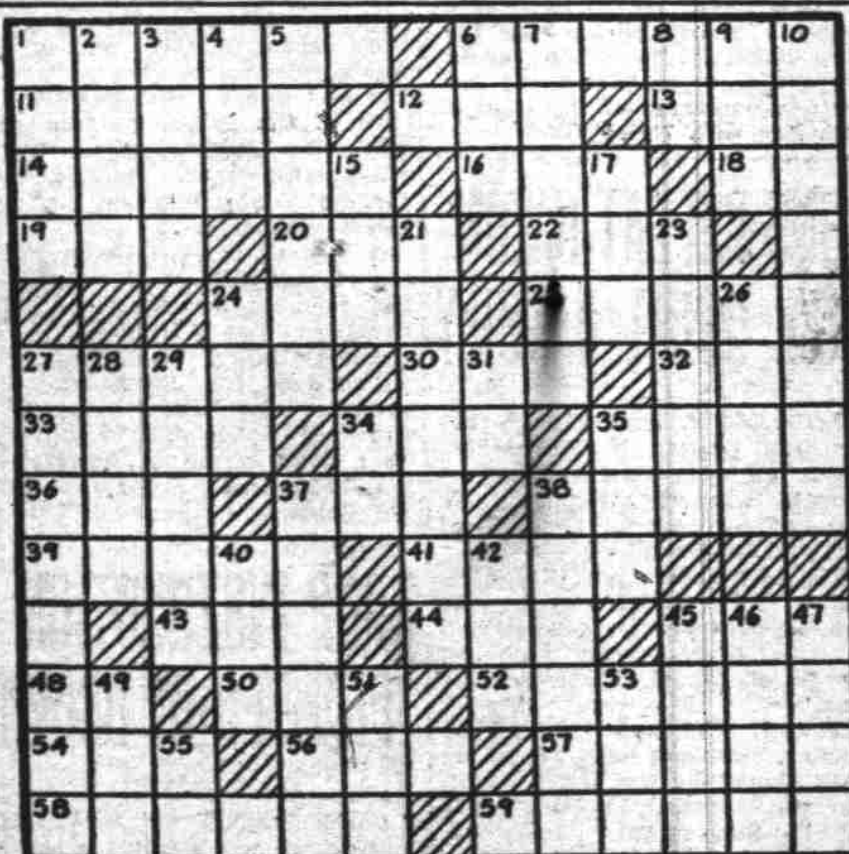
Theodore A. McKee Funeral Services Held at Jefferson

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ROADS ABOUT GATES IN FAIR CONDITION

GATES, Jan. 21.—William Kelle is home on a short leave from the S. S. Lexington which is now stationed at Bremerton. William is the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. William Kelle east of Gates, and graduated from Gates high a few years ago. On his return to Bremerton his ship will likely go south to San Diego.
