Car is Also Author of
Travel Book

MT. ANGEL, Feb. 7.—Martin Itjen, owner and driver of the "Skagway, Alaska, Street Car," drove his unique bus into Mt. Angel late Tuesday morning, thinking to make a few minutes' stop at the Benedictine Press where his book, "The Story of the Tour on the Skagway, Alaska, Street Car," was published, but the stop grew into a few hours' visit, to the great delight of everyone. He and Mr. and Mrs. McAllister from Skagway, who accompanied him, visited both the Press and Mt. Angel college where they were the guests of Rev. Lawrence Esbay, who spent some time in Skagway last year.

Martin Itjen is one of the Alaska pioneers, who stormed the Klondike in '98. He knew all the well known characters connected with the gold rush and the incidents associated with them. In his native city he runs the very same "Skagway street car" that brought him down here.

The bus is a study in originality. A stuffed black bear cub seated in the front of the bus, opens its mouth, flashes his electric eyes and barks, when the horn is sounded. A life size dummy of Soapy Smith bows and raises his hand in salute at the back of the car. At the windows appear the faces of other famous Klondike characters.

3 cups sifted Swiss Down Cake Flour
1 teaspoon Calumet Baking Powder
1/2 cup butter or other shortening
1 cup sugar

3 egg yolks, beaten until thick and lemon-colored
1/4 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla, or 1/2 teaspoon orange extract

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg yolks and beat well.
