Criminal Record Was Lengthy One

Later he was accused of the robbery of a Great Northern train in Washington where \$6000 in negotiable paper and \$70,000 in securities were taken.

Liard was thought by prison officials here to have made his getaway from the prison annex with the aid of an accomplice who waited for him outside the prison. No trace was found of Liard's whereabouts until he was arrested in the east.

Warden James Lewis said a guard would be sent to St. Paul within the next few days to return the prisoner here.

Champ Ross Ill, Unable to Fight Woods on Coast

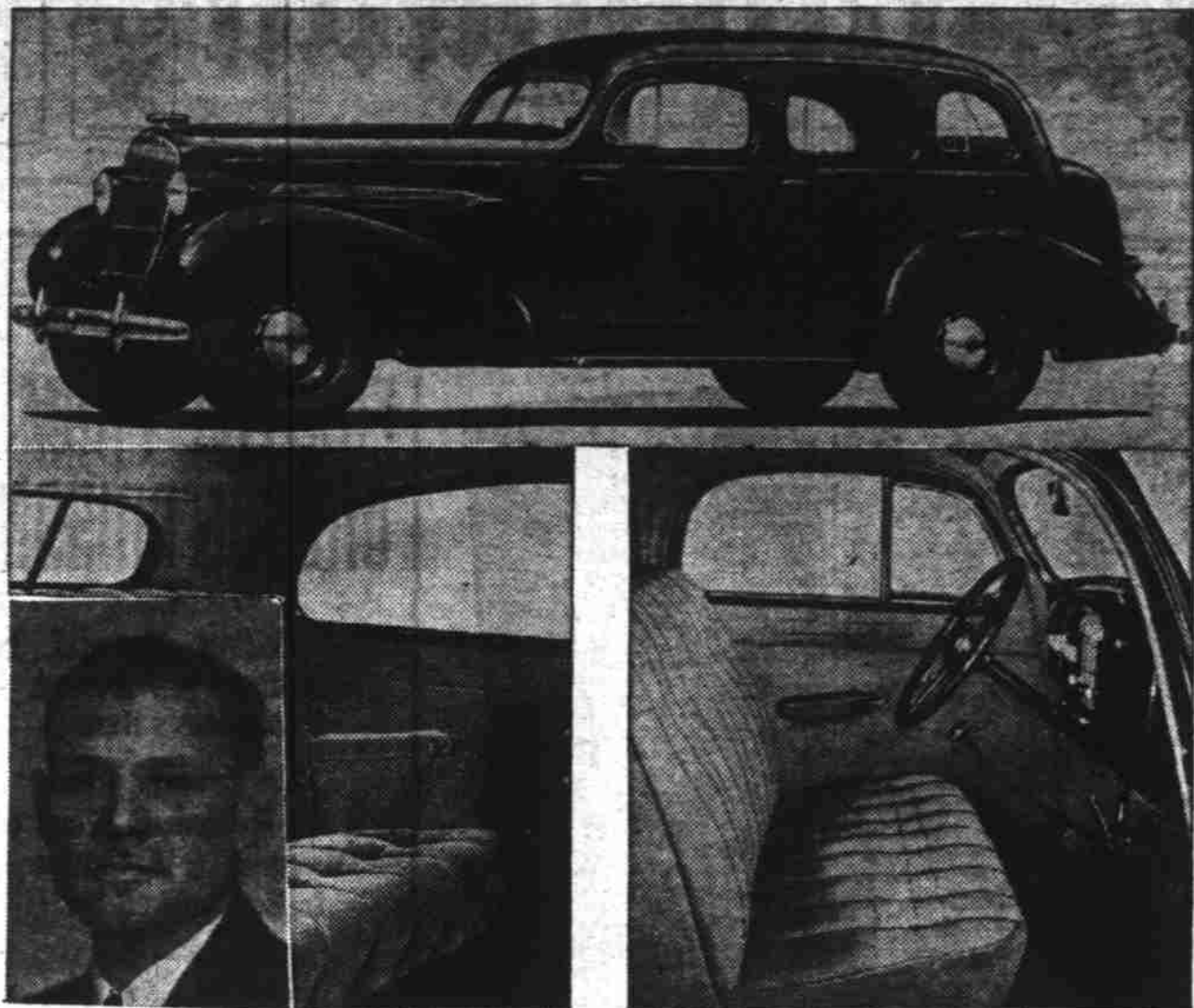

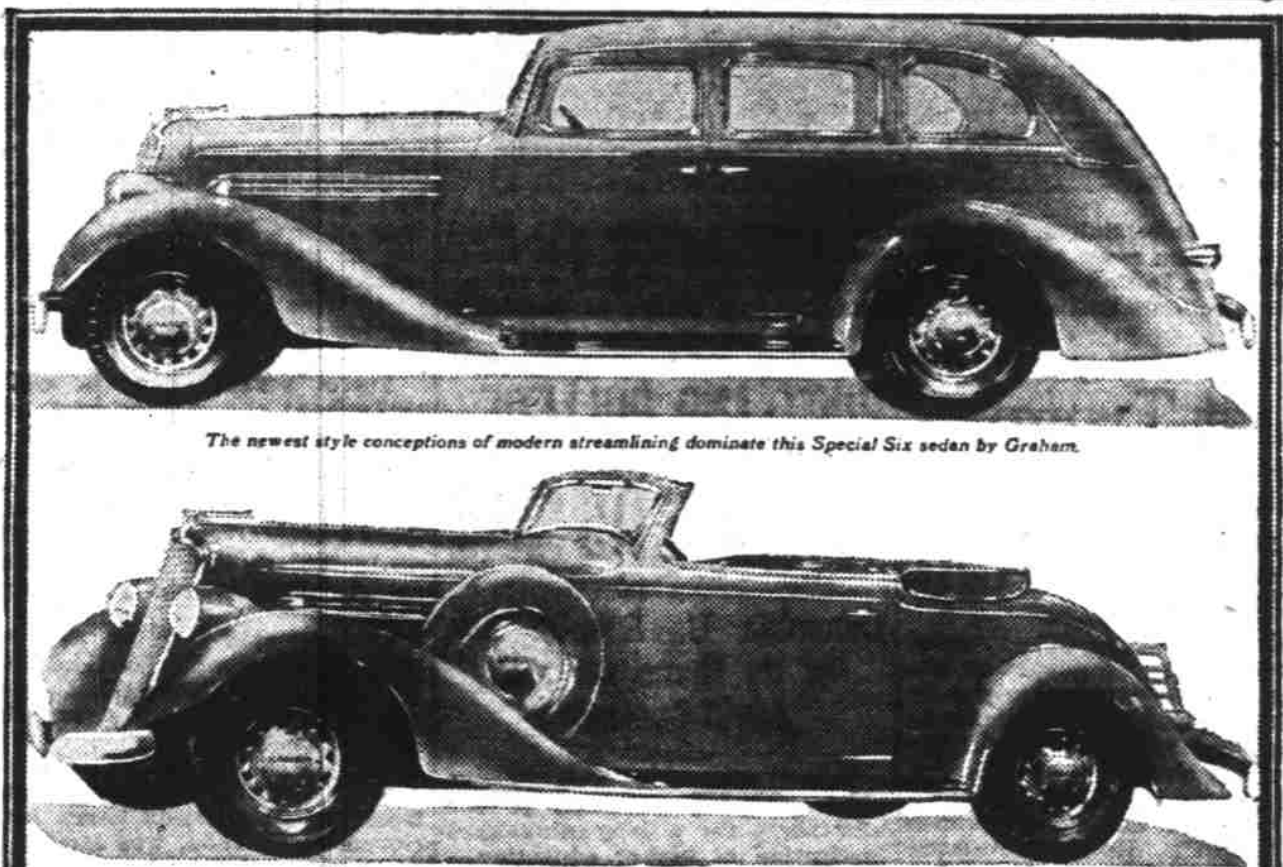
One of the outstanding bills approved requires that normal schools shall teach pathogenic effect of alcohol upon the human body. This measure was introduced by Senator Zimmerman.

McGee, president of the company, revealed here tonight.

McGee, who has been in the states for several weeks on business, said the plane, piloted by Donald Goodman, formerly of Santa Maria, Calif., was located by Estol Call, a McGee Airways pilot. The message gave no details. Goodman's passengers are Bob Lowery and Paul Keating, both residents of interior Alaska.

PATRONAGE DISPUTE WORRIES BOURBONS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—(AP)—New and unwelcome evidences of dissension in their own ranks arose today to worry democrats on Capitol Hill, particularly in the house.

They were unwilling, of course, to let their names be used in connection with the remarks, but several expressed fears of a "blowout" soon unless greater harmony is attained between house members on the one side and administration officials on the other.

One development of the day was a white house visit by five house members to protest that too many republicans and too few democrats have jobs under a democratic administration.

They talked with the president more than an hour. The upheaval was the calling of a new democratic caucus for Thursday night to talk over for still another time the patronage situation.

Prevailing Wage Issue Main Test, Relief Measure

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—(AP)—A plea to the senate today by William Green for the adoption of the McCarran prevailing wage amendment convinced some administration leaders that the wage proposal would give the \$4,880,000, 000 work relief bill its severest test on the senate floor.

Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, wrote each senator, pleading for the defeat of the administration's compromise plan which would give the president authority to fix relief wages.

The McCarran amendment would direct that the wages prevailing in localities be paid on all work relief projects.

Bus-Truck Fees Bill Withdrawn

Representative Johnson yesterday withdrew his bus and truck bill which provided for a schedule of fees based on gross revenues and a separate commission for administration of the law. The bill has been before the roads and highways committee of the house.

BERLIN, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Diplomatic circles here tonight said they had reports that Adolf Hitler and Marshal Joseph Pilsudski, former premier and present war minister of Poland, would meet soon for heart-to-heart conversations analogous to those between Hitler and Premier Mussolini Jan. 14, 1934.

FLAX GROWERS TO MEET WEDNESDAY

All flax growers in the valley who have contracted their 1935 crop to the Champagne Paper corporation of New York City as well as any other flax growers interested in improving the planting and handling of their crop, are invited and urged to attend a meeting to be held next Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 p. m. at the chamber of commerce here.

Speakers for the meeting will be H. R. Hyalop of Oregon State college and D. B. Robinson, a United States government expert on flax culture who is temporarily at the college.

The men will discuss the proper handling of flax seed, the planting of flax, its culture and its harvesting.

William Einsig, representative of the Champagne Paper corporation here, will attend the gathering as will H. P. Etzel and Lee Demyth, who have served as flax men in inspecting acreage for the flax concern has contracted. More than 1000 acres of flax have already been signed for by Einsig.

Farmers who have land they wish to plant are also invited to attend.

Handicaps of Two Golfers Prove Equal

The relative handicaps of a golfer with only one arm and a golfer with only one leg went undetermined here Saturday afternoon when Harry Belt, state supreme court justice, and Estes Snedecor, legal adviser to Governor Martin, played an 18-hole match on the Salem Golf course.

The handicaps, incidentally, appeared to be all in comparison to the average golfer with a full quota of limbs, for in halving their match both on a match and medal basis, they scored 89, which is pretty fair golf for anyone who doesn't make a business of the game.

Snedecor was two down approaching the 17th hole but he got a par there and a birdie on the 18th to square the match. He lays aside his crutches in driving and balances on his one leg, using a beautiful pivot which is the envy of golfers better equipped physically.

TOWNSEND DEFENDS HIS RECOVERY PLAN

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Grim and unsmiling, the author of the Townsend \$200 a month pension plan sought for two hours today to convince the senate finance committee that his idea was the cure for the economic ills of the country.

Townsend faced a semi-circle of hostile senators and tried to answer their questions, some serious and others obviously designed to ridicule his plan.

At the conclusion, Chairman Harrison announced the committee would conclude its hearings on the administration's social security program next Wednesday and would try to frame a bill fair to all, but he warned the Californian it would not include old age pensions of \$200 a month.

Most of the questioning revolved around its financing. Senators argued that it would cost \$24,000,000,000 a year and that the proposed 2 per cent "transactions tax" probably would leave a deficit of \$19,000,000,000 a year.

A little impatiently, Townsend replied that the plan would double or quadruple business and bring an era of plenty in which the cost would be a mere trifle.

TWO CONVICTED IN GERM DEATH CASE

ALIPORE, India, Feb. 16.—(AP)—India's "germ murder" case—the strangest in the country's legal history—ended today as two of the four defendants were sentenced to death.

The two convicted were the step-brother of the dead man and one of three doctors charged with conspiring to murder him through the injection of plague germs. The other two doctors were acquitted.

The murder, termed by the presiding judge "one of the most cold-blooded he had ever come across, occurred last year. Amarendra Nath Pandey, wealthy landowner, was walking along a street on his way home. Suddenly he felt the sharp stab of the injection.

The man's step-brother, Benayendra Nath Pandey, took him under his care. Septic pneumonia developed, and he died.

Taxes Coming in At Twice Speed Of 1934, Report

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 16.—(AP)—The old homestead or the new city home in Multnomah county is not nearly so likely to be sold for taxes this year.

The sheriff's office announced today that tax money is pouring in this year more than twice as fast as last.

Current and delinquent tax collections since February 1 have been \$605,451.08 this year compared with \$289,828.74 for the corresponding period last year.
