Claims Owed State—Answered.—Writ of mandamus filed against him by Wesley B. Yates, Utilities Commissioner. Thomas alleges the claims by a number of persons for witness fees were kept by the state as the witnesses were indebted to the state for fees and taxes arising out of operating on the highway as carriers. The claims for witness and mileage fees of nine persons were assigned to Yates.

Cars Crash—L. R. Robinson, route four, box 852, yesterday filed report with Sheriff Burk of an accident Monday afternoon in which his car crashed with a Silver Wheel truck driven by G. W. McDaniel. The accident happened four miles south of here on the highway. Robinson says the truck was eight inches over the line and that the left front wheel and almost the entire left side of his car was demolished.

A stalled truck on the highway was responsible for the accident.

Close Brown Estate—Final accounting of Chandler P. Brown as executor of the estate of Elva Brown, who died here April 19, last, was approved yesterday by the county court. The estate has been distributed, with the executor trustee for a \$50,000 trust fund set up by the will. The state inheritance tax totaled \$225.72 and the federal estate tax was \$626.70, both of which have been paid, the accounting showed.

Nearly All Speakers Favor Signing Though Weak Points are Seen

world's largest grower of hops, envisioned the afternoon session with a 40-minute impassioned discourse on the proposed agreement, directed chiefly toward urging a "hook-up" between growers and brewers rather than between growers and dealers.

Horst contended that the grower as the producer, and the brewer as the consumer, have a common interest, but that the dealer, in his opinion, is little else than a parasite on both the brewer and the grower.

While his picturesque presentation of ideas on the whole range of the hop growers' problems drew vigorous applause, his definite proposal of an industry board composed of seven growers and seven brewers gained only 23 votes.

A. L. Rose, New York counsel representing eastern dealers, replied with a polished address in which he outlined the services rendered the industry by dealers, for which he said they are not asking gratitude but merely consideration. He urged that no one faction be given a majority over the other two but that it be constituted on a basis of mutual cooperation. He said the dealers are not trying to obstruct and that their position on the board would be fully as often on the side of the growers as with the brewers.

Senator Dean Walker of Independence closed the sparkling debate with an analysis of the issues involved in the controversy. He held that the brewers' contentions are not justified because the price of hops is life and death to the grower, while it is but one portion of the brewer's cost of materials. No such control over other raw materials used in beer is accorded the brewers, he said.

Brewer Can't Qualify
Federal Law Says

Walker granted that the advice and counsel of the brewers on the board would be valuable and they should be represented. Here R. H. McDrew, member of the hearing board, interposed the statement that as the agreement is specifically between growers and dealers, no brewer could qualify as a member of the board unless he purchased enough supplies direct to be classed as a dealer.

Walker urged upon the growers the necessity of studying the full effect of the proposed agreement critically before deciding to go into it, as no one can foretell what the actual effect will be. He proposed a small committee of experts to make a survey of probable effects before the time of signing arrives.

Senator Walker assured the group that he is favorably disposed toward the agreement, but that he believes that something must be done about new acreage and control of old surplus beyond what is now said to be legally possible.

George F. Clark of Fargo later echoed such fears when he said that unless an effective means is devised of handling the present old hop surplus he can see no success.

Boil 1/2 cup rice in salted water until soft. This may be done the day before it is to be used. Cut 1 1/2 to 3 1/2 lbs. of veal in cubes. Heat in a kettle with 2 tablespoons of butter. To this add the meat and a sliced onion. Cook until the meat is yellow. Add the rice thinned with 6 tablespoons of water to which meat extract has been added. A little grated Parmesan cheese may be added. Cook in a closed kettle in the oven 45 minutes.

DEATHS DECREASE, BIRTHS GAIN, 1934

Six per cent more babies were born in Marion county last year than in 1933 while nearly 3 per cent fewer deaths were recorded, it was announced yesterday by Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer. The number of births increased from 844 to 894. Deaths dropped from 846 to 834. Of the last six years, 1931 brought the record number of births, 966, and 1929 the lowest, 810.

Girls born last year numbered 448, or two more than boys. Of the 894 births recorded, 345 were to Salem parents, 496 to parents residing in the county outside of Salem and 53 to non-resident parents.
