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4 eggs
4 tablespoons milk
1 cup soft Master bread crumbs
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1 tablespoon butter

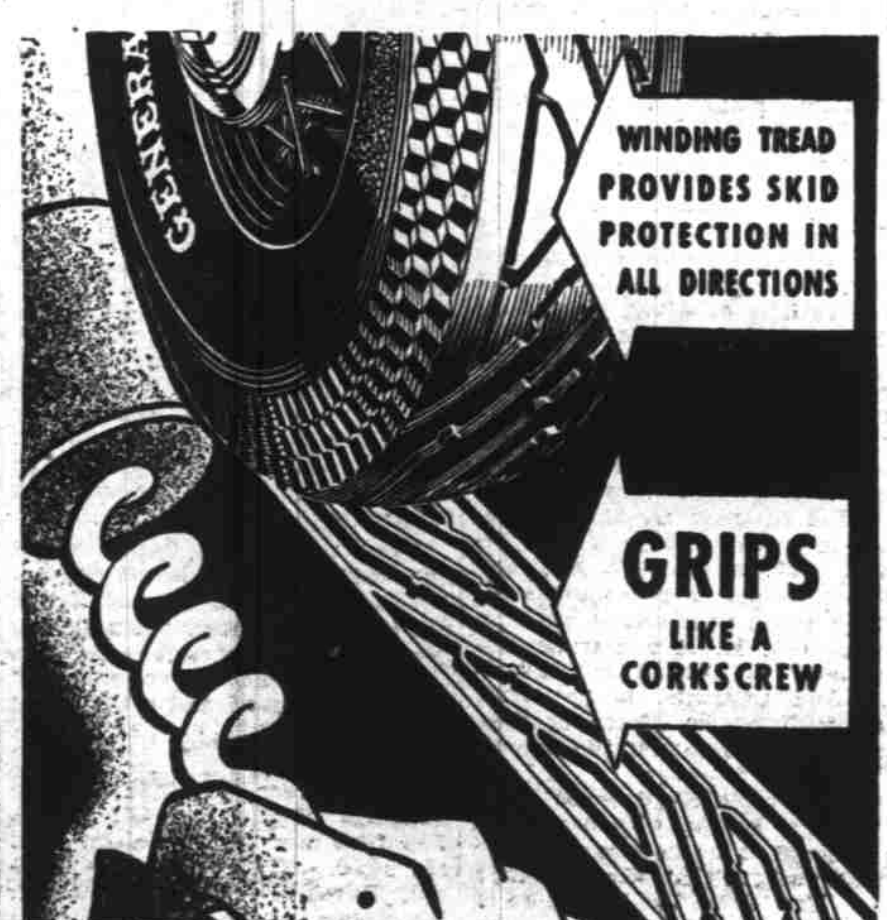
Beat yolks of eggs until thick and lemon colored; add milk, bread crumbs, salt and pepper. Add baking powder to egg whites and beat until stiff. Fold into first mixture. Melt butter in frying pan, turn in the mixture and spread evenly. Cook over low heat until top is set. Fold and turn out on hot platter. Serves 4.

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
