, who admitted killing Robert Fantz Nov. 9, took the stand today and began unfolding the background of his simple existence in the wild, rugged Rogue river wastes and the subsequent coming of Fantz to break ground for farming and burn lands for pasture.

W. T. Miller, defense attorney who announced the insanity plea would be made, claimed the hermit was not responsible for the shooting because of a head injury received years ago while working on a bridge.

Low Grade Imported

Only the lowest grade of hay is being purchased in Canada for North Dakota farmers, McNary's wire indicates. He states he conferred with the hay market division of the department of agriculture, where he was advised "some roughage, mostly straw, may enter North Dakota duty free because farmers are able to buy only the lowest grade" whereas northwest hay is classified for production of butterfat. He says the federal department of agriculture agent at Portland will interview the county court on the matter shortly, and that further, all the surplus hay here will be needed in the midwest before the winter is out.

Mott, taking the matter up with Colonel Murphy in charge of Canadian hay importations, says substantially the same thing: that Canadian hay imported into North Dakota is cheap hay and does not compete with Oregon hay.

Eight dollars per ton for alfalfa hay or \$9 aboard the car is being offered by the agents purchasing hay for the government for midwest use. Three grades of hay are included in the 5000 tons said to be available in Marion and Polk. Alfalfa vetch and oats and clover hay. It is said the Canadian hay is purchased at two or three dollars under that.

A number of carloads of hay have already been shipped to the midwest from this area, both from Salem and Woodburn, it is said. In Salem, Claud McKenney is handling the shipping for the government.

An U. S. department of agriculture bulletin this week on hay shipments for drought areas says as alfalfa supplies in Oregon diminish, consideration may be necessary to oat and vetch mixed clover or other hays, but that the difference in price paid for alfalfa and these grades have not encouraged feeders in the drought area to experiment with them. Over 100 carloads of oat and vetch hay mixed are listed in Oregon.

DAYTON PUBLISHER DIES

DAYTON, Wash., Jan. 16.—(AP)—Brown M. Schick, 40, veteran Pacific northwest newspaperman and publisher of the Dayton Chronicle-Dispatch since 1926, died here today after a brief illness. He had been afflicted with northwest newspapers since 1895, when he joined the staff of the old Walla Walla Statesman.

PURCHASE OF HAY IN CANADA SCORED

5000 Tons Available in Two Counties Here, County Court Points Out

With an estimated 5000 tons of hay available in Marion and Polk counties for shipment to the drought area in the middle west, the county court has protested to the Oregon delegation in congress the government's move to purchase Canadian duty-free hay.

Senators McNary and Steiwer have in turn protested the buying, as has Representative Mott. Telegrams received by the county court yesterday show. An immediate investigation into the matter, with a government man due here within a week, is promised in Mott's wire.

The AAA maintains that the northwest markets are not demoralized by the move to purchase Canadian hay and moreover that available northwest hay will be used during the winter, Senator Steiwer's telegram says.

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SUPPORT OF MINING ASKED OF GOVERNOR

Mining Congress Elects B. K. Lawson as President Succeeding Smith

Support to the mining industry and definite cooperation on the part of the governor were asked in a resolution introduced by W. B. Dennis, Carlton, former chairman of the state bureau of mines, at the Oregon Mining congress meeting held at the chamber of commerce here yesterday.

The resolution, which climaxed an afternoon discussion of mining problems in this state, was referred to the legislative committee, which will handle all further relations of the congress with the governor's office. Members of this committee include E. G. Harlan, B. K. Lawson, Fred Cook and Roy Clark, all of Portland.

Warren D. Smith, Eugene, president of the congress, opened the afternoon session, then tendered his resignation on account of his heavy duties as a member of mining planning boards. B. K. Lawson was elected as the new leader. Dennis and Professor J. H. Batcheller of Oregon State college headed the list of speakers. Batcheller presented the planning council's proposal for a department of conservation to include mining support.

The summer convention of the congress will be held in Baker next August.
