Canners to Attend School at Oregon State Next Week

CORVALLIS, Jan. 31.—Operators of small community canning plants as well as managers of the large commercial concerns will profit by the program arranged for the 14th annual canners' school at Oregon State college, believes E. H. Wiegand, in charge of the school. Starting February 4, the first week of the school

will be devoted to latest information on canning fundamentals and the principles involved in using various equipment.

In the second week a considerable number of visiting specialists in vegetable and fruit canning, frozen pack processing and cherry brining methods will supplement the work given by the O. S. C. staff members. The entire school is open to the public at a cost of only one dollar for registration.

M'NARY REPLIES TO TOWNSEND MESSAGE

SILVERTON, Jan. 31.—Senator Charles L. McNary, in a telegram to Dr. W. O. Livingstone, president of the Silverton Townsend club, says, "Glad to have your views and those of your organization in connection with Townsend Old Age Pension plans. I shall convey your message to appropriate congressional committee when the matter of the old age pensions comes up for consideration."

This telegram was in response to one sent two days previously by the local club. The club, in its telegram, urged McNary to "stand for passing of the bill," because of 300,000 Oregon citizens, 1800 local voters, and 25 million Americans urging congress, "to do your utmost for the Townsend old age pension." "All other pensions," the 150-word telegram to Sen. McNary said, "being an increase of taxes, a pittance, a dole; they pauperize under oath; they slay self-respect, while the Townsend plan adds billions in new buying power, reduces taxes by billions; promotes employment by millions; respects honorable age and uses the same for financial recovery."

The telegram referred to the plan as "the recognition of service for honorable citizens." It was signed by W. O. Livingstone, president of the local club; by W. K. Caine, club secretary and by J. E. Hosmer, members of the executive committee.
