EASTERN OREGON IS HELPED BY SPRINGS

The cooperative project by the drouth relief service and the Oregon SERRA to provide wells and improved springs in the drouth-stricken eastern Oregon livestock country resulted in the improvement of 300 springs and the establishment of 26 wells, of direct benefit to 705 families in 10 eastern Oregon counties, according to a compilation just made by P. M. Brandt of Oregon State college, assistant drouth relief direct for this state.

The permanent improvement of the water facilities over this vast area has been described as one of the best SERRA projects yet attempted, and the efficient method by which it was carried out under the direction of Ivan Oakes, district engineer for the SERRA, has attracted much attention, even outside of Oregon, according to reports received by Professor Brandt. As soon as money was received from the federal government last July, our marked emergency work, crews of unemployed were put at the task without delay in counties which had been designated in whole or in part as drouth areas.

Missionary Group Hears About Stams, Killed by Chinese

BLIND STUDENTS PRESENT PROGRAM

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Jan. 29.—A group of young people from the blind school furnished the entertainment at the P. T. A. meeting Friday night. Vocal numbers, instrumental ones, a rhythm band, a jazz orchestra and demonstrations in reading and blind writing in Braille were enjoyed.

Facts brought out by the superintendent and teachers in charge of the pupils were: Conservation of vision is taught in "sight saving" classes. A Portland specialist treats the pupils and performs operations where such are required. Some have thus been enabled to return to public school and some have practically regained normal eyesight. Sixty-one pupils are now enrolled and being prepared for efficient living. The bible in Braille, it was stated, fills 18 large volumes.

Forestry School Gets Another 240 Acres of Timber

CORVALLIS, Jan. 29.—Purchase of 240 acres of additional timberland adjoining the present McDonald experimental forest operated by the school of forestry at OSC has just been made possible by an additional gift of \$6000 for the purpose from Mrs. Mary J. L. McDonald of San Francisco. The addition gives the school the most accessible experimental forest among all the forestry schools of the United States, the tract being only seven miles from the campus.

Mrs. McDonald, now popularly known as "The Godmother to the School of Forestry," has made possible the acquisition of 2600 acres for the school. She has extensive timber interests in Oregon and is keenly interested in advancing forest study.
