

Local News Briefs

Seely Estate—Bulk of the estate of Julia E. Seely, who died here February 1, is left to the four daughters, Ruth Aker of Dayton, Edith Fox of California, Edna Stenger of Woodburn and Edith Lucht of Molalla, by terms of the will admitted to probate yesterday. Each daughter is left \$1500. The six sons are to receive the personal property of the estate, which is valued at \$5000 real property and \$1000 personal property. Perry W. Seely and E. Seely R. Seely, executors under the terms of the will, elected not to serve and the court appointed George T. Wadsworth, appraiser, and Charles Skiller, Art Hughes and Wessel Ore.

Co-op Answers—The Dairy co-operative association yesterday answered a complaint of E. A. Rhoten, in which Rhoten alleges money is due for milk delivered. The co-op holds that it complied with contract to handle Rhoten's milk, and sets forth that Rhoten and G. B. Bowman were joint owners of a herd producing fluid milk and cream. Bowman also entered into a contract with the co-op as an equal member of the partnership, and when the herd was divided, the usual ruling on the basic average prevailing, and with knowledge of the plaintiff, the answer continues.

Seeking Divorce—August Futch asks dissolution of marital relations with Wanda Futch in complaint filed yesterday. He alleges her disposition toward him was irritable, and that she criticized and abused him in front of mutual friends. Complaint says he is willing to allow her custody of their child and pay her \$10 per month support. They were married in Salem in July, 1931.

Rogers Released—Euel Rogers, given parole about a year ago on a burglary charge, was arrested yesterday on a circuit court bench warrant because he had failed to make restitution for tobacco taken from the Blanchett pool hall at St. Paul. Rogers had paid \$7, and he was released after he paid \$10.

Revoke Parole—Parole of Albert Meyers, sentenced about a year ago to a year in prison for burglary not in a dwelling, was ordered revoked yesterday. Meyers is out of the state and it is said no effort will be made to return him on the revocation order.

Amends Complaint—Amended complaint has been filed by Ellen Kusel in her suit against George Jensen and Della Jensen, from whom she asks restoration of personal property allegedly wrongfully withheld by defendants. In lieu of the property, she wants \$250, also \$300 damages.

COSMETICS HEARING ENDS IN WRANGLING

Barbers, cosmeticians, beauty shop owners and operators wrangled for two hours last night before the revision of laws committee of the house, but failed to coincide their differences and threw the meeting into a second session. The public hearing was called on two bills which would regulate the practice and policy of beauty shops and employees.

Conflict between the beauty schools and beauty shops, jammed the committee room and after lengthy debate resulted in the selection of representatives of each faction for a meeting with Representative Dickson Monday. Charges that beauty shop operators were attempting to legislate out the beauty schools and counter charges that the schools were aiming to undermine the shop owners and operators, brought the hearing extension.

Proponents of the beauty school cause included John Logan, Portland attorney; Walter Vinslow, Salem attorney, and John Beckman, Harry Kennin, Portland attorney, represented the shop owners and operators. Jessica Bourne, president of the state board of cosmetic therapy examiners, represented the board.

Congress Asked To Keep Hands Off Section 7-A

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—(P)—A presidential request that congress in reshaping NRA keep hands off section 7-A, the tumult-marked labor bargaining clause, came indirectly today from the White House.

This word was passed quietly to congressional leaders at a conference with President Roosevelt, at which an administration move to extend the basic principles of NRA for two more years was tentatively decided upon.

for the bonus was like "writing letters to Santa Claus." This payment would help my friends but I must vote against them," said Representative Haight, Grant. "I gave you a way out to take care of the bonus, the old-age pension plans and of unemployment. You turned that down. My desire is for this but I can't conscientiously do it. I'll vote against it although I am for it."

Must Obey Veterans' Request, Says Erwin
Representative Erwin, Multnomah, said the house could not turn down the request of 35,000 veterans in Oregon. "All we are doing is to ask congress to act on a matter out of our control and about which we do not know. We must obey the request of the veterans."

Representative Lew Wallace, Multnomah, said he could not understand why the certificates were due now. He said that an inadequate veterans' fund on years ago was requested in the year of the certificates. Wallace urged that the memorial be changed to urge congress to "correct the wrong" to which Frazier referred rather than to "demand" immediate payments as a matter of right under the adjusted certificates held by veterans.

Would Defeat Purpose Of Government, Held
Representative Smurthwaite, Baker, said loans on certificates against which veterans had borrowed money would eat up the balance due the veterans before 1945 came. He said this defeated the purpose of the government in paying the compensation. Smurthwaite said he was assured where the world war had the full payment coming to them.

Forty-seven members voted for the memorial. Nay votes were cast by Representatives Fatland, Haight, Hamilton, Kreir, Lynch, Rodman, Snider, Wallace. Members absent were Fuhrer, Hill, of Lane, Magruder, Martin, Norblad.

REMOVING OF TAX EXEMPTION BACKED

A delegation of Eugene residents appeared before the house committee on assessment and taxation yesterday to urge removal of tax exemption from the connection with House Bill No. 101, which would make it possible to tax certain properties of literary, benevolent, charitable and scientific institutions, which are used for commercial purposes.

Specimen reference was made to the Miner building in Eugene, which was given to the University of Oregon, after certain annuities had been provided for its former owners.

Several speakers declared that the Miner building, because of being exempted from taxation under the existing laws, had entered into direct competition with other similar structures. This was declared unfair and unjust.

County Assessor Keane of Lane county said that as a result of being tax exempt it had been possible for tenants to rent rooms in the Miner building at a cost far less than charged in other structures furnishing similar accommodations.

Dental Price Ad Bill is Reported Out Unfavorably

The senate committee on medicine, pharmacy and dentistry late yesterday afternoon voted to report out unfavorably a bill by Senator Zimmerman authorizing advertising dentists to display large advertising signs and advertise fixed prices.

Senator Best, chairman, explained that a suit involving the question of advertising was now before the United States supreme court and that the legislature should take no action at the present legislative session.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—(P)—Agriculture department officials said today railroads had granted a 25 percent reduction on whole and cracked wheat for animal feed from Washington, Oregon and Idaho to eastern Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota and Wyoming.

The reduction, understood by department officials to be effective immediately, was granted to permit shipment at the reduced rate until April 30 as a means of moving additional feed supplies to drought areas.

WOODWORTH BURIAL WILL BE THURSDAY

Linn County Judge Active in Many Associations; Had Been in Ill Health

ALBANY, Feb. 6.—Funeral services will be held here Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock for Judge D. O. Woodworth who died here yesterday as the result of a self-inflicted gunshot wound. Rev. Mortimer M. Stocker of the First Presbyterian church will be in charge.

Judge Woodworth had been in ill health since December 14 when he was forced to leave his office at the courthouse here and to remain at his home.

He was a native of New York state, coming to Oregon in 1887 and beginning work in an Albany drugstore. Later he bought a drugstore in Albany and conducted it until 1925. He was elected county judge in 1930.

Served Fair Board
Judge Woodworth had served as a member of the state fair board, as president of the Oregon Jersey Cattle club, as president of the Oregon State Pharmaceutical association, and at the time of his death was serving his second term as vice-president of the Oregon association of county judges and commissioners.

He was a member of the Knights of Pythias, Masonic, Elks and Maccabean lodges. Surviving are the widow; a daughter, Mrs. Vera Stevens, and a son, Dr. Woodworth of Albany, and three grandchildren and a great grandchild.

JEROME FRANK, FIVE OTHERS OUT OF AAA

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—(P)—Additional withdrawals from the AAA apparently impeded tonight following five resignations from the legal and consumer's counsel staffs—among them being Jerome Frank, general counsel.

One of those dismissed said the shakeup was due to a "fundamental difference of opinion on basic policies" of the administration and that other sympathizers would probably follow sooner or later.

In addition to Frank, protege of Felix Frankfurter, three of his aides, Lee Pressman, Francis M. Shea, and Victor W. Rotheim; and Gardner Jackson, assistant to Fred Howe, consumer's counsel, submitted their resignations to Chester C. Davis, farm administrator. Some of them said they were ordered to quit.

Arbitration is Urged in Dispute Over Cell Fronts

A resolution introduced here yesterday by Senator Aitken directs the state board of control to submit to arbitration all differences between King Brothers and the board in connection with a contract for 180 cell fronts and swinging doors for the new cell block at the Oregon state penitentiary. The installation was completed in 1932 but a financial settlement between the board and King Brothers has not yet been negotiated.

The resolution suggests that J. H. MacGregor, engineer for the city of Portland, be selected as arbitrator.
