Firestone Has Fire—Three fire trucks were dispatched to the Firestone service station, Liberty and Center streets, when an alarm rang in from that place just before 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The blaze, it was found, was in a floor around a flue. It was extinguished before serious damage was done. Chimney flames were put out by firemen yesterday at 145 South 14th, at 6:30 a.m., and at 955 Center, at 1:30 p.m.

Relief Board Meets—A routine meeting of the Marion county relief committee was held at the Spa yesterday noon with the chairman, E. W. Wiedner, presiding. The committee approved six small BERA projects and listened to a report on new relief regulations. Among the latter is a requirement made by the state committee that all families on relief must plant sustenance gardens this spring.

SALEM ENTERS 20 IN FORENSIC MEET

Three Debate Teams to Vie in Statewide Event on Linfield Campus

Twenty Salem high school students will go with Forensic Coach Shannon Hogue to McMinnville today to enter the annual two-day Oregon high school forensic meet sponsored by Linfield college, Hogue said last night. These will include three four-member debate teams, three extemporaneous speakers, three orators, declamation contest entrant and a forensic manager.

Prospects for the Salem entrants making a favorable showing appear to be good, Hogue stated. The senior debate team is comprised of experienced speakers, all of whom participated in this meet last year. Salem high should "at least place" in extemporaneous speaking and oratory, and the declamation entrant, Billy Utley, is defending state champion he said.

The top team of debaters consists of Deane Hanks, Marjorie Tryon, Dean Ellis and Ted Smith; the next, Maxine Stanley, Catherine Applewhite, Bill Thomas and Ruth Grant; the third, all sophomores, Betty Hamilton, Marjorie Pickens, Janet Weeks and Martha Wodage.

The general subject for the extemporaneous speeches will be "Lefseur Time." Each speaker will draw a topic bearing on some phase of this subject one hour before he speaks. Salem entrants are Dean Ellis, Betty Dotson and Gordon Graber.

The orations, limited to 1500 words, or about 12 minutes, and to original addresses, Roland DeVries, Glenn Maynard and Bruce Sawyer will represent Salem in this event.

Billy Utley, who was said last year to have stood out far above all other competitors, will again participate in the dramatic division of the declamation contest. Salem high will not enter the humorous division.

Junior Nelson is forensic manager. More than 23 schools, including Salem, will enter. Dallas Canby, Dayton and Amity have announced they would enter this meet. In the one last year, Salem debaters reached the quarter finals, placed second and third in oratory, second and fourth in extemporaneous speaking, and first in declamation. The Salem debaters tied for first in 1933.

Job Agency Here Sends Many Men To Outside Work

The national re-employment agency, 354 Court street, in January found work in four counties for Marion county men and altogether sent 104 men and women to jobs. Miss Lois Barker, statistician, announced last night. The month ended with 3312 men and 135 women in this county listed in the agency files as desiring employment.

Of the 104 persons placed last month, 19 were sent outside the county. Fifteen bridge form carpenters went to Lincoln county to work on one of the new coast bridges, two sheet metal workers went to work in Linn county, one sawyer to Lincoln county and one diesel engine rock crusher operator to Polk county.

Conspiracy Bill Passed, Senate

The senate, by almost unanimous vote, Thursday defeated Senator Bynon's bill making it a crime to conspire to commit any felony and to do any act to promote such conspiracy.

Sensor Bynon declared that the bill was in line with the federal statutes and had received the indorsement of most of the district attorneys.

A number of other senators opposed the measure on the floor.

2 tablespoons butter

2 tablespoons flour

Mix equal parts of drained cottage cheese and ground walnuts. Add a little celery cut fine, chopped parsley, and mix with sweet cream. Salt to taste. Make into small balls and sprinkle with paprika. Serve as a relish with nut bread.

Place 1/2 inch slice of pimento cheese on a long salted wafer. Press into the cheese two walnut meats and bake until the cheese is melted to a nice brown. Serve with salad.

TRUCK OPERATORS FORM NEW GROUP

Organization of Owners of Smaller Carriers Will Seek Legislation

Representing a considerable group of truck operators, particularly owners of smaller-sized trucks, the Farm and Independent Truck Owners' association has been formed in Salem and is submitting legislation for the better protection of their interests. Criticism of existing laws is supported by reference to figures from the motor vehicle department to the effect that 12,320 small trucks were compelled to suspend operation in 1934, that license fee collections were \$150,000 less and the state gas tax receipts dropped \$40,000 the last quarter of the year.

Earl Chapel of Salem, chairman of the legislative committee of the organization, has outlined the changes desired, and which are being put in a bill to be introduced, as follows:

- (1) Changing present setup to designate two clear cut classes, commercial carrier and common carrier, with true farmer exempt provisions unchanged.
- (2) Establishing responsibility of common carriers as a public utility with fair assumption of public and school tax burdens now carried by railroads and other large public service units.
- (3) Adequate provision for public safety.
- (4) Providing fair and complete control of intra and interstate truck operation.
- (5) Outlining scope of operation of all trucks, eliminating monopoly and unfair charges to isolated section not served by railroads.

The independent group is strenuously opposing HB 55 which they regard as working against the small truckers for the big operators.

World News at a Glance

Roundup Wants In on Receipts Of Race Racket

Senator Best introduced a bill Thursday which would divert five per cent of the state racing commission receipts, up to \$5000, to the Pendleton Roundup association.

Under this bill 35 per cent of the receipts would go to the Oregon state fair and 55 per cent to the Pacific International Livestock association.

The existing laws give the state fair and livestock exposition each 37 1/2 per cent of the racing commission receipts.

PETITION HAWKERS TARGET OF THOMAS

Mercenary Peddlers Cause Cluttering of Ballot Polk Solon Avers

The third youngest member of the Oregon house of representatives, Lyle D. Thomas, firmly believes that serious "abuses in our present election setup" will be eliminated if the proposed law to forbid payment of initiative and referendum petition circulators is enacted, he told Salem Lions club at its luncheon yesterday. Thomas is principal of the West Salem school.

"The initiative and referendum setup at present has developed into nothing less than a racket," the 26-year old legislator asserted.

"In certain seasons professional petition-hawkers manhandle the public; I believe their only motive lies in the 5 or 10 cents a name they will receive."

The worst of the promiscuous promotion of initiative and referendum measures is that it clutters the ballot with a host of schemes the public is not interested in or informed upon and results in the voters' often disregarding all such measures, good or bad, Thomas held.

"Certainly this is not conducive to good clean, strong, orderly government," he said, pointing out that since the initiative and referendum were created 218 such measures had been placed before the voters at regular and 48 at special elections, or an average of 17 per election.

"On the general average, 27 per cent of the people who appear at the polls do not cast a vote on the referendum, initiative or recall measures," he continued.

"If we could get this law through, only the important legislation waited by an aroused public would be proposed."

The scheduled speaker for yesterday's meeting, Hugh Rosson, University of Oregon graduate manager, became ill Wednesday and could not come to Salem yesterday.

Tillamook Asks Tax Remission

Tillamook county asks remission of all its delinquent state taxes and reduction of its 1936 to 1940 state taxes by 50 per cent in House Bill 199 introduced yesterday. The bill is prefaced by a statement that the county lost \$30,000,000 in the timber fire in August, 1933, that 84 per cent of

the taxes on timber in the burned district are unpaid, and that the county and its subdivisions have outstanding debts of \$1,400,000.

OPPOSE REMOVAL OF BRIDGE TOLLS

A communication expressing opposition to eliminating tolls on the five Oregon coast bridges now under construction was received by the Salem chamber of commerce yesterday from the Grants Pass chamber. Directors of the Salem chamber have not acted on this matter.

"We believe removal of tolls means an added burden to the taxpayers... in the amount of approximately \$5,000,000; and will deprive the other highways of the state of a like amount of money, which is necessary for upkeep, construction, etc.," the letter read in part. "This added burden would interfere with the entire state highway program and delay for a number of years improvements that are absolutely necessary for the handling and safety of modern highway traffic."

To support its claim that the Oregon Coast highway does not deserve the large amount of tax on the non-toll plan would divert to these bridges, the Grants Pass chamber points out that during 1934 only 12 per cent of the non-resident, or tourist, registrations in Oregon were made along that route. The Pacific highway received 59.3 per cent of these registrations, the Columbia river route 16.3 per cent, The Dalles-California highway 10.1 per cent, and scattered smaller roads, mostly in eastern Oregon 2.3 per cent.

Tax Waiving Bill Coming Up Today
Senate Bill No. 59, providing for the waiving of state taxes in Jefferson county for the last half of the year 1934 and all of 1935, will come up under the head of special order of business at 2:30 p.m. today.

This measure has been reported out favorably by the joint ways and means committee.

Senator Wallace, who introduced the bill, declared that less than \$20,000 was involved.
