Casteel alleged he suffered loss of an index finger and use of the hand from June 14 to November 5, as result of the accident while working for W. W. Miller and son in a logging camp near Scotts Mills.

REPEATED THEFTS OF CARS ADMITTED

Life was just one stolen ride in a stolen car after another for Raymond Earl Dilly, 19 year old Tacoma youth, until he was arrested at Creswell Thursday on charges involving the theft of one Salem automobile and of another which he abandoned here. Dilly was bound over to the grand jury by the justice court at Eugene with bail, which he did not furnish, set at \$1000.

Dilly did pretty well in the "hot-car" racket until he ran into the United States mail in the person of mail-carrier Enis E. Dersham and Postmaster W. W. Lawer of Eugene who nabbed him when he attempted to steal Dersham's car from in front of the Eugene postoffice early Thursday morning.

Before stealing a car from the Bonesteel Motor company here and abandoning it near Corvallis, Dilly said he stole a logging truck on the way from Portland. The truck was abandoned in Salem and found yesterday morning by police near the Salem high school building. Dilly also admitted stealing a car from Eugene which was found abandoned near Creswell.

Dilly said he had been arrested for car theft in Tacoma, had lain four months in jail and had then been transferred to the hospital for the insane at Stellacom where he escaped a few days ago.

Cities Ask Right Of Beverage Tax

A measure which would authorize cities to place a tax on wines and beers will be one of a group of 25 bills, now being prepared by the League of Oregon Cities, which will be dropped into the house hopper during the coming week. The league already has a dozen measures in the house.

Two Accidents Fatal—There were two fatalities due to industrial accidents in Oregon during the week ending January 24, according to a report issued by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were B. J. Hall of Albany and Eric Nelson of Portland. There were 465 accidents reported to the commission during the week covered in the report.

No Paper Issued—The Willamette university weekly newspaper "The Collegian" was not printed this week due to the pressure of first semester final examinations. David N. Johnson, editor, announced that regular publication will be resumed with next week's issue.

Pleads Guilty—Ernest A. Woolsey pleaded guilty to a defective brakes charge in justice court yesterday. The case was continued for sentence until February 18. Woolsey was released on his own recognizance.

Pulley Fined \$10—Elvis Pulley was in the county jail yesterday to serve out a \$10 fine imposed by the justice of the peace at Woodburn following trial on an assault and battery charge. Officers say Pulley was in the state prison for about nine months a year or more ago for theft of meat.

Communism, the criminal syndicalism act and the pending matter of paying the soldiers' bonus will be major matters discussed here tonight at a mid-Willamette valley rally of ex-service men. The meeting will be held at the Salem armory.

Presiding at the gathering will be Secretary of State Earl Snell, according to Dr. V. E. Hockett, commander of Capital Post No. 9 of the American Legion. Dr. Hockett is making arrangements for the conference.

Speakers tonight will include Carl Moser, state adjutant of the American Legion, who will discuss payment of the adjusted service compensation; Edward Boatwright, Portland, state vice-commander; Mayor Joe Carson of Portland, who will talk on the menace of communism; Joe Chamberlain of Corvallis, a state commander, will discuss the Legion's stand against repeal of the criminal syndicalism law.

An all-day meeting of the state executive committee of the American Legion will be held Sunday in the chamber of commerce rooms here.

HUGE ENROLLMENT EXPECTED AT HIGH

With expectation of a large second semester enrollment at Salem high, preparations are being made to furnish more classroom space by transferring a small room formerly used for corrective gym work into a classroom. Principal Fred Wolf stated yesterday. The building is expected to be crowded to capacity even with this addition, however.

While the number of students coming to high school from the two junior highs will probably not be as large as usual the shortage will be made up by students transferring from other cities. The number of families which have moved into Salem from other towns in the past few months has been unusually large and their children will increase the attendance at all city schools.

Although the school board hopes to abolish the mid-year shift of junior high students to the senior high, this improvement in school routine will not be accomplished until next year.

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CLAIM FOR LEGAL SERVICE UPHOLD

Attorney General Van Winkle held in an opinion yesterday that the claim of Clark and Clark for legal services engaged by Public Utility Commissioner Thomas in the telephone rate case, "is one authorized by law and a legal claim against the state." The attorney general quotes the law which empowered the old railroad commission, succeeded by the public utility commissioner, to employ counsel and fix their duties and a compensation. The claim is for \$9750 for services and \$34.17 for expenses; and bears the approval of Charles M. Thomas, commissioner.

The attorney general holds that the board of control has no authority to pass on claims of any other department; and goes on to rule that the board, which has assumed power to pass on traveling expenses of other departments, is without power to do so. The constitution and the laws of the state make the secretary of state the auditing officer.

The claim of Clark and Clark was not paid before Gov. Meier retired from office and has been kicking around under the new regime with the opinion of the attorney general called for as to the powers of the board to approve or reject the claim.

NEWS CONTEST OF CLUBS UNDER WAY

The annual 4-H club news contest, for which at least one scholarship will be awarded to the outstanding Marion county news writer, opened January 15 and will extend to May 15. Wayne D. Harding, county club agent, said yesterday. Scholarships will be awarded to the boy and to the girl adjudged the state winners.

The club members entering will keep clippings of all stories written between the time the contest runs, and carbons or original copies of at least five stories, with the story to be counted one regardless of the number of times printed. Headlines and pictures will be included in the notebook, basis for judging of which will be: inches, 40; quality of news, 40; neatness, 5; form in which stories are sent to the paper, 5 points.

Want Only Half Bonneville Cost Charged, Power

Senate Memorial 3 providing the 50 per cent of the cost of Bonneville dam be charged to navigation by the federal government, passed the house Friday afternoon without opposition. The memorial also requests congress to postpone for 50 years any payment by Oregon of the remaining 50 per cent charged to power development. Interest is requested at a rate not exceeding four per cent.

Mrs. Hannah Martin of this county urged that the rate of interest not exceed 2 1/2 per cent and that the time of repayment be extended to 150 years. Her request for unanimous consent to such an amendment failed.

Federal Income Report Due Soon

Federal income tax returns for the calendar year 1934 must be filed with J. W. Maloney, collector of internal revenue for Oregon, not later than March 15, his office announced yesterday.

Income tax forms were mailed January 10 to all taxpayers who filed such forms in the previous year. Failure to receive the forms will not relieve taxpayers from penalties provided if the return is not filed on time.

Morley Sued by Nelson on Deal To Handle Hops

Suit for dissolution and accounting in a partnership to grow and market hops was filed in circuit court yesterday by Hugh Nelson against F. M. Morley and wife. He has asked for order restraining defendants from transferring assets and properties of the partnership pending outcome of the suit in equity.

Nelson claims that January 13, 1934, he and defendants entered an agreement for raising hops on a 260-acre farm in Polk county, and further that he, Nelson, put \$7182.83 into the enterprise. F. M. Morley has \$4010.75 to pay wages and employment, but has refused to give an accounting on this, the plaintiff alleges.

CODE FOR BUSES ATTACKED, COURT

Judge L. H. McMahon of the Marion county circuit court signed an order temporarily restraining Charles M. Thomas, state utility commissioner, from enforcing the national bus code in connection with the operations of the Dollar stages.

McMahon held in his order that the stage corporation would be expected to comply with the state transportation law.

In a suit filed here Friday the company alleged that President Roosevelt was deceived and defrauded into approving the code for the reason that it was prepared by persons and corporations interested in fostering a monopoly.

Particular mention was made in the complaint of the Greyhound lines, which operate extensively in virtually all sections of the United States.

It was charged that one of the directors of the code is the chief executive officer of the entire Greyhound organization.
