King of a high priced insurance policy on a low priced building, which no doubt the reader has heard about, many times.

It was a case of the result of intensely bitter feelings over the state capital fight. The legislature had a couple of weeks before moved the capital back to Salem, from Corvallis.

The state has a perfect title to its capitol block, for it is on the Mrs. Willson half of the donation land claim, the deed was signed by both her husband and herself, and all property in the name of the territory of Oregon went to the state when it was admitted to the union.

It should be added that Frances A. Gill, wife of J. K. Gill, was a daughter of W. H. Willson and wife. She was a direct heir of theirs, but not the only heir. The deed of J. K. Gill and wife of the court house block would have conveyed an interest in that property if there had been any interest.

It was assumedly the opinion of Marion county's officials in 1875 that they had no interest, for apparently they did nothing about it. And Mr. Moreland, whoever he was, apparently never showed up to take possession of his purchase, and lost his \$1,000, if he paid it.

Perhaps it was a case like that of the confidence man who sold a sucker in New York the Brooklyn bridge.

It should be added that, before the U. S. government authorities—treasury authorities for the treasury owns all publicly owned postoffice buildings—would accept title to the Salem postoffice block, a quit claim deed was demanded from all the heirs of W. H. and Chloe A. Willson, and it was furnished.

That is assumedly the story to date. If anything has been omitted or overlooked, the Bits man would like to hear about it. The matter is one of some public interest, as well as historical.

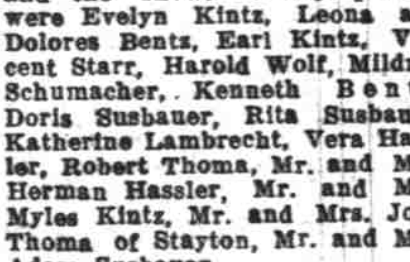
