

HIGHWAY FUND MAY TAKE HEAVIER LOAD

Would Include County Roads and Obviate Appeals to Divert Says Cooter

Two house committees are giving serious consideration to plans to let highway revenues finance the entire highway program of the state, including the county roads therein, and to place the relief work program, John Cooter, speaker of the house, told the Kiwanis club yesterday noon. Cooter said such a step would do away with the recurrent talk of diverting highway funds to other departments.

The speaker stated he is not at this time advocating the step, but presented the matter as one he is giving consideration.

If gasoline taxes, automobile license fees and federal road funds were all pooled to this end, the tax load on property may be eased, he stated.
