

DADS CONSIDER SHOW PARKING

Nelson Suggests Insurance
Business Be Given
More Dealers

SILVERTON, Feb. 5.—A new ordinance, regulating the parking in front of local theatres, was brought up at the February meeting of the city council Monday night. Alfred Adams, manager of the Palace theatre at Silvertown, brought the matter to the attention of the councilmen. The ordinance was read and passed on its first two readings.

Adams, who was present at the meeting, also asked whose permission he was to secure if he desired to improve the poolhall and show shop in the Palace theatre block. Mr. Adams is planning to build a new theatre this spring and will wreck the water street portion of the present building. He was informed he would have to secure the permission of the state fire marshal.

Lights Discussed
The matter of additional lights in the city was also discussed and left in the hands of the street committee for further investigation. S. P. Rose of the Portland Electric company, was present and gave estimates of the cost of some lights. Requests for two new lights on South Water street, two on East Hill and two on West Hill have come into the council. The question of releasing the city dump ground was discussed and left in the hands of the health, fire and water committee.

A communication from J. W. Frank of Mt. Angel of the Frank Service company, was read, expressing a desire to take care of the city dumping problems. The matter was referred to the health, fire and water committee. Mr. Frank stated that he would soon open an office on South Water street at Silvertown.

Asks Chance For All
A communication from Alf O. Nelson, manager of the Home-seeker's agency was also read. The communication said that Mr. Nelson had been writing insurance at Silvertown for 11 years and that he was of the belief "that it is customary to distribute the city's insurance."

Mayor W. E. Garver, in referring to the matter, ordered the communication placed on file and said that "it would be a good idea to take it into consideration with the thought of distributing the insurance a little more among local insurance writers."

The council voted to place the complaints of pipes sticking up on Oak street in front of the Lucky Motor company, in the hands of the street committee. The pipes, coming through the walk, were left when a former owner of the business had a tank removed. It was said.

The request from Oscar Storassil for a sewer extension on First street was left in the hands of the health, fire and water committee. Mr. Storassil reported he intended to build two cottages on property on First street.

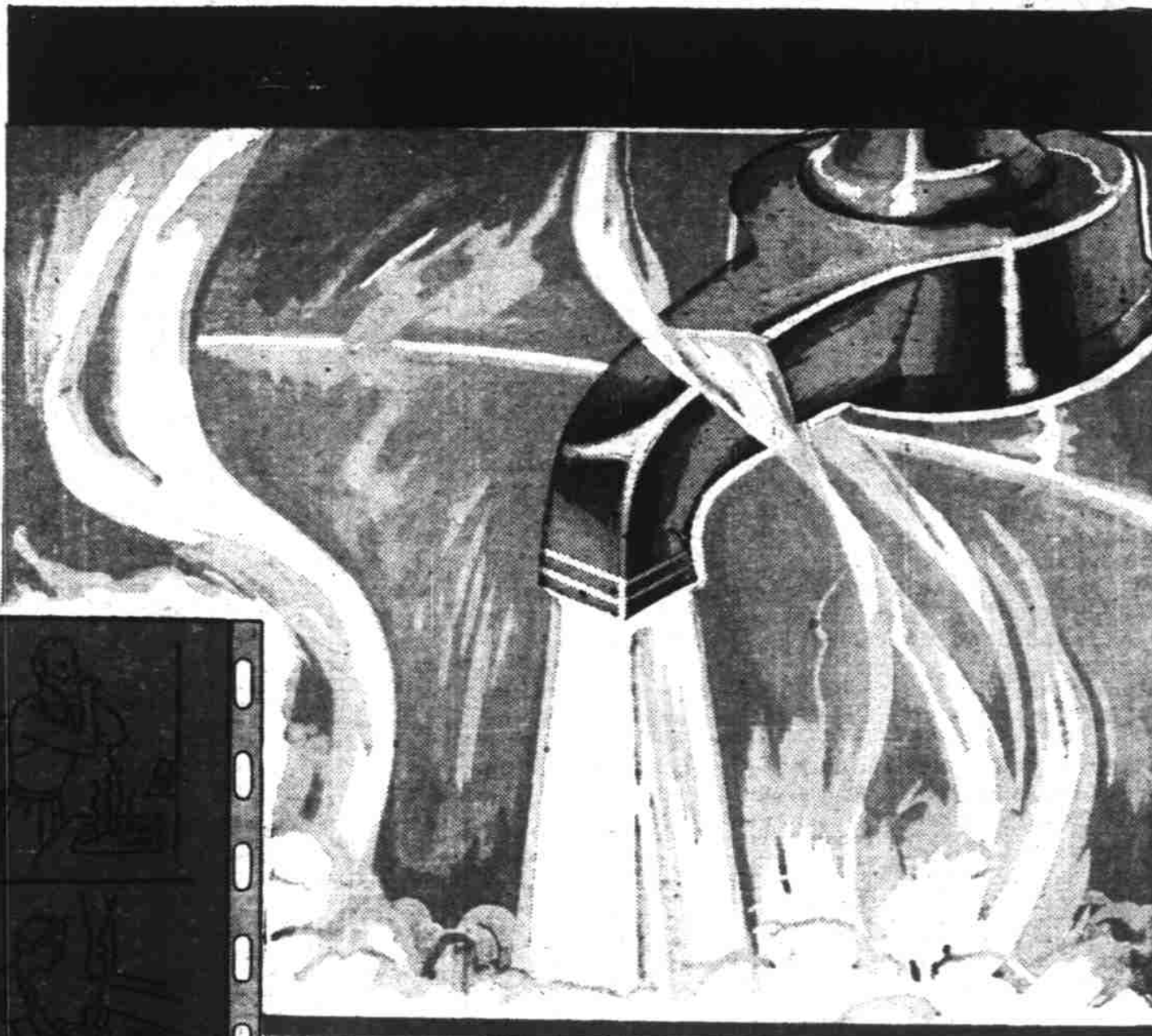

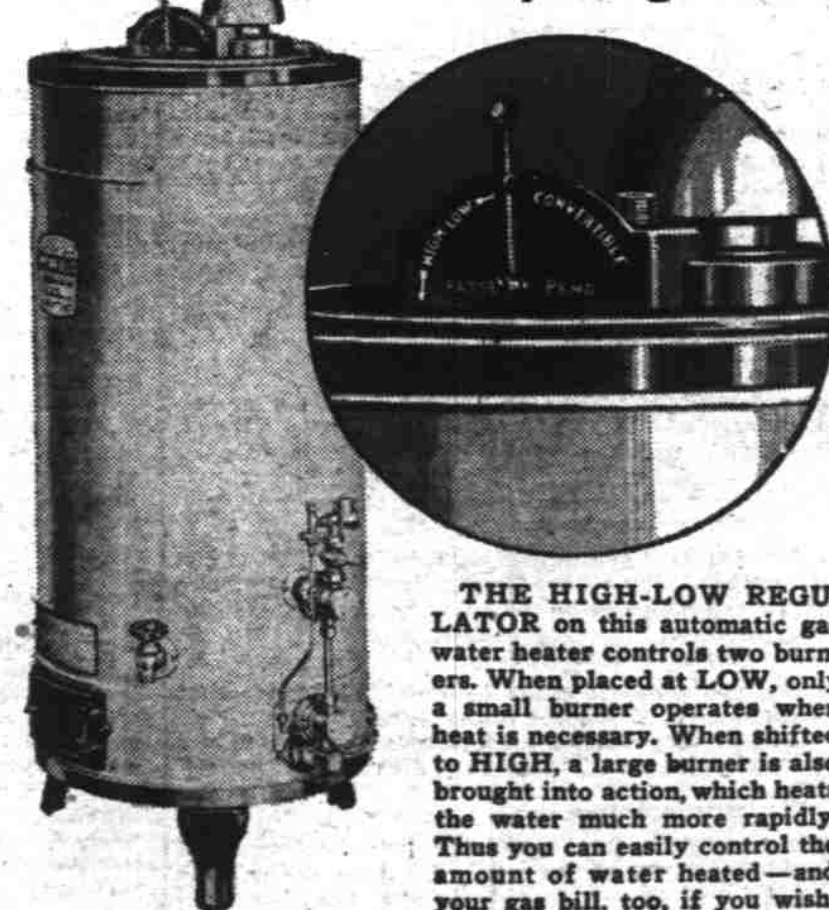
